## FIRE FIGHTING SCHOOL BEGINS HERE APRIL 14

A comprehensive fire fighting training course will be offered to members of the Crowell Volunteer Fire Department, Assistant Chief Dutch Hollenbaugh announced this week.

The fire fighting training course will begin on April 14 and will be held one night every two weeks from ten to twenty weeks.

C. R. Anderson of Wichita Falls, state firemen instructor of Texas A&M College, will be the instructor on fire fighting and he will be assisted by Fred Storey, of Wichita Falls.

These two men are highly trained fire fighters and will bring the latest methods and techniques to members of the local department.

## INSPECTION DEADLINE NEARING

There are less than 20 working days left until the April 15 deadline for the new Motor Vehicle Inspection sticker," Captain Alan Johnson said this week. Captain Johnson, Service Commander for the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety, pointed out that 47 per cent of the registered motor vehicles in this county had been inspected as of March 1.

This indicates that many motorists continue to postpone having their vehicle inspected. By failing to do it now, drivers face the possibility of waiting in line at one of the state approved inspection stations as the deadline approaches.

Texas registered vehicles operated on public streets and highways after April 15 must display the 1960 Motor Vehicle Inspection sticker. Failure to do so often leads to traffic arrest for the driver without a current inspection sticker displayed on his vehicle.

## Kirk Walters Receives Honor in Cadet Corps at West Texas State

Milt Kirk Walters, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Walters of Kress and former Foard County resident, received the honor of Distinguished Basic Military Cadet or the fall semester at West Texas State College in Canyon. To receive this honor, Walters qualified by having honor grades, both academic and military science courses, and having completed the entire semester without being assessed demerits by the Military Science Department. In addition, he received a promotion in the Reserve Officers Training Corps to cadet corporal. This is the highest possible advance in rank that a freshman may gain in one semester.

Walters is also an active member of the Buffalo Bills campus organization. He was one of two freshmen men chosen to pledge the organization during the first semester.

Kirk is a 1959 graduate of Crowell High School.

Locations have been staked for two deep Foard County wildcats: Schulz & Brannan Drilling Co. spotted the No. 1 W. A. Pulliam as a 6,900-footer four miles north of Crowell. Drillsite is 660 feet from east and 1980 from south lines of section 468, block A, H&TC survey A-1003.

One mile west of Margaret, Dwight M. Ross Drilling Co. will drill its No. 1 John L. Hunter, et al, as a 6,000-foot exploration. Location is 2173 feet from west and 2446 from north lines of section 892, block A, H&TC survey.

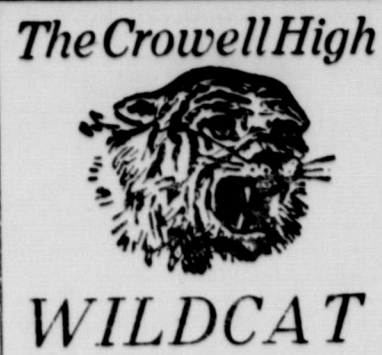

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**Drivers 25 or Under Involved in One of Three Texas Accidents**

Drivers in the age 25-or-under classification hold less than 20 percent of the valid Texas driver licenses, but a driver age 25 or under is involved in nearly one of three traffic accidents on Texas highways.

The Association of Texas Fire and Casualty Insurance Companies reported this week that on the basis of analysis of Department of Public Safety records, drivers age 25 and under were involved in 519 fatal accidents in 1958.

The ratio of involvement in both fatal accidents and total accidents was almost identical for drivers in this age bracket.

The Association studies showed that drivers in the 15-25 age bracket were involved in a substantially higher percentage of accidents than those in any other ten-year age span.

Drivers in the 15-24 age group—representing 18.3 per cent of Texas' licensed drivers—were responsible for 27.2 per cent of the accidents.

Next highest were drivers between ages 25 and 34, 25.7 per cent of the state's licensed drivers. Drivers in this bracket were involved in 23.8 per cent of the accidents.

Percentages for other brackets decline sharply: 35-44, 22.7 per cent of the drivers—18.2 per cent of the accidents; 45-55, 17.3 per cent of the drivers—14.3 per cent of the accidents.

Age group 55-65, involved in 8.6 per cent of the accidents, represents 10.6 per cent of the drivers; and the over-65 bracket represents 5.9 per cent of the drivers, is involved in 5.3 per cent of the accidents.

### The recipe for the week is:

**Frozen Lemon Torte**  
3/4 cup vanilla wafers or cookie crumbs, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 1 and 1/2 tab. grated lemon rind, 3 eggs, 1/8 tsp. salt, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup evaporated milk (chilled).

Line refrigerator tray with half the vanilla wafers or cookie crumbs. Separate egg yolks from egg whites. Beat egg yolks. Add lemon juice, lemon rind and salt and sugar. Cook, stirring constantly, in top part of double boiler over boiling water until thick.

Cool. Whip the chilled evaporated milk and add, with the stiffly beaten egg whites, to the lemon mixture. Pour mixture over the vanilla wafer crumbs in refrigerator tray and top with the remaining crumbs. Place in freezing compartment of a mechanical refrigerator. Turn temperature controls low, and allow to freeze quickly. Serve in finger widths or in squares.

## I. R. S. Explains Buying or Selling Homes Tax-wise

If you sold or bought during 1959, you will be taxed in what Henry R. Hall, Internal Revenue Service of ita Falls has to say.

"Profit on a home sale difference between what you pay for the home—plus your cost on it for permanent improvement—and your sale price.

"However," Mr. Hall adds, "you use up the profit in another home within a year, or within 18 months after you sell the old one, your profit is taxable."

The Revenue representative explained that the new home must at least equal the old home's sale price of the old home. "By adjusted sale price, meant the full sale price, commissions and the expense of decorating within 90 days of the date of your sale," Mr. Hall said.
