Mr. Wall estimates that enumerators will have to contact 438 farms in this county.

Questionnaires have already been mailed to farmers. Mr. Wall said, and they are requested to fill them out insofar as possible as soon as they can.

The Vernon branch of the Wichita Falls State Hospital is in the district of three surrounding counties. Members of the social service department of the Sorosis Club of Vernon are conducting a campaign to bring a happier Christmas to the too-often forgotten men and women of this hospital, and it is their hope that they will receive the hearty cooperation of all the people in the three counties.

The project is based on the hope that men, women and children, with a dime or dollar to spare will buy a small gift so that each patient will have a remembrance of a friend on Christmas morning. The cost of the gift is not important, but to know someone cares enough to send a gift brings a tear of joy to the eyes of a forgotten person.

It is urged that people of Foard County as a group, or as individuals, send presents, unwrapped, along with gift wrappings to Vernon State Hospital, Box 1440, Vernon, Texas, before December 18, 1959.

Articles, large or small, of almost any description, along with Christmas cards with stamped envelopes, would be appropriate. For the state does not provide money for repair of television or radio sets, a petty fund for such repairs would be appreciated.

A commissary is provided for the patients' use, but a great many of the patients do not have money to purchase these articles, and a fund for these people would be a very worthy thing.

He was a charter member of the Crowell Methodist Church, 50-year member of the Crowell Masonic Lodge, Royal Arch Chapter and Council, and Vernon Commandery, and also a member of Maskat Shrine Temple in Wichita Falls.

Mr. Sandifer was also an honorary member of the Crowell Rotary Club.

One of the projects he most loved was that of Cubmaster for Cub Scouts in this community. Along with his wife, he supported wholeheartedly the Scouting program in this community. He and Mrs. Sandifer built the Cub Hut on lots east of their residence and carried on Cub Scout work until failing health prevented it.

He is survived by his wife; two sisters, Mrs. Jessie Lee Campbell of Vernon and Mrs. Ida Chapman of Sapulpa, Okla.; three half-sisters, Mrs. Ethyl Staggs of Dallas, Mrs. Linda Carpenter of Justin and Mrs. Pauline Stewart of Dodd City; one half brother, Jack Sandifer of Brownwood; a large number of nieces and nephews, and a host of other relatives and friends.

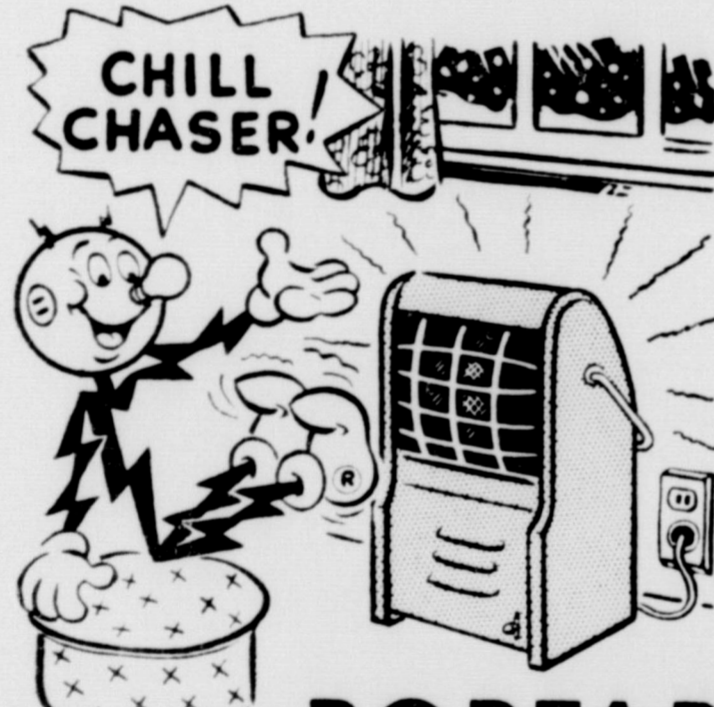

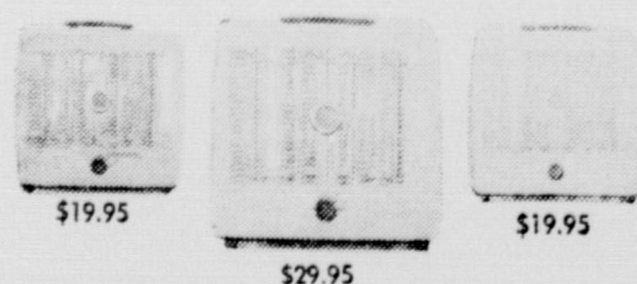

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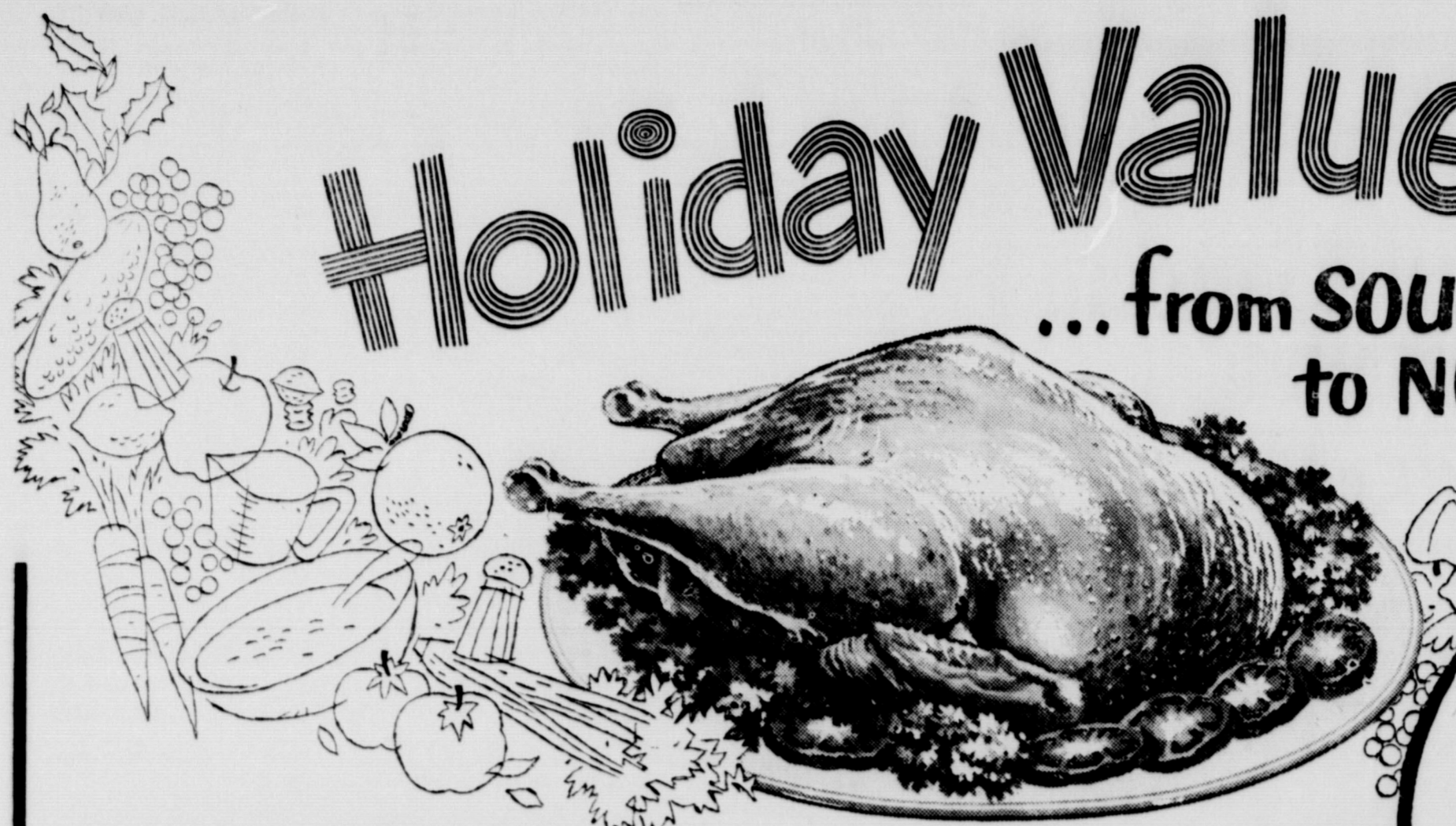

Magazine Has Interesting Duck Feature Article

If you are a duck hunter you will be interested in the illustrated article by Harold Irby, waterfowl biologist, in the November issue of Texas Game and Fish magazine.

The double-page spread "Ducks and Deductions," represents art work done by Irby himself, following his sojourn in Canada during the past summer working with duck banding crews.

He covers the subjects of nesting, migration and wintering grounds, from the big duck factory in Canada to the rice fields and plains of Texas.

Another interesting article is the "Million Dollar Male Deer," prepared by Tom Moore, wildlife biologist on the Black Gap Wildlife Management Area. This article reveals a harvest of 437 deer in 1937 compared to 5107 last season.

Other interesting articles cover underwater study of the artificial fishing reefs, a revealing short piece about oyster crabs, bird migration, squirrel hunting, the making of fish nets, and a new land use program which will include livestock and wildlife in its production.

There also is a report on white-winged dove shooting and numerous shorter articles covering fishing and other aspects of the outdoors.
