Ex-Governor Johnston is one of the most popular men of his state and is immensely wealthy.

HAYWOOD IS ACQUITTED

Jury, After Deliberating Many Hours, Says Not Guilty.

OTHERS TO HAVE TRIAL.

Governor Gooding Says the State Idaho Will Next Arraign Moyer and Pettibone, Who Were Indicted at Same Time as Man Just Tried.

Boise, Ida., July 29.-Into the bright sunlight of a beautiful Sabbath morning, into the stillness of a city drowsy with the lazy slumbers of a summer Sunday, William D. Haywood, defendant in one of the most noted trials involving conspiracy and murder that the country has ever known, walked Sunday a free man, acquitted of the murder of Governor Frank Steunen-

Governor Gooding said: "The verdict is a great surprise to me, and I believe to all citizens of Idaho, who have heard or read the evidence in the case. I have done my duty. I have ne regret as to any action I have taken, and my conscience is clear. As long as God shall give me strength I shall continue my efforts for government by law and for organized society. The state will continue a vigorous prosecution of Moyer and Pettibone and Adams and of Simpkins when apprehended. There will be no hesitation nor retreat."

It was after being out for twentyone hours that the jury, which at first had been divided eight to four, and then seemed deadlocked at ten to two, finally came to an agreement shortly Governor Gooding said: "The ver

then seemed deadlocked at ten to two, finally came to an agreement shortly after the first faint streaks of the coming day showing gray above the glant hills. The weary, snow-bearded old bailiff, who had kept an all-night vigil before the door of the jury room, was startled into action by an imperative knock from within. Events moved rapidly after this, and when the principal actors in the trial had been gathered into the court room at a few minutes before 8 o'clock the white envelope handed by the foreman to the judge was torn open and the verdict read.

read.

Tears welled to the eyes of the man who, during the eighty days of his trial, had sat with stolid indifference written upon his every feature—at last the icy armor he had thrown about himself with the first day of jury selection had been pierced, and whatever of pent up feeling had been contained within was loosed. Hawwood's attorneys were fairly lifted from their seats, and the judge made no effort to restrain them as they surrounded him to shake his hands and shout aloud their congratulations.

Mr. Richardson, when the verdict was announced, hastened to dictate a statement in which be declared that his client had been given an absolutely fair and impartial trial, and that Idaho had indeed erason to be proud of berself

that Idaho had indeed erason to be proud of herself.

Haywood's first thught was of his aged mother, who Saturday had suffered a complete nervous breakdown after the jury had retired. Leaving the court room with attorney Nugent he went to St. Luke's hospital, and, unannounced, rushed into his mother's comp. So great was the testing the second of the

unannounced, rushed into his mother's room. So great was the tonic upon the elderly lady that she was Sunday night up and about and happy.

Next Haywood went to the cottage where his wife and little daughter have been stopping. He had parted with Attorney Nugent at the hospital gate. Once home, Haywood said: "I want to thank the peopel of Boise for their kindness to my wife, my family and my friends."

There has been widespread sympathy here for Mrs. Carruthers, the prisoner's mother. Senator Borah, for instance, when first apprised of the verdict, said: "I feel glad for Haywood's mother."

Gilman, the last man to be won over to the defense, declared that a majority of the men seemed convinced that the general tone of the vinced that the general tone of the court's instructions indicated that the defendant should be freed. Finley McBean, who voted consistently for acquittal from the first, declared that the judge's instructions seemed to settle all doubt as the course he should Powell.

Juro James Robinson, the good-natured Scotchman, at whose house here in Boise Governor Steunenberg boarded for more than two years, said: "I could not reconcile myself to any other way of voting than with the defense from the very first, and I think that under the law and the evidence those was nothing else for us to do. that under the law and the evidence there was nothing else for us to do. The last fellow who held out against the acquittal belongs to the same fra-ternal order that I do. There was some talk of a compromise on a sec-ond degree verdict, but we would not stand for that."

There are many in Boise who are inclined to the opinion that a controlling influence with the jury was their disbelief of Orchard's testimony.

Said Orchard: "Well, I have done my duty. I have told the truth. I could do no more. I am ready to take any punishment that may be meted out to me for my crime, and the sooner it comes, the better."
