## CONFEDERATE REUNION

The two days reunion of the old Confederate Veterans at Baird last day and Saturday was a success considering everything. The attendance the first day was not so large as on Saturday, the day of the barbecue, there was an immense crowd estimated at six thousand people. Everything possible was done to make the old soldiers and every one else have a good time.

At 10 o'clock a. m. Friday the Baird Citizen's Band and the old soldiers gathered at the court house to form the parade to march to the grounds. The parade was different from anything ever seen in Baird. Mrs. S. T. Fraser assisted by Mrs. E. C. Fulton had drilled fifty odd little girls and taught them to sing some of the Confederate war songs. The parade was formed with the band in front, the little girls following in double file and behind them only a few ex-Confederates, as most of them did not feel like marching on foot to the grounds. John Wilson was there with the silk battle flag of the Confederacy that belongs to Camp Albert Sidney Johnston. John marched proudly with soldier-like precision as he held aloft floating in the breeze the starry cross banner that so many Confederates followed to death and to immortal fame during the four years of the civil war. All the little girls were dressed in white with white and red sashes over their shoulders and each carried a small Confederate flag.

Fourteen of the larger girls represented the fourteen Southern States named below. Arriving on the grounds they went through the program made out, singing the songs and the girls representing each of the States delivered a short speech about her State. Mrs. Fraser and Mrs. Fulton deserve great credit for the interest taken in training the little girls, which proved one of the most interesting features of the reunion.

Hon. Frank Russell delivered an address Friday, which was a masterly defense of the South and the Southern side of the great civil war. His speech seems to have been misunderstood; he did not appeal to the passion and prejudices of the people to keep alive the issues of the war, but did defend the South against unjust aspersion from certain writers and speakers in the North. We heard most of his speech and did not understand him to mean to keep alive the passions and hate engendered by the war, but on the contrary counseled amity and good will.

Col. Bently, of Abilene, was the main speaker Saturday, and while we did not hear his speech, being too unwell to attend that day we had a talk with him before he went to the grounds and know the outlines of his address. We wish every young man and young woman in Callahan county could have heard the speeches of Hon. Frank Russell and Col. Bently. Many Southern children have formed erroneous opinions about the war caused by reading histories written by Northern writers.

Right here we want to emphasize one particular point. We believe in these old Confederate Reunions, not

to keep alive the prejudices of the war but that the South may be vindicated in future history, for this is the only way it can be done. The war is over and the South wants no more of it; but the Southern people do want the world to know the real facts that caused the war and only through active organization and reunions of the old Confederates can this be accomplished. Then too it is a great pleasure for the old soldiers to get together and talk over the war. The North has its reunions and the South has a right to have theirs. The Federal government recognizes this right and does not discourage them. One president, the lamented McKinley, while president attended a Confederate Reunion at Richmond and was paid every honor possible by the old gray haired veterans. When such men as McKinley encouraged such reunions lesser men need not feel any uneasiness about them. They are not hatching rebellion or anything of the kind.

There were races and tournaments on the grounds each day and a royal good good time and lots of fun along with plenty to eat, ice water free, and red lemonade by the barrel at a moderate cost. Below we give the names of the little girls ranging in age from 7 to 17 years of age. The larger girls representing the fourteen Southern States each wore a starry crown with the name of the state represented painted on the band. The little girls all did splendidly and received much applause. Following is the names of the girls and the states they represented:

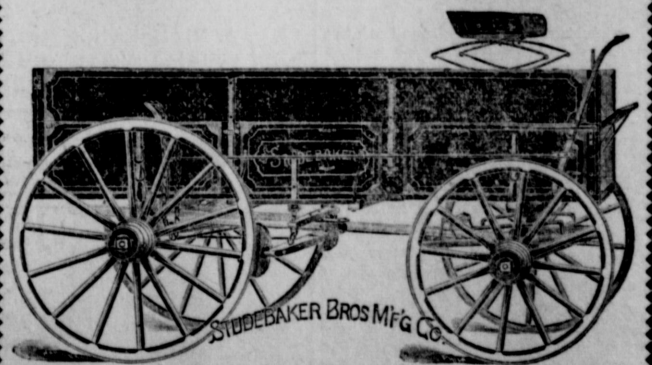

Senator Bailey addressed a large gathering at the ex-Confederate reunion at Gatesville, Tex.

During the past six months 252 marines have been secured at the five recruiting stations in Texas.

James Davidson, a lineman fell from a pole at San Antonio. Death was almost instantaneous.

Grain growers' department of the American Society of Equity will hold wheat for \$1.25 per bushel.

A few miles southeast of McKinney, Tex., J. F. Cashion realized from an acre and a half of onions \$259.

Governor Folk of Missouri addressed one of the biggest gatherings ever assembled at Waxahachie, Tex.

After thirty years' railroad service Captain J. M. Lee, lately general superintendent of the Trinity and Brazos Valley railway, has retired.

Professor C. Byrd, superintendent of the Louisiana Industrial Institute at Ruston, has been chosen superintendent of Shreveport's city schools.

Tax rolls of Scurry county, Texas, show valuations of \$4,344,000, an increase over last year of about \$1,500,000.

Unknown wretches turned over about 100 tombstones in Sprague Street cemetery, Shreveport, breaking forty.

Conductor Walter Hanney of the Houston and Texas Central railway was overcome by heat and came near dying.

Dr. Minor of Errick, Okla., was shot twice. A third bullet hit his watch, which he carried over his heart. His wounds are not serious.

While being taken to the Muskogee Federal jail Walter Oprey jumped from a Katy train near Porter, I. T., and sustained fatal injuries.

The eleven-story Memphis Cold Storage and Warehouse company was fire gutted. Fireman Hiskey met his death by falling into the cellar.

The remains of an unknown man with three bullets in his body and neck and ears severed were found in a boxcar at Chickasha, I. T.

The two little children of C. J. Schung of near Darlington, Okla., were found fast asleep in a coyote lair. They had wandered away from home.

Chairman Carden has appointed Will A. Morris of San Antonio the successor of the late Jot Gunter as a member of the Democratic state executive committee.

W. E. Welsh, Frisco agent at Tulsa, who was ground to pieces by a locomotive, left his widow \$9,000 life insurance. His body was interred at Honmouth, Ill.

A fast Frisco freight train was wrecked near Tulsa, I. T. The loss is estimated at \$50,000. Waller Morgan was hurled through a caboose window and badly hurt.



## ETTUS PASSES AWAY.

### Senator Breathes His Last After Brief Illness.

Spring, N. C., July 29.—While at breakfast in a local hotel E. W. Pettus of Alabama was stricken with apoplexy and expired a few hours afterward. His grandfather Miss Bessie Roberts, was with him when the end came. Senator Winston Pettus was born in Limestone county, Alabama, July 21. He was a lieutenant in the Mexican war. In 1849 he went to California horseback. Returning to his native state, he became, in 1858, a citizen of Selma, his home ever since.

During the civil war he entered the Twentieth Alabama infantry as a lieutenant and became lieutenant colonel, participating in many battles. In 1897 he was elected United States senator, re-elected in 1903 and again for the term expiring in 1915.

The last Democratic state convention of Alabama, owing to Senators Morgan and Pettus being so aged, endorsed ex-Congressman Bankhead as the former's successor, and Governor Joseph E. Johnston of Birmingham the latter's. Shortly after Senator Morgan's death, two months ago, Governor Comer appointed Mr. Bankhead and the legislature, which is overwhelmingly Democratic, formally elected him. Ex-Governor Johnston is one of the most popular men of his state and is immensely wealthy.

### BURIAL BESIDE FATHER.

#### Body of Late Jot Gunter's Daughter Sent to San Antonio.

Sherman, July 25.—The body of the late Mrs. John Hardie, formerly Miss Eula Gunter, the only child of the late Jot Gunter and wife, who died two years ago and was interred here, has been disinterred and shipped to San Antonio for burial beside her father. The remains, which were interred in a sealed casket were found in good condition. Mrs. Hardie, who was the wife of John Hardie, a prominent citizen of Dallas, left three children, who since their mother's death have been under the care of Mrs. Gunter, their grandmother.

### MUCH MONEY MISSING.

#### Considerable Cash Disappears From Express Office.

Paris, Tex., July 29.—A package containing \$5,500 has disappeared from the Wells-Fargo express office here. It was sent from Dallas and consigned to the City National bank of this city. A warrant was issued for the arrest of a party who has taken his departure.

### DUG UP AND BURNED.

#### Summary Vengeance Upon Corpse of a Lynched Negro.

Crisfield, Mo., July 30.—Inflamed with passion, which seemed to increase after the lynching of James Reed, the negro murderer of Policeman John H. Daugherty, the mob put the negro to death and buried the body in a swamp at the edge of this town, returned to the spot Monday, dug up the body amid yells and curses and burned it after riddling the corpse with bullets. Hundreds of indignant citizens gathered in the streets, excitedly discussing to affair and it is feared by many that a race war will ensue.

### CANNOT GO OUTSIDE.

#### Pollard Makes Important Ruling in Matter of Saloon License.

Dallas, July 29.—County Attorney Jewelling has received a ruling from Assistant Attorney General Pollard to the effect that County Judge Lively has no authority to issue licenses to parties desiring to operate saloons outside of the limits prescribed by the charter of the city of Dallas. This ruling will affect a number of persons in this city.

### Many Made Ill in Prison.

City of Mexico, July 30.—Poisoned food made 154 prisoners in Belen prison ill, some seriously.

### Shot Four Times.

Memphis, July 30.—Harry Rice was

shot four times by an unknown person and seriously injured.

### Gas Struck.

Mineral Wells, Tex., July 26.—In digging a well in the Boykin addition gas was struck at a depth of forty feet.

### Considerable Agitating.

Seoul, July 26.—Considerable agitation is prevalent in Korea.

### Over Five Thousand Visitors.

Galveston, July 30.—Over 5,000 visitors were here Sunday.

### ORRICK'S POSITION.

#### Declares Fort Worth Commission Form of Government Illegal.

Fort Worth, July 29.—Claiming that the commission government of Fort Worth is unconstitutional; that all ordinances are illegal; that the commissioners themselves are usurpers; that they were illegally put in office; that they were not nominated according to law; that no other elective officers of the city were nominated or elected according to law and that he is city attorney of Fort Worth, former City Attorney Orrick is preparing a petition to a suit that he will file to oust the present commissioners and have himself declared city attorney. Mr. Orrick has had the matter under consideration ever since the present form of government was established and has made a careful study of points of law involved.

### Mrs. Lucinda Morton Gone.

Indianapolis, July 29.—Mrs. Lucinda Morton, widow of the late Oliver P. Morton, war governor of Indiana, is dead.

### Livery Stable Destroyed.

Bryan, Tex., July 30.—The livery stable of Reynolds & Edge was destroyed by fire. Horses were saved. The loss is about \$4000.

### But One Felony Inmate.

Hallettsville, Tex., July 30.—There is but one inmate of the Lavaca county jail charged with a felony.

### Hot at Gainesville.

Gainesville, Tex., July 30.—At 10 o'clock Sunday the thermometer registered 104 degrees.

What does Japan want to lick Uncle Sam for anyway?

Several Texas cities are pulling hard for the Diamond jubilee to be pulled off in 1911.

The Putnam News has suspended publication again and Mr. Burkett has moved the plant to Clyde.

It would pay the merchants to spend five thousand dollars every year in building gravel roads leading out into the country.

The pros are going into court, and we might well remember the song, "I Don't Know Where I am Going but I am on My Way."

Some people have a yearning and consuming desire to make the "other fellow" good. Goodness like charity, out to begin at home.

The name of the Clyde Progress has been changed to the Clyde Sun and the material of the Putnam News moved to Clyde to be used in publishing the new paper.

If all the pros and antis would quit using liquor as a beverage the saloons would all have to close without any law. Possibly no one ever thought of this is the reason we mention it.

Russia took a leading part in the first Peace Conference at the Hague and the war with Japan soon followed. There is another Peace Conference with Uncle Sam as the chief exponent of Peace. Is history going to repeat itself with Uncle Sam substituted for Russia?

The pros have filed, or are preparing to file mandamus proceedings against Judge Russell to compel him to begin the publication of the prohibition notice at once. The Court instructed Judge Russell to begin publication the first week in September. Nothing is believed will be gained by the suit and may be the cause of another tangle not easily unraveled.

Canada joins the United States on the north which is a guarantee that Japan will get little sympathy from John Bull in a row with Uncle Sam. Johnny don't like your Uncle Samuel any too well, but Johnny B. knows his own interest better than any one else. The loss of Canada would not compensate England for the friendship of any slippery Oriental race like the Japanese, and they realize this.

The Federal Court got into deep water in North Carolina in trying to override the State Courts in the matter of railroad rates and had to back out. It was as palpable unjustified attack upon the sovereignty of a State as was ever perpetrated and the President acted wisely in settling the dispute. The rights of one state is the concern of all and the national administration is not prepared for such a fight just now.

In reply to an article in THE STAR to the effect that business rivalry, and not any desire to help the morals of Baird was back of the overwhelming pro vote at Clyde, the Sun says: "Now Brother STAR we kindly suggest that no good can come of trying to array one town or community against an other. There is room on the map for all."

All of which sounds very nice, but we will kindly suggest to the Sun that if it wants peace and wants to deal fairly with Baird and other towns it will not seek as it has done, to force an obnoxious law on them. The people of Baird believe they are capable of running their own affairs without the advice of Clyde or any one else. The people of Clyde have a legal right to force prohibition upon Baird, but people have many legal rights that fair and unprejudiced persons never use when the exercise of such rights will vex or injure a neighbor. For instance when Clyde held a local option election neither THE STAR nor any one in Baird tried in any way to influence the result, at least we heard of none. But the people of Clyde have been the most persistent of any community in the county in trying to run prohibition over Baird. Now there are lots of good people in Clyde and, no doubt many of them have become convinced that it is to the moral and religious welfare of Baird to make Baird a prohibition town. Abilene and Cisco both have lots of the same kind of people and all want to make us good by law whether we agree with them or not.

We believe the people of Eula, Eagle Cove, Tecumseh, Oplin, Dressy Admiral, Cross Plaihs, Cottonwood and Putnam are just as much interested in the welfare of the county as the people of Clyde. Yeta majority of these towns voted to let Baird control her local affairs in her own way while Clyde by a majority of nearly four to one voted to make Baird pro. If the Sun and the people of Clyde have the proper conception of right, morality and religion why is it that people in other towns can see it in that light?

Now as to stirring up strife between Baird and Clyde, will say that we have been publishing a paper in Callahan county for twenty years and no man in the county can truthfully make any such charge against us. Everyone in Baird and Clyde knows THE STAR did not misrepresent the facts when it said business rivalry was the main cause of that big pro vote at Clyde. There are some there who are above such things and they proved it by voting to let Baird control its own affairs. All honor to them. They will see the right of local self government vindicated yet. As to those who voted pro, even if actuated by business motives, we have no words of censure. We have some mighty good friends among them and they know that THE STAR has always been the friend of the town. Our correspondents there all know that we placed no restrictions upon them. The late Col. J. T. Sutton was for a long time our correspondent and we published a letter nearly every week for him and all know he was a pretty good town booster. We believe in building up every town in the county and would like to have a correspondent in every one of them. THE STAR is for its own town first of course, but we have never thrown any bricks at other towns unless they begin the racket.

To override the will of a majority of the people in a rival town may seem of no importance to the Sun when it is done in the name of philanthropy, but just the same it is contrary to every principle of local self government. If this can be done in prohibition it can be done in other things and this theory carried out to its last analysis will destroy every principle of government

contended for by the democratic party from the foundation of the government to the present time. Such theories prompts federal judges to override state laws, as they have recently done in Texas and North Carolina, but thanks to public sentiment that became aroused the Federal Court had to back out in North Carolina.

No, THE STAR prefers peace and good will with all neighboring towns and agrees with the Sun that there is room on the map for all, but when a rival town attempts to wipe Baird off the map for philanthropic reasons THE STAR is going to be heard from. Get all the trade you can and we will do the same and this can be done without attempting to correct the morals of other towns. If the time ever comes that we have to advocate measures that will cripple some other town in order to help Baird we will step down and out of the newspaper business.

We will call the attention of the Sun to the fact that the pros at Baird have always contended that prohibition will help Baird Baird. In 1904 they used forcible arguments to prove this; but a secret circular was issued signed by the Local Option committee appealing to the country towns to vote the saloons out of Baird by assuring them that it would increase the trade of the country towns as much of the trade come to Baird by reason of the saloons that otherwise would go to other towns. The circular was distributed in the country towns a few days before the election. A pretty shrewd scheme was it not? Rev. J. D. Odom, who took an active part in the campaign, when taxed with the inconsistency of the pros on this subject treated the matter as a good joke on the antis, which it no doubt was.

As to the moral side THE STAR has always said that if prohibition would do the good claimed no one who believed in morality and good government could afford to put up the loss of revenue and trade in the scales against it, but when one has every reason to believe that his town will not gain morally by the change he is justified in opposing prohibition, the New England fad that is deadlier than a door nail in the place of its birth, when applied under all conditions. Prohibition, like every other ism, will run its day in Texas just as it has in the north.

## MRS. BLANCHARD DIES.

Wife of Louisiana's Chief Executive Passes Away At

### CITY OF MINERAL WELLS.

While Her Husband, During His Sixteen Years' Congressional Career, Was at Washington Departed Lady Was Prominent in Society.

New Orleans, July 27.—Dispatches received here from Mineral Wells, Tex., announce the death there Saturday morning of Mrs. Newton C. Blanchard, wife of the governor of Louisiana. Mrs. Blanchard had been in ill health for over a year and it was on this account that she and Governor Blanchard recently went to Mineral Wells.

Mrs. Blanchard before her marriage was Miss Barrett of Caddo parish. During the time her husband was a member of the national house of representatives and later of the United States senate, covering a period of sixteen years, she was a prominent figure in Washington social life.

### SHOCKING SUICIDE.

Husband's Lack of Praise Cause of Fearful Death.

Little Rock, July 25.—Angered because her husband refused to praise her for saving money on the purchase at a store, and heavy sales during the morning, Mrs. Ann Lowe poured a gallon of coal oil on her head, told her little daughter to watch and see the show and set fire to the oil. Mrs. Lowe's body was burned to a crisp. Relatives were attracted by the child's screams. Lowe is a laborer and his wife conducted a store while he was away at work.

### DEEDS OF DEVIL.

Attacks Five Little Girls, Ripping Stomachs Open.

Berlin, July 25.—A fiendish and atrocious criminal made his appearance on the streets Friday and five little girls are his victims. The man approached the children on the streets and by a deft stroke ripped open their stomachs with a knife. One of the children is dead. Each one of the crimes was committed in different localities, in the northern and eastern part. He is presumed to be a madman. The entire police force was aroused and are making every effort to capture the man. He approached his victims rapidly, one after another, he seized a child with hand and slashed rapidly with some sharp instrument held in the other.

### PLATFORM PLEDGES.

Governor Says They Have Been Substantially Complied With.

Cooper, Tex., July 26.—Over 5,000 people attended the Farmers' Union picnic. Governor Campbell was the principal speaker. In his remarks the executive said the legislature had practically passed all the platform demands of the Democrats of Texas. He declared a war is being waged on trusts. During his address the platform, which was heavily crowded, fell to the ground. No one was seriously hurt. The governor concluded his speech from a wagon.

### AGED LADY GONE.

Mrs. Obedience T. Lubbock Departs This Life at Bayou City.

Houston, July 27.—Mrs. Obedience T. Lubbock, aged ninety years, and for sixty years a resident of Houston, died at her home here Friday night. Deceased was the wife of Colonel T. R. Lubbock of the Elghth Texas cavalry, who died at Bowling Green, Ky., in 1862. She was a niece of former Governor Lubbock, and had a large family connection in this city.

### BADLY FLEEED.

Colonel McAlester Swindled Out of Ten Thousand Dollars.

South McAlester, July 30.—Through the substitution of a brass brick for a gold one, on which a stranger had worked on the sympathies of Colonel J. J. McAlester the latter is out \$19,000, and this had been put up as security, but its owner managed to substitute a bogus one and got away before the imposition as discovered.

### AGREEMENT ARRIVED AT.

New Rate to Be Put in Effect Pending Adjudication in Court.

Raleigh, N. C., July 30.—By an agreement entered into between the state and the Southern and Atlantic Coast Line railways, pending final settlement in the courts, the 2 1-2-cent railroad rate is to be put into effect not later than Aug. 8.

### Dies After Brief Illness.

Sherman, July 25.—W. W. Sturgis, formerly a banker at Hillsboro, and

lately a prosperous furniture dealer at Denison and Sherman died here just before noon Thursday after a short illness. He was fifty-three years of age. He leaves a widow and three children.

### Nine Killed in Argentina.

Buenos Ayers, July 26.—In a riot at Bahla Blanca between harbor strikers and the police nine men were killed and many injured.

### Drops Dead.

Clarksville, Tex., July 26.—While building a hog pen near Rosalie, this county, Lewis Elison dropped dead.

### TEST CASE.

Endeavor Being Made to Learn Meaning of Law.

Galveston, July 30.—Whether or not the unexpired saloon license under the old law is valid is the substance of a question submitted to Judge J. K. P. Gillespie on a habeas corpus proceeding.

A. H. Hobson, doing business at the northeast corner of Twenty-fifth and L, was arrested on the charge of pursuing the occupation of selling liquor without a license. Immediately he applied to the Criminal district court for habeas corpus. The matter was submitted to Judge Gillespie, who had come down from Houston for the purpose. Pending the decision Hobson was released under \$100 bond.

### BOUND AND GAGGED.

Bold Bandits Rob Mrs. Elliott of Cash and Jewelry.

Fort Worth, July 30.—Two miscreants entered the rooming house of Mrs. Rosa Elliott. Binding a towel over her face and mouth, tying her hands behind her and tying her feet together, the men secured a diamond ring valued at \$175, a gold watch, other jewelry and \$25 in cash and departed. Her husband found Mrs. Elliott in this condition unconscious.

### BAKED TO DEATH.

Scorching Sun Too Much For the Boll Weevil Grub.

Baton Rouge, July 30.—Enormous numbers of boll weevil grubs have been baked to death by the scorching sun of the past two weeks, according to the state crop pest commissioners' report. The heat has done more good than harm in Louisiana, killing so many grubs as to make prospects of a fair crop in sections where the outlook was the worst. The baking of the weevil grubs has occurred wherever the squares have fallen out between the rows.

### GAS AND OIL BLOWOUT.

It Is Thought a Valuable Field Has Been Discovered.

Houston, July 26.—While boring for artesian water on the Beasley place, near Laporte a gas and oil blowout occurred. The derrick and machinery were wrecked. Efforts will soon be made to develop what is believed to be a profitable oil field.

### SEVEN RESIDENCES BURN.

Oak Cliff Section of Dallas Suffers Severe Fire Loss.

Dallas, July 29.—As the result of a fire in the Oak Cliff section of the city seven residences, some of them costly structures, and most of their contents, were entirely destroyed Saturday morning. Five of the dwellings were two stories high. Loss is about \$15,000. An oil explosion was the cause.

### MIRACULOUS ESCAPE.

M. Hartman Drops Nine Stories, but Is Not Even Hurt.

Dallas, July 26.—An elevator containing M. Hartman, who weighs 200 pounds, fell from the ninth floor of the Praetorian building to the ground. The elevator was broken. Mr. Hartman, who was uninjured, calmly proceeded to repair the damage.

### REMOVAL IN AUGUST.

Headquarters of Texas Farmers' Union Soon to Be at Fort Worth.

Fort Worth, July 26.—Announcement was made that headquarters of the Farmers' Union will be moved from Dallas to this city prior to the annual meeting Aug. 8. Temporary headquarters, it is stated, will be opened in the rooms of the factory club.

### Fall Breaks Neck.

San Antonio, July 30.—John C. Roberts, Confederate veteran, was instantly killed by falling off the second-story gallery. He was leaning against the banister, when it gave way, precipitating him to the street. His neck was broken and his skull shattered.

### Barber Board Organized.

Austin, July 30.—The barber examining board met here and organized as follows: J. H. Halley of Colorado City, president; V. H. Kleabe of Austin, secretary, and W. M. McKowen of Martin, treasurer.

### Transferred to School Fund.

Austin, July 30.—Two hundred thou-

sand dollars were transferred from the general revenue fund to the available school fund. There is still about \$450,000 in the general revenue fund.

### Wells-Fargo Sues Santa Fe.

Houston, July 30.—In district court the Wells-Fargo Express company has filed suit against the Santa Fe railway specific performance of contract.

### Baby Born on Train.

Corsicana, Tex., July 30.—A baby was born on a Trinity and Brazos Valley train. Mother and child are at a local hotel.

### Slays Spouse, Then Suicides.

Tulsa, I. T., July 30.—In a fit of jealous anger, J. D. Stackhouse, proprietor of a restaurant, shot and killed his wife, then committed suicide.

### Temporary Relief.

Monroe, La., July 30.—Temporary relief from the ice famine was had Monday on the arrival of ice from New Orleans.

### Mayor of Abilene Resigns.

Abilene, Tex., July 25.—Mayor Weaver has resigned.

### TRULY TORRID.

McGregor Heads the List a la Hot Weather.

Houston, July 29.—A dispatch from McGregor says that the most terrific heat visitation ever known there was experienced Sunday, which was endured about an hour and twenty minutes. The thermometer registered 179 in the sun, and 117 in the shade. An area three miles long and two miles wide was affected, and the visitation was accompanied by a peculiar haze, hanging like a veil in the sky, which moved over the area affected.

Brassy tastes appeared in people's mouths and there was an incipient panic. Score of people were overcome, and horses, cattle, hogs, and poultry dropped dead in their tracks, one man losing thirty-five head of stock. The phenomenon has not been explained.

### GRIEF AND SORROW.

Henry Huntington Hardy Realizes His Terrible Deeds.

Versailles, July 30.—Grief and sorrow reigned Monday in the residence, near Neptune park, of the stricken Huntington family where, Sunday night, Henry Huntington, son of Major Douglas St. George Huntington, shot down his two sisters and two brothers at the moment the members of the family gathered around the death-bed of the father. Major Huntington is breathing his last. The condition of Elizabeth and Alonzo Huntington is declared to be desperate, although not hopeless, the wounds inflicted upon Edith and Douglas Huntington not being grave. Mrs. Huntington, the mother, is completely prostrated from the shock and confined to her bed. A few blocks away Henry, who is regarded by his family and friends as demented, is in jail. He is dazed and confused and hardly realizes the terrible things he did.

Major Huntington is one of the best known Americans in Paris and he and his family have long taken a prominent part in the social and official gaiety of the French capital. He is a retired army officer, and prior to taking up his residence abroad lived at Chicago, where he was an associate of those prominent in army and business circles. In his career he became well known by his after-dinner speeches at the American club, of which he was one of the organizers and recently president. Major Huntington and family always took a leading part in social functions at the American embassy.

### DESPERATE BALL.

Fatally Shoots Wife, Wounds Her Sister and Suicides.

Ardmore, July 29.—While temporarily insane because his wife refused to live with him, Edgar Ball, a tie-maker at the Rock Island tie camp near Wapanucka, fatally shot his wife, shot his wife's sister through the right thigh and killed himself by firing a bullet through his heart. Ball was aged nineteen, his wife seventeen and his wife's sister fourteen. Physicians say Mrs. Ball cannot recover.

### CONDUCTOR MUST GET BUSY.

Those Not Actually at Work When Traveling Must Pay Fare.

Austin, July 29.—Answering an inquiry from Representative Charles A. Graham of Hill county, Assistant Attorney General Hawkins held that not even a conductor on a railroad train can ride free under the anti-free pass law except when such conductor is actually engaged in the discharge of his duties. It is also illegal for such conductor to ride free when going from one place to another to enter upon his duties as such conductor, Graham besides being a member of the legislature is a railroad conductor.

Dewitt C. Webster, one of the owners of the Floto-Sells shows is here conferring with officials in regard to the anti-pass law. He says that under this act, and ruling on act by railroad commission practically all circuses will be shut out of Texas. He will carry out contracts this year, but may not try to come to Texas again.

**HAYWOOD IS ACQUITTED**

**Jury, After Deliberating Many  
Hours, Says Not Guilty.**

**OTHERS TO HAVE TRIAL.**

**Governor Gooding Says the State of  
Idaho Will Next Arraign Moyer and  
Pettibone, Who Were Indicted at  
Same Time as Man Just Tried.**

Boise, Ida., July 29.—Into the bright  
sunlight of a beautiful Sabbath morn-  
ing, into the stillness of a city drowsy  
with the lazy slumbers of a summer  
Sunday, William D. Haywood, defend-  
ant in one of the most noted trials in-  
volving conspiracy and murder that  
the country has ever known, walked  
Sunday a free man, acquitted of the  
murder of Governor Frank Steunenberg.

Governor Gooding said: "The ver-  
dict is a great surprise to me, and I  
believe to all citizens of Idaho, who  
have heard or read the evidence in  
the case. I have done my duty. I  
have no regret as to any action I have  
taken, and my conscience is clear. As  
long as God shall give me strength  
I shall continue my efforts for govern-  
ment by law and for organized society.  
The state will continue a vigorous  
prosecution of Moyer and Pettibone  
and Adams and of Simpkins when ap-  
prehended. There will be no hesita-  
tion nor retreat."

It was after being out for twenty-  
one hours that the jury, which at first  
had been divided eight to four, and  
then seemed deadlocked at ten to two,  
finally came to an agreement shortly  
after the first faint streaks of the  
coming day showing gray above the  
great hills. The weary, snow-bearded  
old bailiff, who had kept an all-night  
vigil before the door of the jury room,  
was startled into action by an impera-  
tive knock from within. Events moved  
rapidly after this, and when the  
principal actors in the trial had been  
gathered into the court room at a few  
minutes before 8 o'clock the white en-  
velope handed by the foreman to the  
judge was torn open and the verdict  
read.

Tears welled to the eyes of the man  
who, during the eighty days of his  
trial, had sat with stolid indifference  
written upon his every feature—at  
last the icy armor he had thrown  
about himself with the first day of  
jury selection had been pierced, and  
whatever of pent up feeling had been  
contained within was loosed. Hay-  
wood's attorneys were fairly lifted  
from their seats, and the judge made  
no effort to restrain them as they  
surrounded him to shake his hands and  
shout aloud their congratulations.

Mr. Richardson, when the verdict  
was announced, hastened to dictate a  
statement in which he declared that  
his client had been given an abso-  
lutely fair and impartial trial, and  
that Idaho had indeed erasion to be  
proud of herself.

Haywood's first thought was of his  
aged mother, who Saturday had suf-  
fered a complete nervous breakdown  
after the jury had retired. Leaving  
the court room with Attorney Nugent  
he went to St. Luke's hospital, and,  
unannounced, rushed into his mother's  
room. So great was the tonic upon  
the elderly lady that she was Sunday  
night up and about and happy.

Next Haywood went to the cottage  
where his wife and little daughter  
have been stopping. He had parted  
with Attorney Nugent at the hospital  
gate. Once home, Haywood said: "I  
want to thank the people of Boise for  
their kindness to my wife, my family  
and my friends."

There has been widespread sym-  
pathy here for Mrs. Carruthers, the pris-  
oner's mother. Senator Borah, for in-  
stance, when first apprised of the ver-  
dict, said: "I feel glad for Haywood's  
mother."

Inquiry among the jurors after their  
dismissal revealed some of the ele-  
ments entering into their decision.  
Samuel D. Gilman, the last man to be  
won over to the defense, declared that  
a majority of the men seemed con-  
vinced that the general tone of the  
court's instructions indicated that the  
defendant should be freed. Finley Mc-  
Bean, who voted consistently for ac-  
quittal from the first, declared that  
the judge's instructions seemed to set-  
tle all doubt as the course he should  
take.

Juror James Robinson, the good-na-  
tured Scotchman, at whose house here  
in Boise Governor Steunenberg board-  
ed for more than two years, said:  
"I could not reconcile myself to any  
other way of voting than with the de-  
fense from the very first, and I think  
that under the law and the evidence  
there was nothing else for us to do.  
The last fellow who held out against  
the acquittal belongs to the same frat-  
ernal order that I do. There was some  
talk of a compromise on a second  
degree verdict, but we would not  
stand for that."

There are many in Boise who are  
inclined to the opinion that a control-  
ling influence with the jury was their  
disbelief of Orchard's testimony.

Said Orchard: "Well, I have done  
my duty. I have told the truth. I  
could do no more. I am ready to take  
any punishment that may be meted  
out to me for my crime, and the soon-  
er it comes, the better."

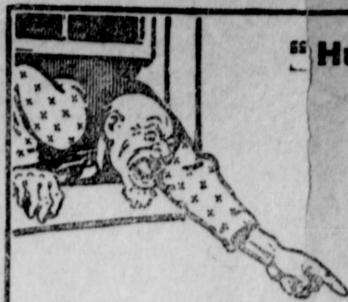
