Funeral Services for Hugh Eubank Conducted Monday

Gilliland Resident Died Saturday in Crowell Hospital

Funeral services for Hugh Eubank, 65, were held at 2:30 p. m. Monday from the Truscott Baptist Church with Rev. Floyd Bailey of Knox City and Rev. Dick Williams of Gilliland officiating. Burial was in the Truscott Cemetery under the direction of Womack Funeral Home.

A resident of Gilliland, Mr. Eubank died on January 2 at 11 a. m. in the Crowell hospital of a heart attack.

Born May 14, 1894, Mr. Eubank moved to Truscott in 1900. He later moved to Gilliland where he became engaged in farming and stock raising.

A conglomerate pay formation was struck last week in Dwight M. Ross Drilling Co., Wichita Falls No. 1 S. B. Middlebrook. Pay is at 6545 feet, and during an initial test, gave a 24-hour flowing potential of 180 barrels of over 40 gravity crude from the 6 feet of pay.

Work continues this week on the well which is 2173 feet from east and 467 feet from south lines of section 431, block A, H&TC survey.

According to reports, an offset test will soon be drilled on Statter & Zeigler land adjoining the Middlebrook place.

RAINFALL FOR 1959 BELOW PAR

A slow drizzling rain which fell over this section all day Thursday brought a total of .28 inch of moisture here. This brings the yearly total for the government gauge to a total of 21.70 inches, which is below the yearly average of 24.70 inches.

This is slightly more than was recorded in 1958 when 21.58 inches fell and far short of the 1957 total of 36.36 inches.

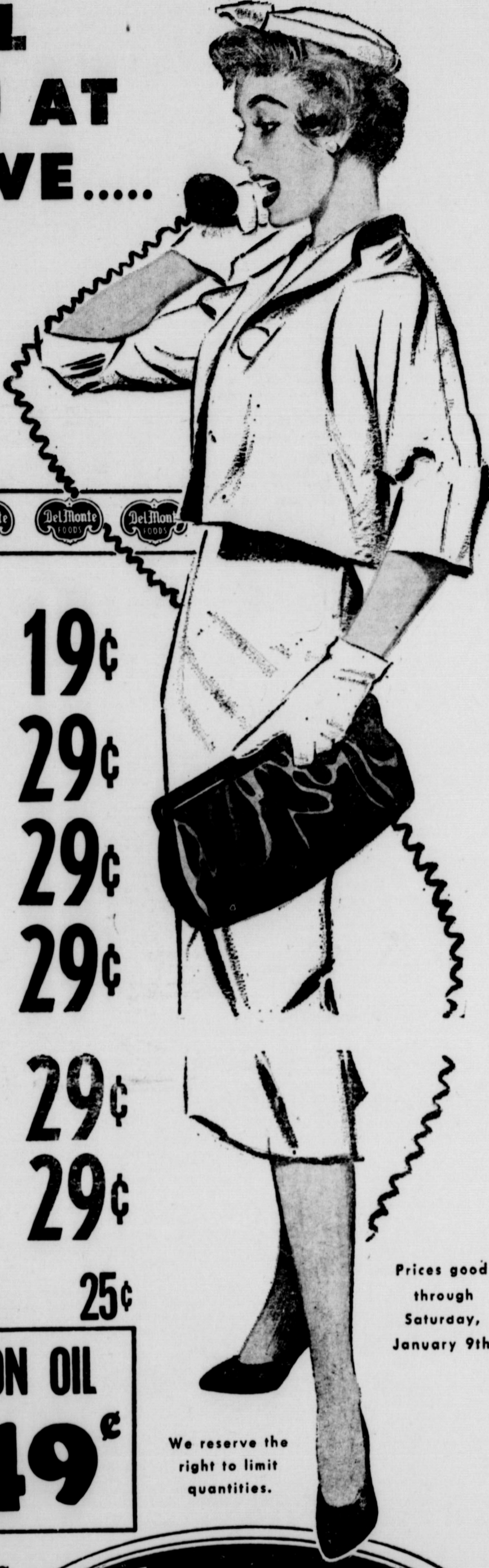

Removing Death's Threat

During World War II, Germany dropped 71, 270 tons of bombs on Britain, killing 60,959 civilians and wounding 86,128 others. The menace is still not over, for thousands of bombs buried themselves in soft mud and clay without exploding.

The removal of these is the responsibility of a highly trained army squad led by Sgt. Arthur Harley. So far the unit has dug up and rendered harmless 47,500 unexploded bombs, and still handles 200 emergency calls each year.

Recently one job called for the removal of a 2,000 pound blockbuster embedded near London's Hungerford railroad bridge. The bomb was hauled out by crane and transported by truck 40 miles away, where it was exploded safely.

England owes a great debt to these men who risk their lives that others may be freed from the threat of death.

All have a greater debt to the One who frees from death itself. To accomplish this Jesus Christ not only risked His life—He gave it, "that through death he might destroy him that had the power of death . . . and deliver them who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage." (Hebrews 2:14, 15).

Now the person who believes in Christ may look beyond the grave, knowing that he has everlasting life. "Whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die." (John 11:26).

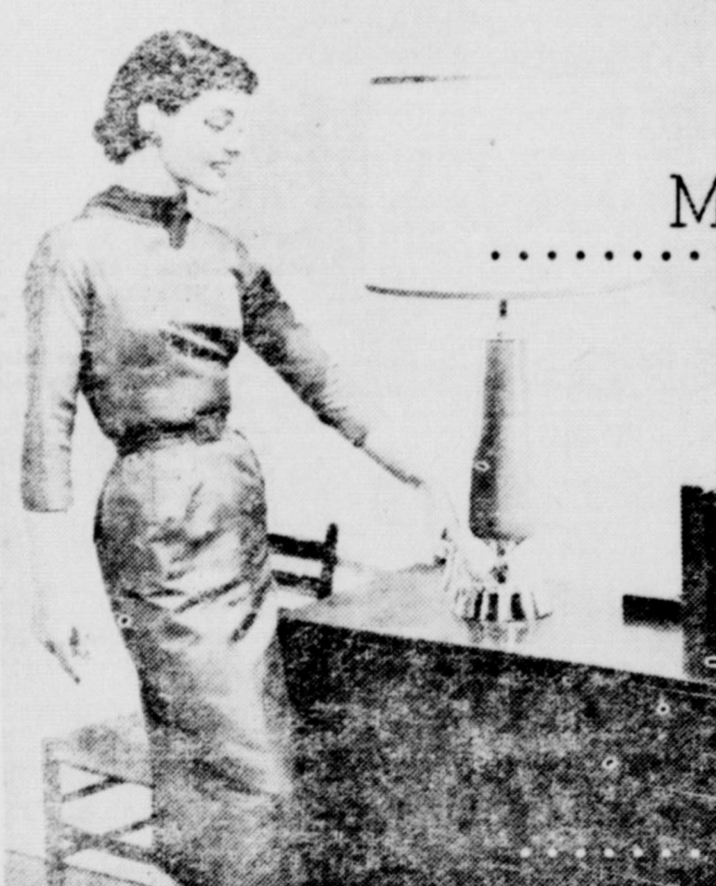

Home Demonstration Notes VIRGINIA JACKSON

Changing temperature, fatigue, too much food or not the right kind, tension and excitement, all are factors in lowering body resistance to the common cold.

It is important to start family members with a good, wholesome breakfast every day. Then follow through with wholesome, balanced meals at noon and at night.

Here is a recipe for a change at breakfast. Goldenrod Eggs 6 hard cooked eggs, 1 1/2 cups medium white sauce, 4 slices hot buttered toast.

Add chopped egg whites to white sauce; pour over toast. Press egg yolks through sieve; sprinkle over creamed whites on toast. If desired, add part of egg yolks to sauce, reserving 1 or 2 to sieve for top.

White Sauce: Melt 2 tablespoons butter or margarine in the upper part of a double boiler over low heat. Add 2 tablespoons enriched flour; blend together.

Add 1 cup milk, stirring constantly. Cook till thick and smooth, stirring constantly. Add about 1/4 tsp. salt, dash pepper. Cover, cook 5 to 8 minutes. Makes 1 cup sauce.

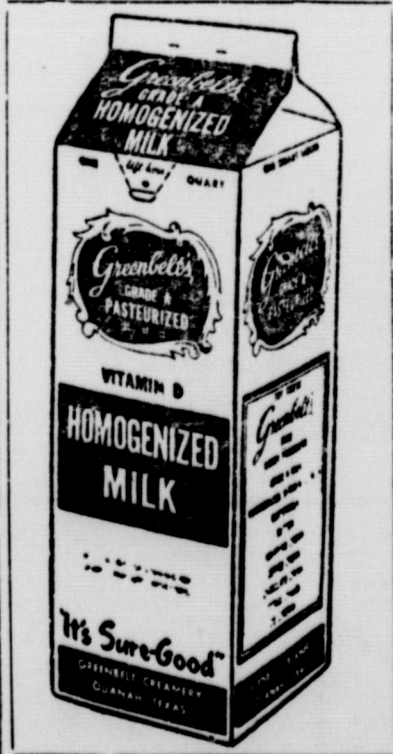
