## W. W. Kimsey, 92, Died in Grand Prairie Sunday

### Funeral Services Held at Methodist Church Here Tuesday

W. W. Kimsey, resident of Foard County for many years before moving to Grand Prairie a few years ago, died in that city Sunday, Sept. 8, after a long period of declining health. Mr. Kimsey was 92 years old at the time of his death.

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the Crowell Methodist Church conducted by Rev. John Fitzgerrald, pastor, and Rev. Glenn Willson, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery directed by Womack Funeral Home.

William Wilkerson Kimsey was born August 19, 1871, in Hiawasee, Towns County, Georgia. He married Miss Caroline Elizabeth Bell in Foard County on April 15, 1894. Mrs. Kimsey died in July, 1947. To this union five children were born. Four of the children preceded their father in death.

Survivors include one son, Lawrence Kimsey of Carrollton; three grandchildren, Joe Don Brown of Crowell, Miss Bette Shaw Kimsey of Fort Worth, and Dr. Larry R. Kimsey of Grand Prairie; and 5 great grandchildren.

## 4.32 Inches Rain Falls Here During Summer Months

During the next four months, Foard County will have to receive over 10 inches of moisture if the average yearly rainfall of 24.50 inches is achieved here. Up to Sept. 1, the county had received a total of 14.08 inches, only 4.32 of which fell during June, July and August. June was the heaviest rain-receiving month this summer when 3.56 inches fell. July received .36 inch and August did little better with .40 inch.

The Hawks scored first on a 2-yard plunge of 200-pound fullback Terry May. This score came late in the first quarter. It was set up by a blocked punt that was due to a bad pass from center. However, the Hawks had completely dominated this entire period.

It was the Wildcats' ball game all the way after this initial quarter. Although the Crowell team could never muster a passing threat, it was in this department that really cost the Hawks the game. Crowell scored one touchdown on its only offensive completion of the evening, scored another on an intercepted pass and set up another score via this route. In fact, the alert Cats picked off four miscue passes in the game. The big one resulting in a touchdown came when defensive right halfback Rickey Tra-week intercepted and scampered 67 yards back down field for a touchdown that broke a 6-6 tie. This happened 3 minutes deep in the third quarter. Crowell's first touchdown came in the second quarter on a three-yard run by left half Larry Henry. He had previously set this score up on a 67-yard run. Good blocking on Crowell's left side of the line sprung him loose for this gallop.

Crowell scored another time in the third quarter on a six-yard run by Henry. This march was good for 53 yards.

The final tally was set up by a recovered fumble by right end Ronny Clifton after Crowell had kicked to the Hawks' 25. Wildcat fullback Paul Campbell, 138-pound wonder, picked up 15 yards to set this score up. Quarterback Dan Mike Bird threw to Henry in the end zone for the touchdown. This score came late in the fourth quarter. Henry added the two points on a left end run. The final count was 26 to 6 for Crowell. Coach Amonett emptied the bench in the last three minutes, giving all of the boys a taste of action.

Fullback Terry May and halfback Bill Jackson were stand-outs for the Hawks. Crowell's stars were a dime a dozen. If some must be mentioned, it will have to be halfback Larry Henry, most outstanding player on the field, and quarterback Dan Mike Bird in the backfield. Mike Shrode and Ronny Clifton, aided by Otis Johnson on the defense, looked good in Crowell's line. However, James Corder, Lee Looney, Rickey Tra-week, John Carl Borchardt, Toye McCurley, Tommy Carpenter, Gary Taylor, Randy Smith, Randy Adkins and Mike Gamble played good ball, too.

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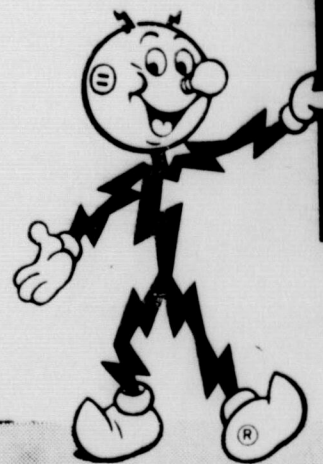

Miss Dousa Hale, home demonstration agent in Foard County for the past three years, has been granted a leave of absence by the A&M Extension Service.

A total of \$52.00 was raised in Foard County by the local Red Cross chapter for the relief of hurricane sufferers in the Rio Grande Valley. The most disastrous storm in the history of the Valley visited that area early last week.

A course in typewriting is available to the students of Crowell High School this year for the first time in the history of the school.

With forty-five CHS girls reporting for the first meeting of the 1933-34 pep squad Wednesday afternoon, it now appears that the Wildcat football team will have the largest and peppiest organized group of girls supporting them at games this year than at any other time in the history of the local school.

While a large number of West Texas counties have received cotton checks during the past week, up to Thursday morning Foard County had not received a single check. Fred Rennels, county agent, telegraphed cotton administration officials at Washington in regard to the matter Wednesday afternoon and was awaiting an answer this morning.

The heaviest rain recorded at one time in Crowell in 23 months fell early Wednesday morning. It amounted to 2.3 inches and together with rain on Tuesday afternoon, the total was 2.6 inches.

The Crowell schools officially opened their 1933-34 terms here Monday with an enrollment of 501, the greatest number of pupils since 1928, when the number was 532 at the beginning of school.

Foard County's 1933 tax rolls are ready for the approval of the commissioners court when it meets here Saturday, according to Vernon Pyle, tax assessor.
