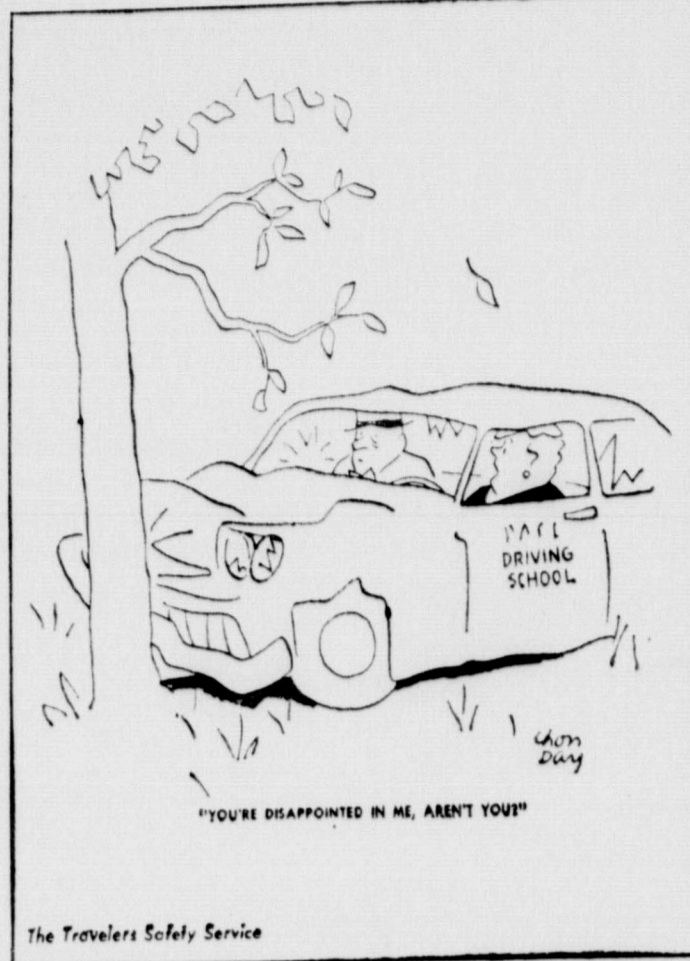

**Two Minutes With the Bible**

**A Coffin for the Law**

God had barely given the Law to Moses when He ordered it to be put in a coffin. That's right—a coffin. The reason for this is that the Mosaic covenant clearly stipulated: "Now therefore, if ye will obey My voice indeed, and keep My covenant, then ye shall be a peculiar treasure unto Me above all people, for all the earth is Mine" (Ex. 5:19).

Israel, of course, did not obey God's voice indeed, but broke the Law before Moses even got down from Sinai. It was because of this that God, in grace, said: "And they shall make Me an ark . . ." (Ex. 25:10). This word "ark" is rendered "coffin" in the last verse of Genesis and that is its simple meaning. But why did God order a coffin as the very first article of furniture for the tabernacle? The answer is: To put the Law in. Read it for yourself:

"And thou shalt put into the coffin the testimony (the Law) which I shall give thee . . . and thou shalt put the mercy seat above upon the coffin . . ." (Ex. 25:16,21). If God had not put the covenant of the law in a coffin and met with His people from a "mercy seat" none of them ever would have been saved.

This Old Testament type has a lesson for us too, for if God dealt with us according to our works none of us would ever be saved, but "Christ died for our sins," meeting for us the demands of a broken Law, so that we might be saved by grace, through faith in His redemptive work.

Col. 2:14 says concerning this "handwriting of decrees, that was against us," that our Lord, in death, "took it out of the way, nailing it to His cross," and Rom. 7:6 goes on to explain: "But now

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we are delivered from the law, that being dead wherein we were held; that we might serve in newness of spirit, and not in the oldness of the letter." Thus believers in Christ are saved "by grace . . . through faith . . . not of works" but "unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them" (Eph. 2:8-10).

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**STATE CAPITAL**

On July 1 every costs less than \$10 will go up two of outer clothing that per cent.

That is the date the extended state sales tax law goes into effect. All outer clothing now exempt will become taxable. Smart shoppers will take advantage of the last days of June to stock up on clothing for the family. Buying of school togs may take place earlier than ever before.

Legislature made many changes in the sales tax law. Most changes affect reporting procedures of merchants. An important one, however, raises the state sales tax on automobiles from 1½ to 2 per cent.

As of July 1, if you buy a new car costing \$3,000, for example, you will pay a state tax of \$60.

If you trade in an old car, the salesman will deduct the trade-in amount from the total, then figure your tax on the difference. In other words, if your trade-in came to \$1,000 toward a \$3,000 car, you would pay two per cent—or \$40—on the difference.

**"LAYAWAY PLAN"** — At the last minute Gov. John Connally signed the \$3,000,000,000 state budget bill. He criticized the bill for emphasizing "bricks rather than brains." But he knocked out \$12,400,000 worth of "bricks"—i. e. construction items — before he affixed his signature.

Connally said he would guard the \$12,400,000 as a "layaway plan" for higher education.

Hopes that his decision on the 1964-65 appropriations bill would decide the special session question fell through. He said he does not want to call a special session, but will not hesitate to do so if he becomes convinced that excellence in higher education is threatened by a shortage of funds for teaching salaries, research and libraries.

**VETOES** — When the governor's deadline for signing bills arrived, he inked into law most of the 551 measures passed by the Legislature.

But he vetoed a few, including: Senate Bill 270, revising the antiquated 1856 Code of Criminal Procedure. Connally nixed the controversial code revision, after learning that the copy sent him for signature was not the one passed by the Legislature.

House Bill 769, exempting from jury service "all owners or operators of milk-producing farms where this operation is the exclusive means of earning a living." Connally said, "I believe that dairy farmers occupy an important role in our society and can serve a valuable function as jurors."

House Bill 1053, providing for election of directors of the Upper Guadalupe River Authority, rather than appointment by the governor. Connally said he vetoed this since there was a technical conflict in its legal language which might jeopardize the district.

House Bill 975, repealing the requirement that the Angleton Drainage District get approval of the Texas Water Commission before spending bond money for improvements. He said Water Commission approval would assure uniformity of improvements in all water districts.

**MURRAY FILE** — Income tax reports made by William J. Murray from 1946 to 1962 have been studied by Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr. Murray resigned in April as a member of the Railroad Commission, following a conflict-of-interest charge.

After noting that Murray's taxable income from oil, gas and allied operations during those 17 years exceeded \$1,700,000, Carr stated, "This report does raise a serious question of a conflict-of-interest between the official duties of Mr. Murray and his private interests."

Carr recommended a Legislative Council study for an improved Code of Ethics for State officials.

Such a code, co-authored by Reps. Jim Nugent of Kerrville, Bob Eckhardt of Houston and Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi, passed the House during the legislative session but was killed in the Senate.

Study of Murray's finances was made for a Travis County Grand Jury, which will attempt to determine whether Murray violated any laws.

**SCREWORM PROGRESS PROVEN** — Up to now, estimates of state and federal animal health authorities that the 1½-year-old screwworm eradication program has resulted in anywhere from a 75 to 95 per cent decline in the disease have been pure guess work.

But the joint report of the Texas Animal Health Commission and the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the five-week period ending June 1 confirmed a 93 per cent decline as compared to the same weeks in 1962.

The clear comparison picture was the result of reporting cooperation on the part of livestock producers.

Animal health report showed that during the period April 28 to June 1, 1963, research workers confirmed 480 samples as screwworm infestations, and 1,281 as non-screwworm. In the same period in 1962 there were 7,013 screwworm cases confirmed, and 597 termed non-screwworm.

**PROGRAM IN JEOPARDY?** — Members of the Texas Screwworm Eradication Committee considered Governor Connally's veto of a \$300,000 appropriation for the eradication program a matter of "serious concern."

They said more than 100,000 livestock producers raised \$1,000,000 toward its \$1,000,000 goal this spring in a 30-day period on the governor's word that the State would carry its share of the \$12,000,000 program.

Committeemen said that unless the \$300,000 vetoed by Connally is restored, the entire program is in jeopardy, and possibly the loss of the huge investment producers already have made in the program.

**LAND SALE POSTED** — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler announced the sale of several South

and physical education. These are all regular courses taught by staff instructors at the college.

Extra emphasis was placed on the areas in which the game warden assignments coincide with the duties of another organizational unit of the department.

When the wardens completed their training at A&M, they were well prepared to handle the problems and duties encountered in the field.

Soon after the wardens graduated from the Game Warden School, they were assigned districts and began operating as district game and fish wardens.

**American People Not as Gullible as They Used to Be**

... the American people are not as gullible as they used to be about political promises, whether they concern 'benefits' or anything else. For example, we all can remember how Kennedy, when he was campaigning in 1960, promised again and again that he would balance the budget and keep it balanced. Yet now he and his New Frontiersmen are telling us that deliberate budget deficits are the secret to fiscal success. The budget promise, then, was way overblown. The same holds true for political promises in the realm of 'benefits.' For example, the TVA was born in a sea of promises to bring everlasting prosperity to the Tennessee Valley, but after a quarter of a century goodly portions of the area are officially classed as 'depressed.' —Chico, Calif., Enterprise-Record.

**29 New Wardens Get Assignments Over the State**

Twenty-nine warden trainees passed their courses at Texas A. & M. College, graduated as full-time wardens May 30, and are now stationed in various cities across the state. Their formal training began at Camp Bullis September 1, according to J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Texas Game and Fish Commission, with orientation. It was continued with field training until February, when they were enrolled in the Game Warden School at A&M.

The first week of instruction at A&M consisted of physical education and Civil Defense training. At the beginning of the regular school term, they registered for a beginning and advanced course in wildlife management, fish conservation and management, public speaking, first aid

## Cotton Classing to Be on Basis of Revised Standards

Cotton classing on and after June 15 will be on the basis of the revised Official Cotton Standards of the United States for Grade of American Upland Cotton. These revised standards will be the basis for international trade in American upland cotton for the coming season.

Delegates from over the United States and the world met with the Agricultural Marketing Service some weeks ago for the purpose of examining and approving about 80 key sets of the revised Universal Cotton Standards. The revisions were approved at the 1952 Universal Cotton Standards Conference.

Standards for cotton classification are a vital factor in marketing the largest cash crop produced on our farms today, points out C. E. Cox, in charge of the Altus Classing office.

United States Standards, used by all USDA Cotton Division classing offices, assure both growers and buyers of the quality they sell or buy.

"Cotton quality varies widely—not only between varieties, areas of production and season, but also between cotton harvested at different times from the same field. Even cotton fibers within a single boll vary in length," added Mr. Cox.

The original standards in physical form are sealed and deposited in a vault at the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Washington, D. C. Copies, known as "practical forms" are prepared and sold by USDA to persons interested in cotton classification in this country and abroad.

Conferences on universal cotton standards are held at three-year intervals. The next regular Universal Cotton Standards Conference will be in 1955.

## Guard Against Clothes-Moth Damage

Want to guard against clothes-moth damage? Then you may want to spray DDT on surfaces of closet walls or on clothing and blankets stored in tight trunks about twice a year.

Rugs and the top of rug pads can be treated with DDT to prevent carpet beetle infestations. Spray bookcases and other areas where silverfish crawl to eliminate these pests from your home.

Malathion sprays can be used in similar manner, except that they should not be sprayed on clothing or blankets. One should spray malathion behind drawers, water pipes, baseboards and other hiding places to get rid of cockroaches.

Chlordane is another useful household insecticide. It should be used as a 2 per cent spray or 5 per cent dust to rid the house of ants, carpet beetles, flour and meal moths, cockroaches, and silverfish. Applied to the soil as a 1 per cent water emulsion, it will prevent subterranean termite damage to your house.
