City Council Votes to Join Greenbelt Water Authority

The Crowell City Council, in a special session Tuesday morning, voted unanimously to join the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

A petition, containing the signatures of 50 qualified property owners in Crowell, must now be presented to the board of directors of the Authority seeking Crowell's admission as a member city. Crowell was not a member of the original seven cities that compose the Authority.

A reduction in the water rates proposed by the Greenbelt Municipal Water Authority was announced at a meeting of the board of directors in Childress.

The rate dropped to 37 1/2 cents per thousand gallons for Crowell which had been quoted at 40 cents per thousand in an earlier report. A re-survey of the use of water in the towns involved in the Greenbelt Authority created the reduction. It showed that the price of water delivered to the various member cities could be reduced and the Authority would have sufficient funds to pay off bonds and continue operation of the water system.

The rate for Childress, Clarendon, Hedley and Quanah was reduced from 35 cents per thousand to 30 cents per thousand gallons. Rates were based on the amount of water cities have used in the past two years.

"Our original figures were based upon water consumption in past years and our latest studies show an increase in consumption," stated C. W. Freese.

"So," he added, "we are going to suggest the reduced rates to the directors of the Authority."

The Greenbelt project is to be financed through water purchase contracts and rates to cities play an important role. It will not be necessary to tax property owners since the water purchase rates will pay off the bonds within a 35-year period.

The proposal is expected to be brought before voters in the member cities in the latter part of August. Voters will ballot on whether or not the cities should accept the water purchase contracts. Should it fail to pass, then that city would not be allowed to purchase water from the Greenbelt Authority.

A hearing on the application of the Authority to amend its water permit which will enable it to change the location of the dam site has been set before the Texas Water Commission in Austin on Sept. 4. The dam was originally proposed in Collingsworth County on the Salt Fork of the Red River, but has been moved upstream to the Lelia Lake area in order to impound a better quality of water.

Directors discussed possibilities of recreational facilities on the lake and began making plans for the development along those lines. The Texas Game and Fish Commission has been sent a copy of the feasibility report and directors asked for assistance in drawing up plans and specifications for recreational purposes.

Directors of the Authority met Friday with engineers, Freese, Nichols and Endress of Fort Worth, and attorneys, McCall, Parkhurst and Crowe of Fort Worth.

Millard Parkhurst and his assistant, Ray Hutcheson, presented a rough draft of the water purchase contracts on which voters will ballot. The contracts are to run for 40 years, cities would operate their own water systems without interference from the Authority, the Authority could not serve customers which can be reached by city systems, the Authority cannot take city tax money, and cities will be required to buy all of their water needs from the Authority, were a few of the important points brought out.

At Friday night's session, Roland Walden, director from Quanah, and State Senator Andy Rogers of Childress reported on a recent trip to Austin where they conferred with the Texas Water Commission and the Texas Water Development Board.

They reported that the Greenbelt project conformed to the law in every respect and that no difficulty is foreseen in obtaining state participation. The state, under a new law passed last November, will put more than \$2 million into construction of the reservoir, and, at the same time, will provide a loan to finance the remainder of the project.

V. F. W. Wins Foard County Little League

V. F. W. is the 1963 Little League champion by virtue of an 8-7 victory over Crowell State Bank last Tuesday night in the finest game of the season.

Gary Eddy of the Bankers slammed out a two-run homer in the first inning. Three more runs were added in the fourth and fifth, and the Bankers led by a score of 6-3 at the end of the top half of the fifth. Jimmy Hammonds slammed one over the wall, scoring two mates ahead of him to tie up the ball game. The sixth inning was scoreless for each team.

Then came the extra inning. Junior Carroll's second hit of the night scored Gary Eddy, and the Bankers led by one run.

But, in their half of the seventh, consecutive singles by Ken Sellers and Billy Dishman again brought up Jimmy Hammonds, and the big guy responded with his second "money" hit of the night, a double, that scored both base runners and cinched the 1963 Little League championship.

Crowell State Bank came back on Friday night to hold the champs to two singles and won over them by a convincing 13-4 score, but the championship was already won by the Vets, and this loss merely made the final margin between the teams a close 1 1/2 games.

David Bursey of Quanah to Train as New Game Warden

According to T. F. (Ted) Wheelis, District Conservation Chief of the Texas Game and Fish Commission's Lubbock Office, the new Hardeman, Foard, Cottle game warden, Charles Talbert, will arrive in the district around August 1. Frank Ordener who lived at Paducah and who was moved by the department, took up his duties in his new district last week. Ordener was singled out by many people of the three-county district to compliment him upon his work while stationed here.

Talbert's delay in arriving has been due to a mishap that occurred on the border where he transferred from. He was injured about the face when a tear gas bomb accidentally exploded and has been hospitalized followed by a period of convalescence at home.

Mr. Wheelis was also in Quanah to interview James David Bursey, who recently took and passed the Game Warden examination given in Lubbock. Bursey was one of three men out of 38 who took the exam to pass and be selected as a Game Warden trainee.

He will be put in the field with an experienced warden, will work with fish and wildlife biologists until February when he will be sent to Texas A&M for a semester of schooling for game wardens.

Bursey is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Bursey of Quanah, and the grandson of Mrs. Tom Bursey and Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Nichols, all of Crowell.

Crowell Junior Rifle Club Will Be Organized

Twelve youths and five adults met last Monday evening to start organizing the Crowell Junior Rifle Club. Prospective members were told that the club is open to all youngsters, both boys and girls, between the ages of 12 and 18, and will be under the auspices of the National Rifle Association. The only requirement for membership, except the age limits, is that members must have the written permission of parents on consent forms.

Adult leader of the club is Dr. Walter Stapp. After issuing information letters and consent forms to be taken to the parents, Dr. Stapp explained that the first several sessions of the group will be devoted exclusively to classes on safety and the study of guns. Before the students actually begin shooting, they must exhibit a thorough knowledge and practice of gun safety.

Highway Patrol Reports 3 Accidents Here During June

The Highway Patrol investigated three rural traffic accidents in Foard County during the month of June, Sgt. D. R. Dowdy, Patrol Supervisor of this area, announced this week. These wrecks accounted for one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,150.00.

The sergeant stated that this brings the total for the year thus far in Foard County to 18 accidents that claimed no lives, injured 11 people, and caused property damage of \$6,835.00.

For a comparison, the Patrol Supervisor pointed to accidents in this county for the first six months of 1962 that accounted for no deaths, four persons injured, and property damage of \$4,375.00.

"Prior to July 1, there had been a total of 941 fatal accidents in Texas," Sgt. Dowdy said, "that took the lives of 1136 persons." "As the year is over half gone, there are definite indications that traffic deaths will hit an all-time high in 1963. Motoricides at this time are over 100 more than at the same time last year," the sergeant said. "If we continue to take lives at the present rate, 1963 will become the most deadly year in Texas history for traffic fatalities. Considering the trend of increased accidents and casualties, we have every reason to expect that traffic deaths will exceed the previous all-time high in Texas of 2611 in 1966."

Intended Candidate for Supreme Court Visits Here Last Week

The political season got off to an early, if unofficial start, here Wednesday with the visit of Judge Sears McGee of the 55th District Court at Houston, stopping in Crowell on a swing through North-west Texas lining up support for his intended candidacy for the State Supreme Court post now held by Judge Frank Culver.

McGee, a 45-year-old lawyer, is already a veteran of the bench, having presided in Harris County courts almost continuously since 1948.

A graduate of the University of Texas Law School in 1940, McGee engaged in private practice in Houston until 1943 and then he served three years in the U. S. Navy. Following his discharge, he returned to private practice for three years and in December of 1948 was elected to the Harris County court at law—a post he held for two additional terms after being elected without opposition.

He was appointed judge of the newly created 151st District Court in 1953 and resigned a year later to enter private practice. In 1958, he was elected to the 55th District Court and was re-elected in 1962 without opposition.

During his tenure on the bench, he has disposed of more than 18,650 cases and in addition presided over trials in 10 other counties.

McGee has served as a director of the state bar and secretary-treasurer and vice president of the Harris County Junior Bar Association. In addition, he has served on the legislative committee of the judicial section of the state bar.

He is a member of the Community Council, president of the Houston Council for Deaf Children and holds membership in the Houston, state and national bar associations.

McGee has indicated he will seek the Supreme Court post although he has not yet officially announced his candidacy. Judge Culver has previously said he would not seek re-election.

Two Minutes With the Bible

Sin No Joke

The present trend in American moral conduct is downward. Increasing thousands all about us are throwing restraint to the winds "to enjoy the pleasures of sin."

We struggle with the problem of juvenile delinquency, but tempt the young in a hundred ways to immorality and violence. We are shocked at the deeds of sex-mad criminals who make it unsafe for women to walk the streets at night, but our women continue to pay less and less heed to the principles of modesty and decency that would contribute so greatly to their safety.

Half of Texans' Vegetables Come from Out of State

About half of the vegetables that Texans ate in 1959 came from out-of-the-state. An amazing 71 per cent of the wholesale purchases of vegetables in that year were from out-of-state.

This information is contained in a recent publication of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, MP-617, "Sources of Vegetables Consumed in Texas," says that since the production seasons for most vegetables are not continuous throughout the year, Texas depends on vegetables produced in other states for part of its yearly supply.

The publication says that 35 states and three foreign countries shipped one or more of the 10 selected vegetables into Texas during the 1958-59 season. Vegetable produce wholesalers handle about 40 different vegetables during the year, it continued.

A partial solution to the problem given by the booklet advises the competitive commercial vegetable grower to develop longer production seasons for certain vegetables. It says that through the complete use of all available production areas, the marketing season for some vegetables can be extended. Since only one-third of the local retail stores purchase directly from the grower, the packer-shipper and wholesale produce dealer are important in the distribution of vegetables, it adds.

Charts and tables in the publication show the thirteen main areas of vegetable production in Texas as well as the length of the production seasons for the major crops. From these the vegetable producer can tell which crops are in short supply and when more supplies are needed.

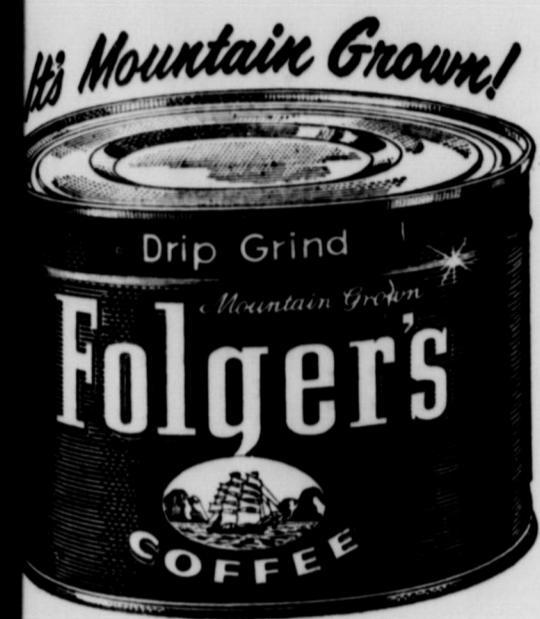

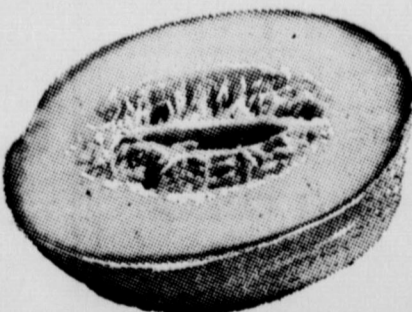
