EIGHTH GRADE GRADUATES FORTY-TWO

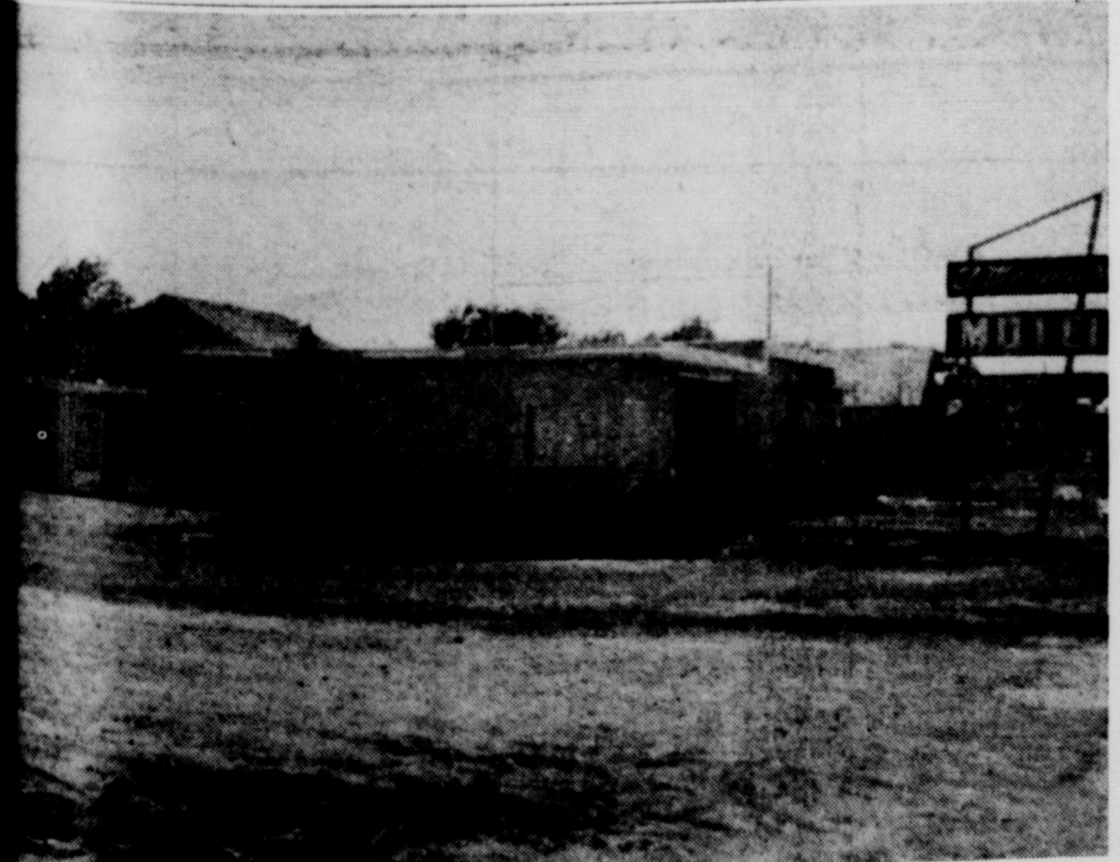
