

Booklet on Foard County Published by Committee

Booklet containing much valuable information about Foard County, its good features as well as its needs, and a brief history of the county has been released by the County Program Building Committee. The 23-page booklet is the culmination of a study by the County Program Building Committee since its organization under the leadership of County Extension Agents and members of the committee are: Jack Welch, chairman; Mrs. Elton W. According to the booklet, most of the work in compiling the information has been assembled since February, with the Extension Agents attending a number of meetings during the past six months.

In the age distribution section, figures are cited to show that from 1940 to 1960 the 45 to 64 year age group has increased from approximately 18 to 26 per cent of the total population, while the 20-44 years age group has decreased from 37 to 24 per cent. The population of Foard County has decreased more than 50 per cent in the last thirty years, and from 1950 to 1960 it decreased more than 25 per cent.

The median income for Foard County is \$4,307.00 as compared to the state median of \$4,884.00. Thirty-two and five-tenths per cent of the people have an income of less than \$3,000 with 14.4 per cent of the people having an income of \$10,000.00 or over.

About 424 people in the county receive supplemental rations of food, and 132 receive old age assistance.

In 1950, there were 495 farms with an average of 825.6 acres. In 1960, there were 369 farms with an average of 1,182.9 acres. The farm population has decreased proportionately with the number of farms. If the steady decline of population is to be stopped, there is need for a strong program toward better management and more economical farm production.

In discussing the county seat, the booklet says that the city of Crowell needs (1) additional sewer lines and a sewage disposal unit; (2) a housing improvement program; (3) an additional water supply; (4) its hard surfaced streets resurfaced; (5) a new fire truck; and (6) more people.

The booklet states that wheat is the major source of income for the people of the county, and beef cattle production is the second largest source of livelihood.

In the family living and home management section, problems listed by the committee are: families are involved in so many activities that they do not always prepare and serve adequate meals. Due to poor diets, many teenagers have weight, complexion and dental problems. 9.8 per cent of teenagers reported they never eat breakfast, 46.7 per cent always eat breakfast, and 43.5 per cent eat sometimes. 46.3 per cent reported they eat three balanced meals each day.

Although the foregoing article tells of some of the problems faced by Foard County residents, each of the problems cited in the book is also accompanied by some of the objectives of the committee in overcoming these deficiencies.

VFW-Crowell State Bank Tied for Lead in Little League

Besides Magee and Bird, Jimmy Hammonds and Jessie Barrera hit two-for-three for the Vets, and Bill Lynch, Billy Dishman, Kenneth Sellers and Rubin Castaneda each managed for one hit.

For Crowell State Bank, Frog Smith hit two-for-four, while Junior Carroll, Gary Eddy, Dickie Statser, and George Brown smashed out one hit apiece. Winning pitcher was Jessie Barrera.

Tuesday night, May 28, 8 p. m.: Farmers Elevator encountered only token resistance from Foard County Mill and outscored that nine by a 15-2 score, with Jimmy Johnson scoring both of the Foard County Mill runs. Johnson hit two-for-three for the Cardinals, and Paul Stapp hit a single in the third.

Mike Matus, with a two-for-three performance, was the leading hitter for Farmers Elevator. Mike Weathered, Billy Hord, Gary Cates and Israel Santos each came through with one base hit for the Yankees. Thirteen walks by the Cardinals helped the Yankee scoring, but a sensational catch by Paul Stapp killed off one Yankee rally.

Friday, May 31, 6 p. m.: Foard County Mill 12, Farmers Elevator 8. With Larry Ellis pitching three innings of no-hit-no-run ball and with Paul Stapp blasting a grand-slam home run, Foard County Mill came back on Friday night to once again hit the victory trail. Larry Ellis also chipped in with a base hit in the sixth to help his Cardinal attack, and David Myers, Danny Naylor, Bill Kinsey and Ishmael Santos each came through with one hit.

Farmers Elevator managed only for two hits, a double by Junior Urquizo and a single by Mike Matus.

Friday, May 31, 8 p. m.: After one and three-quarter innings, VFW and Crowell State Bank were deadlocked 2-2, and two teams are still tied for the league lead.

KNOW YOUR INSECT ENEMY—THE BOLL WEEVIL

These long-nosed pests are a multi-million-dollar menace to our nation's cotton crop. Each year, billions of boll weevils chew through an estimated \$300 million worth of cotton.

To maintain their profits, farmers must conduct constant war against the weevils. First step in the battle is to deny this enemy refuge. Boll weevils spend the winter in weedy trash or other protected areas near cotton fields. Fall destruction of stalks and early spring cleanup of fields deprives weevils of a food supply.

An effective control effort requires sound crop management. Entomologists recommend several basic cultural practices. Prepare the soil well. Select early-ripening varieties. Make soil tests to determine plant food needs, then fertilize accordingly. Control weeds by frequent shallow cultivation to speed cotton harvest.

In addition to good management, regular insecticide applications are important to beat the weevils. A potent broad-range new weapon, Sevin insecticide, is being used extensively by farmers against weevils and other cotton pests. This new material is a carbamate, chemically different and safer than most chlorinated hydrocarbon and phosphate pesticides previously used.

Growers reported excellent control, even on weevils that had become resistant to older insecticides. Sevin is available both as a dust and in a spray formulation.

For profitable cotton production, many pest control experts recommend early applications as a supplement to the regular insecticide program. Controlling small infestations of weevils early in the season is more economical than fighting mass attacks in late season. **FNS**

Screwworm Fund Drive Completed

The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation has reported the successful completion of its drive to collect \$3 million for screwworm eradication.

C. G. Scruggs, Foundation president, announced that Southwestern livestockmen and sportsmen have already exceeded their goal and additional funds are expected to be deposited in the near future.

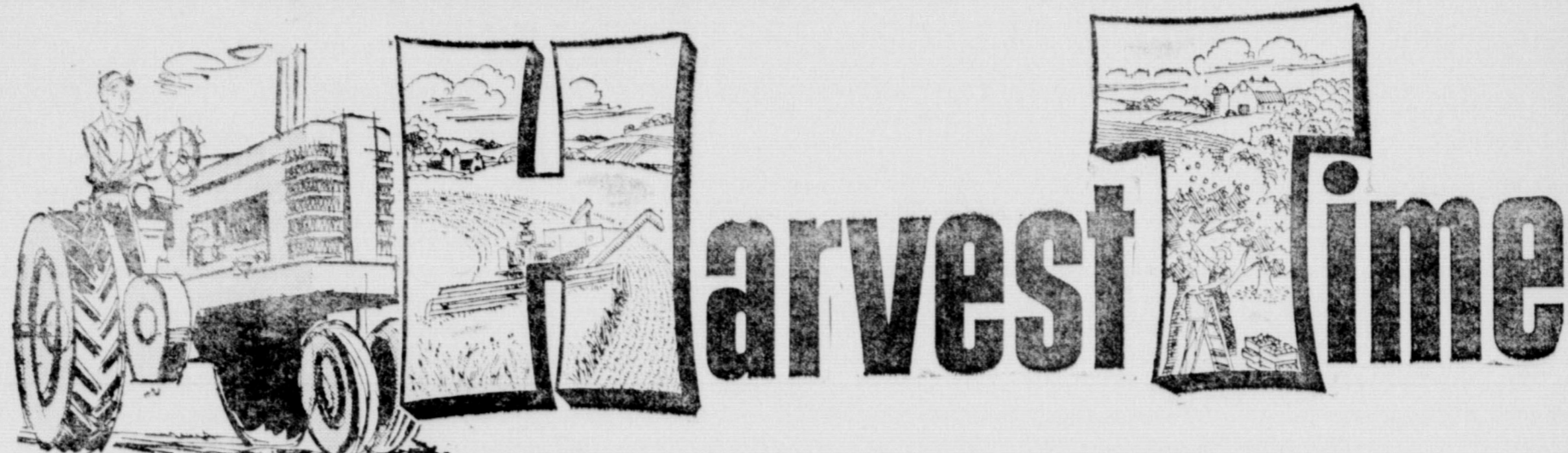
Tabulations made early this month showed contributions from Texas totaling more than \$2.9 million. Oklahoma reported \$24,000; New Mexico, \$33,500 and Louisiana, \$38,700. A group of California livestock producers donated \$500. Scruggs said quite a few Texas counties have not yet turned in all of the funds that had been collected and workers in other Southwestern states indicated additional money was forthcoming.

Scruggs termed the fund drive "an achievement by the livestock industry and sportsmen of the Southwest that is unprecedented as to amount of funds contributed and overall interest and participation by individuals."

"This is a marvelous example of voluntary action," Scruggs declared. "Altogether it forms another exciting chapter in the colorful history of the Texas livestock industry and exemplifies Texas citizenry at its best."

The private funds comprise part of the estimated \$12 million that will be required to rid the Southwest of the bothersome screwworm over a three-year period. The Federal government is furnishing half of the money and the Texas Legislature is presently considering a \$3 million appropriation.

The eradication program involves the production and sexual sterilization of millions of screwworm flies which are then released from airplanes over large areas of the southwest. The sterile males mate with native females which lay eggs that will not hatch. This technique was used to successfully eradicate screwworms in the Southeastern United States in the late 1950's.
