



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

GROWELL, STATE: BANK

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It was just about ten years ago, son, that you and I received notice that your father had been critically wounded in battle. Just think of it, two bloody wars in ten short years. I can recall as though it was yesterday, you, a boy of ten, standing by my chair and with your childish hand raising my chin high, saying, "Mother, Daddy will be all right."

So it was just a few months ago when you placed your manly arms about my shoulders, your lips to my forehead and with that same bigger hand raised my chin again, telling me to keep it high while you were gone. Though I have my share of troubles, they cannot mar the heavenly happiness that you and your Dad have crowded into my heart.

This leads me to think that the strength of our country lies not in the material but rather in those behaviors, ideals and virtues constituting the pulse beat of the happy united

You asked me to report fully the conditions on the home front. These, my son, are almost as disheartening and confusing as are conditions over there.

First, let me tell you of my own activities. Doubtlessly you will recall that in 1942, the year your father died, I inherited \$10,000 from my mother's estate which I invested in savings bonds. Well, today at their maturity I cashed them in, with the consciousness that their buying power had shrunk fifty per cent since the day of their purchase. This is true of all savings accounts, social benefits and insurance policies acquired when a dollar was a dollar before the present, ever-spiralling inflation. The sad part is that many otherwise conscientious people seem utterly unconcerned about this ruthless robbery. Instead of thinking of the future, perhaps you and I should have spent this money in repairing and refurnishing our home and in giving some attention to the lesser extravagancies of living.

As you know, shortly after your departure, I quit my secretarial job and took a position in this defense plant where I could make more money and at the same time feel that I was working more directly for your welfare and safety. Of course, I was forced to join a union and in a few days the leaders of this union called a strike for higher wages, shorter hours,

more holidays and the reinstatement of two workers who insisted upon smoking in the powder room. I pleaded against this work stoppage as all soldiers' mothers would, on the grounds that my boy was serving his country for a pittance and at great danger to his life. This plea did not register in their lustful souls. My heart urged me to defy the picket lines while my baffled reasoning pointed out the futility of such an attempt.

You must not assume from this that the great bulk of Labor is calloused and selfish for there are millions like myself who have loved ones in the Army. However, this affair does convince me that the sacrifices of war should be borne by every group of the citizenry. Some should not be made to die while others gloat that they never had it so good.

Well, the presidential campaign is getting hotter by the minute. Truman is strutting across the land blaming General Eisenhower for selling out to "good old Joe" at both Yalta and Potsdam, thus making inevitable the war that has cost you so dearly. And to gain adherence to this falsification in other States he is promising them a slice of our Tidelands. Just to hear him deny responsibility for the immorality and the lack of foresightedness in his Administration, one would think him a buck private rather than the Commander-in-

Both Stevenson and Sparkman are in accord with Truman on the tidelands issue and are advocating the confiscation of this property and the division of the proceeds therefrom proportionately amongst the school children in the several states. Knowing the spirit of Texans, as you do, you will be shocked to learn that Sammy Rayburn and Lyndie Johnson are supporting these candidates. They are doing this in defiance of a mandate issued by the Texas Democratic Convention at Amarillo, calling upon all true Texas Democrats to support the candidacy of General Eisenhower. Since Sammy is pretty busy figuring out ways and means to retain the Speakership job and since Lyndie can well remember the close call he experienced in a controversial election squabble they have concluded that it is safer for their political futures to disavow the mandate of the Texas Democratic Convention and place their allegiance with the northern wing of the National Party. This radical wing has little in common with the basic and traditional concepts of the people of Texas as is shown by the divergence of opinion on issues such as property rights, the FEPC and the right of fillibuster.

The other evening, Sammy Rayburn made a radio address, appealing to the stomachs of the voters and gloating over a war prosperity,

a prosperity, my son, rooted in the carnage of battlefields and in the sweat and toil of unborn generations. Not once did he mention the Hell of war or suggest ways of ending it. Not once did he mention the two hundred and sixtythree billion dollars national debt, which you, though maimed, must help to pay. Not once did he mention the debasement of our currency which robbed you and me of fifty percent of the original buying power of our savings. Not once did he admit any mistakes in foreign policy, mistakes instrumental in causing your loss and your suffering. Not once did he make any apology for the success of the Hisses in gaining favors from the Administration. Not once did he attempt to raise us up from our degeneracy by condemning the graft, the thievery, and the immorality rampant in our government. When he told the voters of Texas that they never had it so good and not let General Eisenhower take it from them, I grabbed my little portable radio and was in the act of smashing it to splinters when I seemed to hear your voice, as of old, "Oh-oh, Mother, don't lose your temper." Thank God, you do not have to listen to these soulless belly-gorging appeals while you lie in some lonely hospital bed, suffering, as you say, stabbing nerve pains darting through mangled toes left on the battlefield.

Son, there are too many people obsessed with the craving for financial security at the expense of greater human values. Little do they realize that this security once acquired can be destroyed, as in our case, by forces beyond their control. No material holding is safe outside the protection of our moral code.

Since you know little about Adlai Stevenson, I will hit the highlights focused upon him at the Democratic Convention and in his campaign as of now.

In a pre-Convention statement Adlai said he was physically, temperamentally and mentally unfit for the Presidency and if nominated he may resort to suicide. Of course, this was just shrewd political window-dressing, for the stage had long been perfectly set by Harry Truman, the big labor leaders and the big city political bosses, but to make it appear that the cards were not stacked, they permitted several roll-calls at the Convention before the squeeze was applied and the process of liquidating one by one the other contesting candidates was begun. First, old Man Barkley went down with a thud, then Senator Russell and finally Senator Estes Kefauver, who came to the Convention the choice of the people as expressed in many State presidential primaries. The stage was now a perfect setting for the entrance of the drafted candidate. He was

proclaimed a man of and from the commo people, a man, both by heritage and association opposed to monopolies, corporations and the monied interests. Why, son, in all this ballyhou one could almost see him with a cottonsac around his neck and a grubbing hoe in his hands.

Withholding any final conclusions, I for lowed the Cadillac procession transporting th draftee from a mansion out on the North Shore Drive to the podium of the Convention Hall where he, with some reluctance and much humility, acepted the nomination. I can tel you one thing, his speech accent does not jiv with the melody of that of a cotton-picker.

Much effort is being expended in this campaign to mirror him the common man. It i shocking to what depths his campaign mana gers will descend to hold his mirrored image before the voters. Why, they even had the aristocratic Adlai pose for a picture wearing a worn out pair of shoes, borrowed from porter working at the Governor's mansion This is, as you can see, just a low appeal for

the votes of people such as you and me. There is no disgrace in the rich wearing good clothes, riding in costly cars and living in mansions, provided these things are hon estly acquired. In truth, the rich are benefac-tors when they put their wealth in circulation thereby creating work and stimulating busi-

Wishing to pursue this "common man" myth further, with its accompanying hatred for monopolies, corporations and entrenched wealth, I finally found out that Adlai, a few years ago, wooed and married the daughter of a wealthy soap manufacturer. This is no all. According to his income tax reports he has been a director of a great railroad, two nation al banks and his income tax reports show that 65 per cent of his income for the past ten years was derived from the earnings of giant corporations such as Standard Oil of New Jersey. It this be the technique of hating, man has ye to learn the technique of loving.

Son, you certainly can't complain about the brevity of this letter. Just keep your chin up as you tell me, and know how proud you make me when you feel, as you say you do, no bitterness toward your fellowman or your God, and proud in the knowledge that you have performed a duty for your country. I would not have it otherwise.
