Farmers Elevator Still Leading in Little League Play

As of Sunday night, June 26, Farmers Elevator continued to lead the local league as they swept a two-game series over Rotary by 9-5 and 13-4 scores. V. F. In the 6 p. m. game of Tuesday night, June 21, Rotary and Foard County Mill played a snappy ball game (the entire six innings took only one hour and 15 minutes) as Mike Nichols' three-for-three hitting featured the Braves' attack. Albert Santos hit three-for-four for the Yankees and "Buckhead" Borchardt came through with two-for-three.

In the 6 p. m. game Friday night, June 24, pitcher Randy Smith of Foard County Mill went into the last half of the sixth leading by a 4-2 score, only to see the lead gradually melt away as Duane Simmons, VFW hurler, finally blasted a double to win the ball game 7-6 for the Veterans. Randy Adkins racked up three hits and Randy Smith hit safely twice to lead the Cardinal hitters, while Larry Everson hit two-for-four for the Vets.

In the 8 p. m. game, all tied at 2-2 at the end of three innings, the Elevator Yankees outscored the Braves of Rotary 11-2 in the later innings to win going away. For the losers Tex McCarty and Joe Ray Burkett each garnered two hits, while Albert Santos (with two hits) and Steve Gray (with three) did most of the damage for Farmers Elevator. Dan Mike Bird and Eddie Diaz did the hurrying for the Yankees.

Bond Sales in County Total \$45,049 for First Five Months

During the first five months of this year, the citizens of Foard County purchased \$45,049.00 in Series E and H United States Savings Bonds. This announcement was made this week by George D. Self, chairman of Foard County Savings Bonds Committee.

"We have now achieved 41 per cent of our 1960 goal of \$110,000.00," Chairman Self reported. Texas sales for the first five months of this year were \$69,824,409, which represents 42.2 per cent of the 1960 goal of \$165,500,000. May sales in Texas totaled \$12,341,632, which is \$1,049,468 greater than sales in the same month during 1959.

"The United States Savings Bonds program is one of the finest ways of encouraging regular savings. Through the payroll savings plan or other regular purchases, millions of Americans have become savers for the first time. BANK DEPOSITS REACH RECORD HIGH JUNE 15

Proof of Foard County's bumper wheat crop just harvested is shown this week as deposits in the Crowell State Bank had climbed to an all-time high of \$4,211,060.65 on June 15, the time of the bank call over the nation.

This is nearly one million dollars more than was on deposit in the local bank at this time last year, and nearly a million and a half more than on March 15 this year.

On deposit at this time last year was a total of \$3,483,403.73, and on March 15 this year, the Crowell State Bank had \$2,818,002.72 on deposit.

WHEAT HARVEST COMPLETED

The harvest of probably the best wheat crop Foard County ever produced has been completed and the elevators of the county have received approximately 1,500,000 bushels of wheat, 100,000 bushels of barley and 50,000 bushels of oats. No accurate estimate can be made of the grain that has been stored on the farms.

According to reports, many fields of wheat made up to 50 bushels to the acre and most fields made as high as 30 bushels per acre where no damage was caused by hail.

The Santa Fe Railroad shipped 517 cars of wheat, according to the agent, Tom Ellis, and a large amount of wheat was sent to Houston by truck.

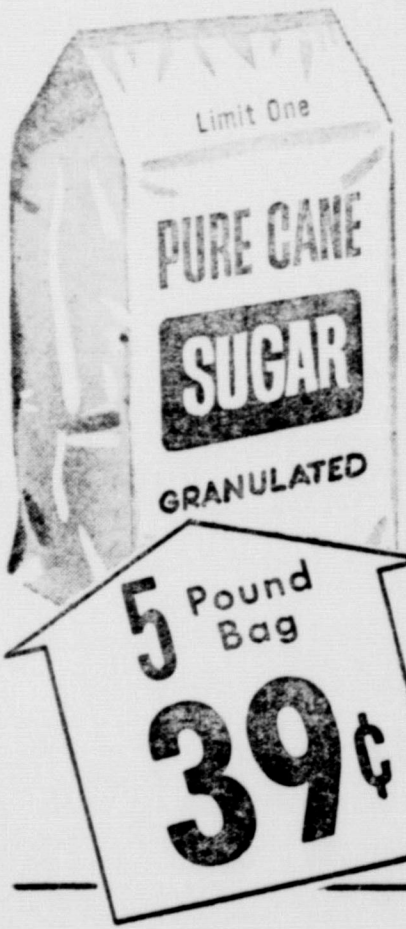

DPS Getting Ready to Handle Record Flow of Holiday Traffic

While the drivers of Texas are making plans for Fourth of July trips, the Texas Department of Public Safety is getting ready to handle a record flow of holiday traffic.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas DPS, announced this week that all available patrolmen and equipment will be in service during the Operation Death-watch period extending from 12:01 a. m. July 2 through 11:59 p. m. July 4. The department announced earlier its prediction that 27 motorcades would occur in the 72-hour period.

Garrison said patrolmen of the department's License and Weight service and Motor Vehicle Inspection service would join Texas Highway Patrolmen in patrolling Texas highways over the July 4th week end.

"Their purpose is to render a service to the traveling public," Garrison said. "Of course, their main objective is to control traffic

and to keep it moving smoothly and safely on the highways of our state. They have another purpose and that is to add to the convenience of out of state visitors and resident travelers by giving assistance when and where it is needed."

"Our patrolmen have been instructed to remove dangerous drivers from the highway. We expect more holiday traffic than usual this year. It is necessary that everyone who drives to be aware of the dangers that confront motorists this holiday and to drive with caution."

They need the full cooperation of all motorists in driving safely and sanely at all times. If we are to enjoy the holiday we must have a safe holiday. You can if you plan now to drive safely and courteously."

Since 1939, when the Texas Department of Public Safety established its continuing record of major multiple-death traffic crashes in which at least six persons were killed in a single crash, there have been 84 such fatal wrecks. The death toll: 631, averaging just over 7 victims per crash.

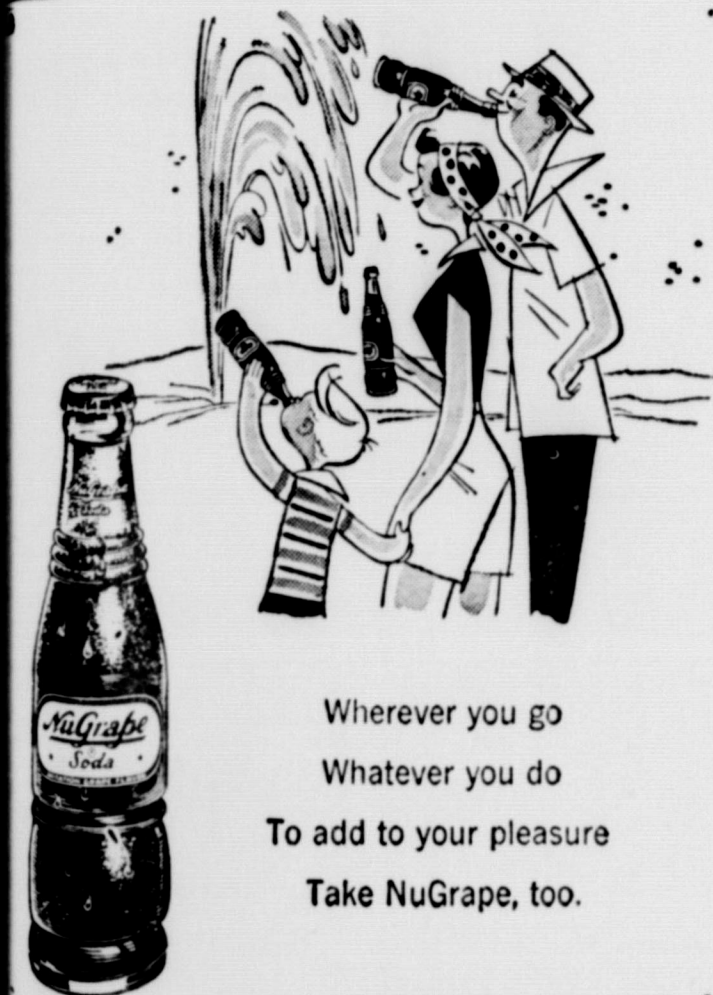

Labor Party Loses Places in Britain

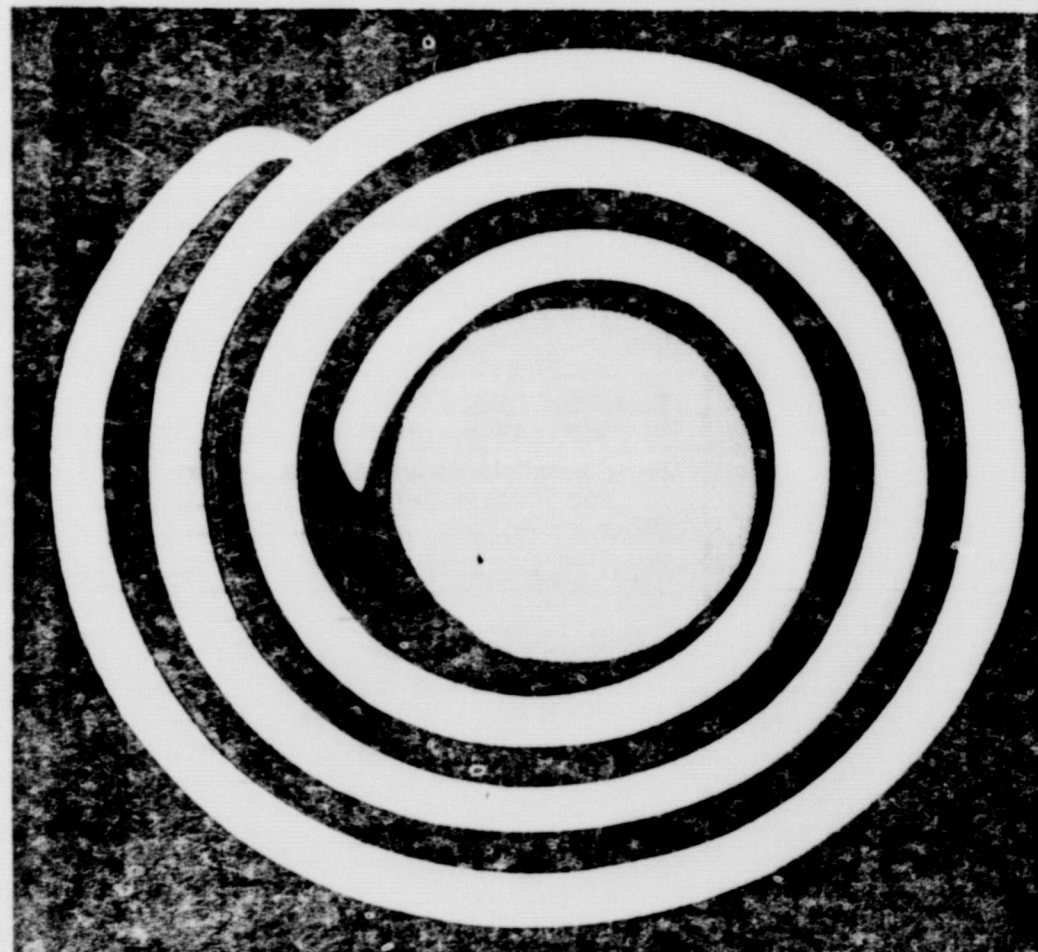

Time to Apply for Federal Gas Tax Refund for Farmers

Farmers are reminded it is to file Form 2340, claim for refund of federal tax on gasoline on the farm. This form must be filed no later than June 30, 1960, but must be before September 30, stated Joe Burkett, Tax Agent.

Farmers who have filed in previous years will receive Form 2340 direct, however, farmers who never filed for this refund obtain forms at Burkett's office. Gasoline to be included in form is that used on the farm from June 30, 1959, to July 1, 1960, for farming purposes. Gasoline purchased before October 1, 1959, carried a three-cent per gallon federal tax and refund will be at the rate of cents per gallon. The federal tax on gasoline was increased to cents per gallon on October 1, 1959, thus the refund on gasoline purchased on or after this date will be at the rate of four cents per gallon.

The claim should be filed with the U. S. Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas, Texas, before September 30, this year.

Of the 84 worst multiple-traffic crashes in the past 20 years in Texas, 176 vehicles were involved. Of these, 121 were passenger cars, 34 were trucks, and 29 were trains, seven were buses.

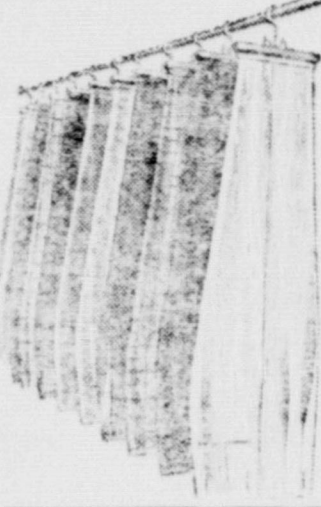

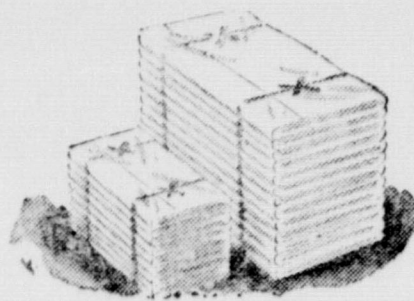
