Tom J. Ferguson, 91, last surviving member of a group of city-dwellers who took part in the election which authorized the organization of Foard County April 27, 1891, passed away last Wednesday afternoon, August 3, in a Vernon rest home following an illness of about two weeks.

Blue Catfish Are Transplanted in Texas Lake

Biologists of the Game and Fish Commission have been attempting to learn the ecological requirements of Rio Grande blue catfish by introducing this species into man-made impoundments having various desirable environmental characteristics. According to the director of inland fisheries, 13 large blue catfish were caught in the mouth of the Pecos River and transferred to Lake Colorado City. The catfish ranged in weight from 8 to 12 pounds. Several of the fish were tattooed with an electrical tattooing machine before their release in the lake. In addition to the adult fish, 5,500 very small blue catfish were taken from the Sheldon Hatchery near Houston, and released. Some 4,500 were placed in Lake J. B. Thomas, while the remaining fish went into Lake Nasworthy. The smaller ones and the so-called "Rio Grande" blues are known by the same scientific name, *Ictalurus furcatus*, but differ somewhat in appearance. Spots of pigmentation on a light greyish-blue, are nearly uniformly distributed over the backs and sides of the Rio Grande strain. According to the director, it's possible the two types of cats may have slightly different characteristics of adaptation and that the Rio Grande fish might have a better chance for survival in other West Texas waters. This will be better known when some of the released fish have been recaptured.

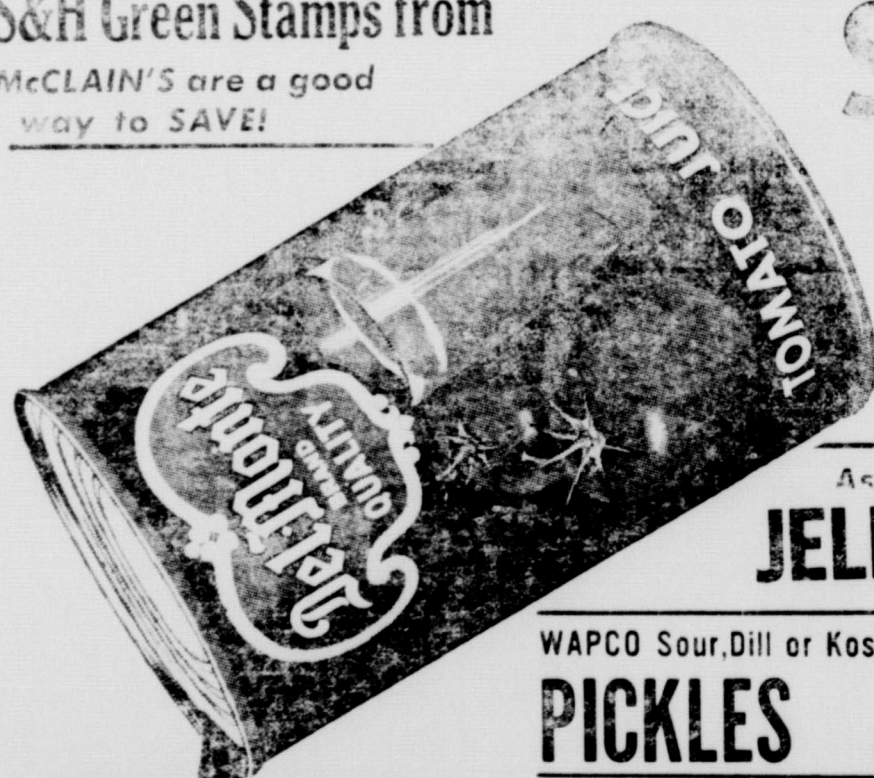

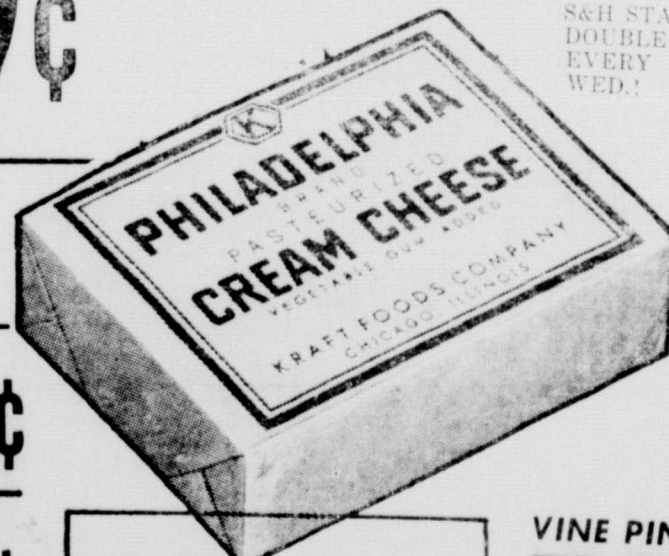

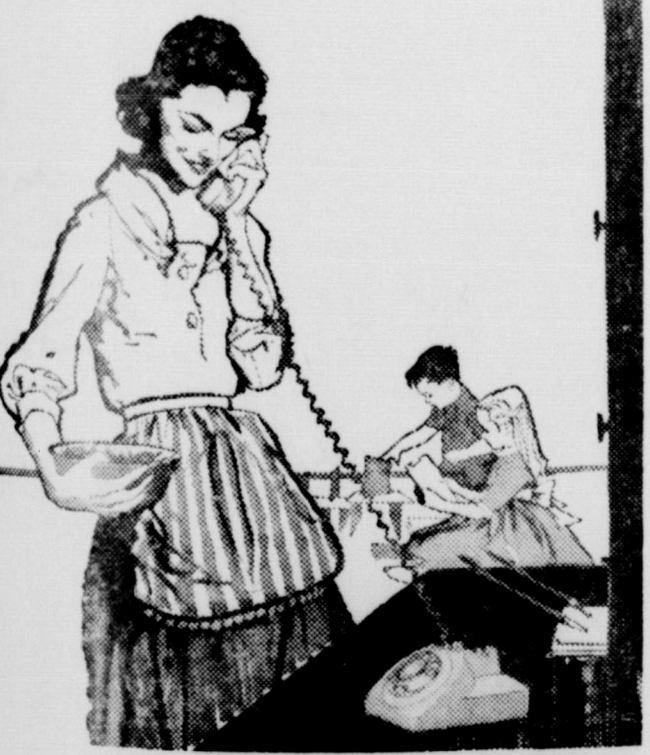

Banana Nut Loaf Cake
Sift together 3 cups sifted flour and 3/4 tsp. soda. Cream 3/4 cup shortening and 2 cups plus 2 tablespoons sugar. Add one at a time, beating well after each addition, 3 eggs.

Begin mixing and ending with dry ingredients, to creamed mixture alternately with 6 tablespoons buttermilk. Add and mix well 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup mashed bananas, 1 cup chopped nuts.

Pour into greased and floured 10 inch tube pan. Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees) 1 hour. Remove from oven and let cool 5 minutes before removing from pan. Remove from pan and finish cooling on cake rack. Frost with pecan praline frosting.

Pecan Praline Frosting
Melt in saucepan over very low flame 5 tablespoons butter or margarine. Add and cook 3 minutes 1 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed. Cool slightly, add, beating well with spoon after each ingredient is added: 1 cup confectioners' sugar, sifted, 1/4 cup cream, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1 cup pecan halves.

Beat until thick enough to spread.

THIS WEEK -In Washington



Clinton Davidson

The next three or four weeks in Washington will separate the politicians from the statesmen.

Congressmen will be put to the acid test of their stature during the extra session that starts next Monday for Senators and the following Monday for Members of the House of Representatives.

The temptation to make campaign speeches on the floors of the Senate and House during consideration of important legislation will be too much for all but the most stout-hearted. Many will yield to that temptation.

Washington weather in August, at best, is not conducive to calm deliberation and unburied action. Congressmen, already weary and worn from six months of sessions and one of political conventions, will be impatient to get back home for the campaigning.

The legislation to be considered, and the issues to be debated, will be supercharged with temptations for demagoguery. Some are sure to succumb. Others, by their words and votes, will rise above political considerations.

Votes in "Them Thar Bills"
Of the half dozen or so important legislative measures to be considered, all are loaded with potential votes for those who are tempted to place political advantages above the national interest.

Democrats in charge of both houses hope to give their presidential candidate a boost, and also to enhance their re-election prospects, by passing at least four major pieces of legislation.

Medical care for the aged is No. 1 on the list of bills which the Democratic leadership wants as a "show piece" for the election campaigning. This would be financed through an increase in Social Security taxes.

The expectation is that President Eisenhower will veto such a bill, but to do so would put many Republican candidates in the position of seeming to be unsympathetic with the problems of the aged and ill.

A vast program of Federal aid for increased housing has tremendous vote-appeal and congressional leaders hope to cash in whether, as expected, it is vetoed, or not.

More Inflation
Adding to a 7 1/2 per cent wage

increase for Federal workers voted during the regular session, the Democratic leadership plans to push through a higher minimum wage for some 40 million factory workers. They want the minimum raised from \$1 to \$1.25 an hour, but may settle for \$1.15.

The result is likely to be another over-all increase of around 5 per cent in the cost of manufactured goods, followed by a "cost-of-living" increase in all wage scales.

Another measure on the list of "must" legislation for the special session is Federal money for a greatly accelerated program on school construction. There is no question of the urgent need for more and better schools; only that of whether they should be financed from local and state funds, or from Federal appropriations.

One of the most critical of domestic problems — that of legislation — is not on the list of what should be done at the session and isn't expected anything at the extra session.

Nevertheless it is expected a majority of Congress will vote in the national interest, also hope that voters in November will re-elect those who place national interest above their personal gains.

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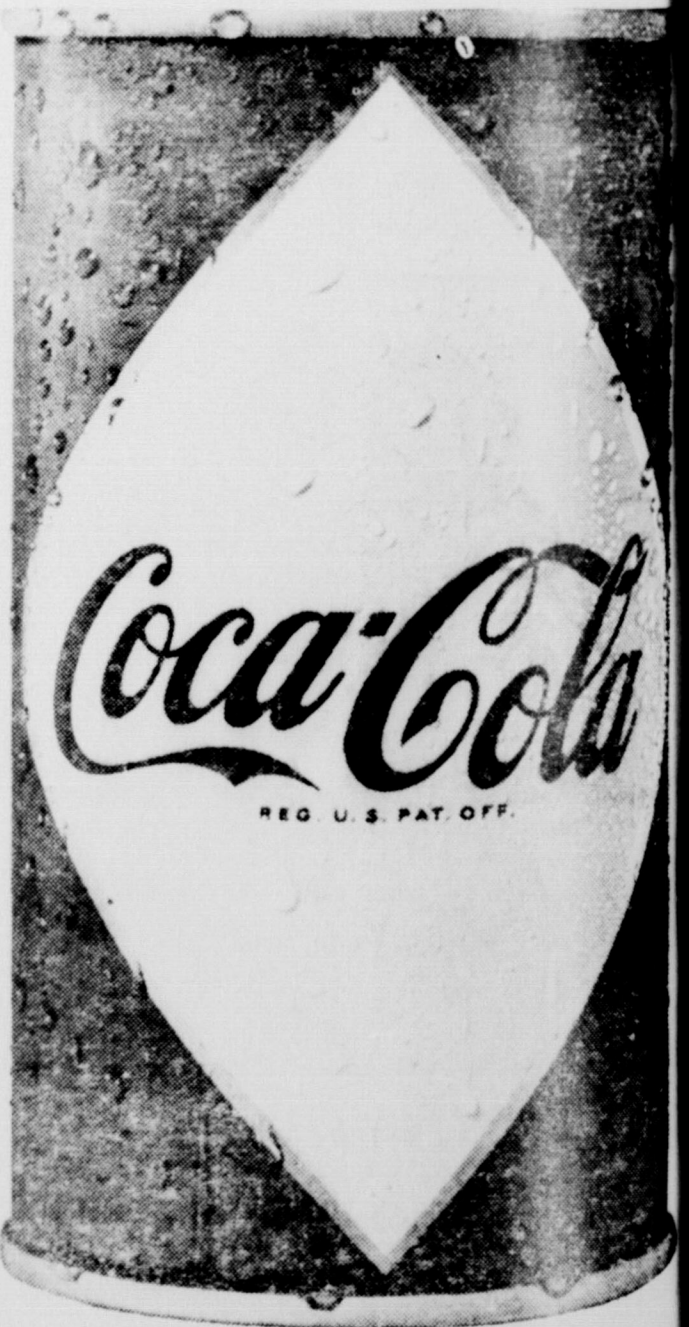
Plague of Compromises
