Mr. Easley Died Last Tuesday in Vernon Rest Home

Funeral services for J. H. (Red) Easley, 87 years old and a resident of Foard County since 1904, were held Thursday afternoon, Feb. 14, at 2:30 o'clock from the First Baptist Church in Crowell. Officiating was Rev. W. B. Fitzgerald of Petrolia, a former pastor of the local church, assisted by the pastor, Rev. Glenn Willson.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery under the direction of Womack Funeral.

Mr. Easley died Tuesday in a Vernon rest home following a long illness.

Snow Saturday Brings .17 Inch Moisture to Area

A very heavy, but short-lived snow fell here Saturday morning, and in a very short time turned the ground white. However, it quit the heavy snowfall after the ground was covered, and the warmth of the earth melted it early in the afternoon. Moisture received from the snow was .17 inch. A light snow had fallen most of the morning prior to the brief flurry of heavy snow, and the fine snow continued again part of the afternoon.

Although not a great deal of moisture resulted, farmers and ranchers say "every little bit helps."

The clouds continued over the area Saturday night and most of Sunday with a fog blanketing the area early Sunday. Skies cleared for a while Sunday afternoon; however, it was cloudy again Monday morning.

One farmer reported last week that with the small amount of moisture received last week and the warmer weather last week had already begun to green up the freeze-browned wheat.

Dale Doyal Signs Letter of Intent with Oklahoma State U.

Dale Doyal, Crowell High School's All-State football back, has signed a letter of intent with Oklahoma State University, according to Assistant OSU Coach Jim Stanley, who was in Crowell last Tuesday.

Coach Stanley rated Doyal as an outstanding find for OSU and indicated he felt the school was fortunate in being able to beat out other schools which were contending for him.

Doyal is rated by his High School Coach, Thayne Amnett, as "one of the best boys I've ever coached."

He was Crowell's leading ground gainer with 980 yards on 163 carries this past year. He also caught 16 passes for 300 additional yards. On defense, Doyal played middle guard and also served as defensive half. Coach Amnett credits him with 12 to 15 unassisted tackles per game through the season. Also a speedster, he won the 880 yard run in the 1962 district track meet.

He is the son of Mrs. Pearl Doyal.

Tom Nichols, 54, died in the Foard County Hospital Monday following an illness of several weeks.

Funeral services were held at 3:30 Wednesday afternoon at the Eastside Church of Christ conducted by the Minister, Stanley Neeley. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery under the direction of Womack Funeral Home.

Toss Ross Nichols was born August 20, 1908, to the late Mr. and Mrs. Walter Nichols. He spent his entire life here in Foard County except for the years that he served in the armed forces in World War II. He was married to Mrs. Maudie Pendergraft on Nov. 19, 1949, in Quannah. He became a member of the Church of Christ in 1949.

He had worked on ranches in this area and as a farmer until he became employed by the county a number of years ago.

He is survived by his wife; two brothers, John of Rochester and Sherman of Crowell; four stepchildren, Mrs. Norman Stone of Vernon, Mrs. Larry Cogburn of Burkburnett, Barbara Louise and Jimmy Pendergraft of the home; one uncle, Grover Nichols of Crowell; two aunts, Mrs. John Shirley of Matador and Mrs. J. R. Meason of Roaring Springs; several nephews and nieces, and many more relatives and friends.

Non-Screwworm Samples Increasing

An increasing percentage of specimens being received at the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program's laboratory are being identified as "non-screwworms" and as the program continues the ratio of non-screwworms to screwworms should continue to rise. Faithfulness on the part of farmers and ranchers in sending in samples will help hasten the arrival of that day when screwworms will be eradicated in the Southwest.

Many of the samples submitted by livestock producers have been identified as wool maggots or black blow fly maggots. These and several other larvae are similar in appearance and characteristics to the screwworm and are often found in the same wound, but do not cause the serious damage done by the screwworms.

Since a case of screwworms in a wound may later be infested with other maggots, program officials have some words of advice about collecting samples. They suggest collecting at least ten or more maggots—getting them from the center of the wound and as deep within the wound as possible.

Most important, however, officials say, is to collect and send samples to county agents or directly to the laboratory at Box 969, Mission, Texas. The existence and location of native screwworms can only be determined by samples. This information is considered in planning the release of sexually sterile screwworm flies now being raised at Mission.

The Highway Patrol investigated five rural accidents in Foard County during the month of January, according to Sgt. D. R. Dowdy, Patrol Supervisor of this area. These wrecks accounted for two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,855.00.

The Highway Patrol Supervisor pointed out that rural motor vehicle traffic deaths, injuries and accidents slightly decreased in the 31-county Panhandle district during January, 1963, as compared with the same month for 1962. Five deaths were tallied last month as compared to seven in January, 1962, 61 injuries as compared to 81 for January, 1962. A total of 132 rural traffic accidents were investigated as compared to 162 for January, 1962. "This slight over-all decrease of deaths, injuries and accidents is encouraging, but these figures must be greatly reduced for each of the following months of 1963 if we

are to have a safe year in motor vehicle travel," the sergeant said. The veteran Patrol Supervisor reminded motorists that the law requires all Texas registered motor vehicles to have valid inspection stickers displayed by midnight April 15.
