The two aldermen who are not seeking re-election are J. A. Marr and A. B. Calvin.

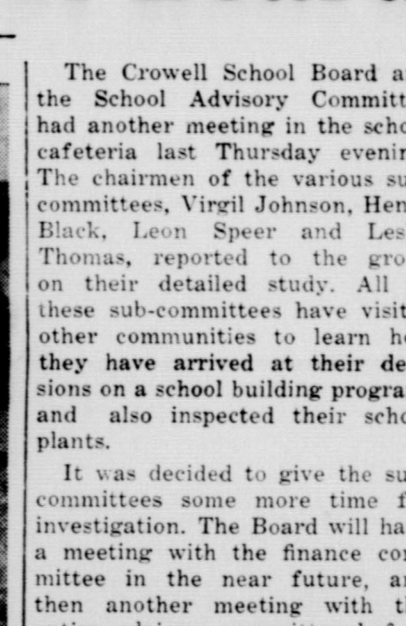
Hold-over members of the City Council are Guy Todd and Leon Speer.

Advisory Committee Meets with School Board

Grassed Waterways



Grassed waterways (a Foard County grass waterway is pictured above) are natural or man-made water courses protected against erosion by a grass cover. They are an important part of a soil conservation program. They are important to all of us whether we live on the farm or reside in a town.

To you, the farmer, grassed waterways are important because they serve as safe outlets for terraces and diversions. In addition, they may provide a safe passage way for water that enters your farm from adjoining land.

Good grassed waterways are a must in controlling water erosion on many farms. If you do not have one that does not function properly, all other parts of the water control system for your farm or field may fail too.

The next time you have a heavy rain on your farm, take a look at the natural drainageways and low areas in your field. Are there finger gullies on the field and silt bars in the low areas? If so, you should consider the need for a grassed waterway.

Eighty-Two Farms Signed up for Feed Grain Program

As of February 21, eighty-two farms in Foard County have been signed up for participation in the 1963 feed grain program, Ray Hysinger, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. County farms eligible to be included in the program total 327. "Eligible" farms are those which grew one or more of the three feed grains—corn, grain sorghum, or barley—during the program's base years, 1959 and 1960.

Feed grain acreage signed up for diversion through the program now totals 2,064 acres, including 8 acres of corn, 1012 acres of grain sorghum, and 1044 acres of barley. Feed grain base acreages of these participating farms amount to 3,875 acres.

Based upon farmers' intentions, as recorded at the ASCS County Office, these producers will earn an estimated \$22,286.00 for participating in the feed grain program this year.

The chairman points out that the 1963 feed grain program offers farmers an opportunity to "continue the progress chalked up during the past two years in balancing supplies with estimated needs." At the same time, the program payments give participants a substantial return from their acreage in which they usually have a heavy investment.

Under the program, a grower who reduces his feed grain acreage (of corn, grain sorghum or barley) by at least 20 per cent of his farm's total base acreage (1959-60 average) will earn a diversion payment—for shifting the acreage from production to a conserving use, and a price-support payment—on the normal production of the 1963 feed grain planted acreage. He will also qualify for regular price-support loans and purchase agreements on all the corn, grain sorghum, and barley produced on the farm's 1963 planted acreage.

To farmers interested in taking part in the program, Mr. Hysinger says: "Be sure to sign up soon. Right now, we can take care of producers without undue delay, but the later you wait, the more crowded the county office is likely to be."

The sign-up period extends through March 22.

Teachers Attend V. A. Meeting

Henry Black and Marvin Myers attended a meeting of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers of the Wichita District at Burkburnett February 20. Guidance and counselor personnel and high school principals were guests of the agriculture teachers at this meeting. Dr. Earl Webb, professor of Texas A&M, spoke to the group on the importance of vocational agriculture in our school curriculum. He pointed out that agriculture is the nation's leading industry, that in Wichita County there are almost 600 farms with an annual income of over \$7,000 each, and that only three vocational agriculture teachers are located in that county. Dr. Webb also discussed surveys that have been conducted to determine what courses best prepare a student for college. The results of these surveys indicated that no particular combination of courses in high school gave any advantage to the student when he entered college. Those studying vocational courses in high school made college grades just as high as those who did not study vocational courses.

T. L. Leoch, head of the Agricultural Education Department at Texas Tech, and J. B. Payne, supervisor from John Tarleton College, also attended the meeting and gave some interesting observations on the subject.

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Read the Best Books

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**Widowhood Early
Life Fails to Daunt
Mrs. Maymie Smith**

The transition from wife to widow is difficult at best for a woman. When that woman is young and the mother of two children, it can become heart-rend-

ing, emotionally-upsetting and defeating. Mrs. Maymie Lee Smith of Mullins, S. C., and a native of Crowell, faced that problem in January of 1958 when her husband, Bill Gause Smith, died and left her with two boys, Gause, then 9, and Texas, 6. Smith family life had been full.

He was a farmer, a tobacco-nist and a partner in Mullins radio station WJAY. Mrs. Smith even had her own radio program, "Looking Through My Kitchen

Window," a gossipy, folksy sort of thing that had a lot of listeners. Then came the blow and Mrs. Smith, a vivacious, energetic individual with a love for life, recalls:

"I wanted so desperately for someone to say, 'Poor thing, what will she do now.' But instead, everyone said 'You can do it. You must do it. And, well, I guess I just did, but it wasn't easy.'"

Mrs. Smith is very much on the Mullins scene, and she's known

by everyone even though she prefers to call herself an "undercover woman." For instance, sometime ago, she learned that the men who escort the queens-potential to the Mullins Tobacco Festival were depending upon service station rest rooms for bathing and a change of clothes prior to the beauty contest.

She opened her spacious, modern and somewhat unique house to them. For the 1962 festival the young men roamed the house, played her unusual hi-fi and, just

in general, enjoyed her fine hospitality.

She gets behind many civic movements, not in an official capacity, but, in her own way, contributing to success.

Her church work occupies a large part of her life. She's a member of the Macedonia Methodist Church and chairman of its Kate Smith Missionary Circle and has taught nursery and a ladies' class. Right now, she's teaching a college age group, a class she started prior to the death of her husband.

Mrs. Smith once was a professional Girl Scout worker, one of two executives in Arkansas when she met the man who became her husband. She was graduated from West Texas State Teachers College and has done work at Texas Tech, the University of Mexico, the University of Louisiana and Columbia University. She is a native of Crowell.

Because of her background, she wanted a daughter. She has none so has become active in the Boy Scout work of her sons and serves as liaison for the Tussie Mussie Garden Club.

That garden club, incidentally, has one of its projects the beauty spots in and around Mullins. Mrs. Smith, an ardent and competent photographer, has helped the club to build up a library of more than 300 colored slides on those spots.

There's more. Mrs. Smith sold her husband's interest in the radio station (she abandoned her program when she achieved executive capacity), but has clung to the family farm, one of the largest in Marion County.

She had never taken much in-

terest in tobacco prior to her husband's death, but now she's fast becoming an expert. She's right in there with the rest when it's time to harvest those 25 acres of tobacco and 21 acres of cotton. And she points with pride to her "educated barn" where there were three teachers and another college graduate helping with the tying this season.

**Game and Fish
December Violations
Reached a High**

Game and fish law violations ran high in December, according to J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Game and Fish Commission. When all the cases filed for the month were tallied, 488 individual charges had been handled by Commission law enforcement officers. The most violations reported were for hunting at night, according to Phillips, with 80 persons being charged.

Fifty-five persons were charged with failing to have the required resident hunting licenses. Nearly that many, 44, were fined on for fishing without a license. The highest hunting violations were: 27 hunting from a motor vehicle; 27 hunting in closed season; 22 killing deer in closed season; 22 headlighting game animals; 20 untagged deer; 14 killing does; 15 killing ducks in closed season; 11 possession of deer with evidence of sex removed; and 11 illegally killing or hunting deer.

Of the 488 persons filed on, 23 were dismissed, 14 served jail sentences, five were suspended and 9 juvenile cases were dismissed.
