RED CROSS AIDS VICTIMS OF CHILEAN DISASTER

The pulse of America's heartfelt sympathy for people in trouble the world over beats close to the surface at American Red Cross headquarters in Washington.

Come earthquake, tidal wave, fire, epidemic, or any other type of disaster, the humanitarian organization is always among the first to react, either with supplies or trained personnel.

This past week's earthquakes and tidal waves in Chile and Hawaii are cases in point.

Within hours of the disaster, American Red Cross headquarters had sent a cable of sympathy to the Chilean Red Cross along with an initial \$20,000 donation to help with the relief work.

Then it ordered four disaster specialists to Chile to work with the U. S. Ambassador, Walter Howe, in determining the needs of the thousands injured and the 2,000,000 reportedly homeless.

On Friday, President Eisenhower asked General Alfred M. Gruenther, American Red Cross President, "to arrange for the coordination of voluntary material assistance to the Chilean victims."

"I urge all our people promptly to demonstrate once again the great generosity so characteristic of them," the President said. "The Chileans need help of many kinds—medicines, tents, clothing, food, and other things. Cash contributions can be made to the American Red Cross. Contributions of material goods can be made through voluntary organ-

izations which, I am informed, are issuing local appeals." General Gruenther's first act after receiving the President's message was to begin working out large-scale relief plans with such agencies as the Catholic Service, Church World Service, CARE, Seventh Day Adventist, Welfare Service, and Society of Friends.

The American Red Cross also began to organize an airlift of medical supplies and other aid.

In most cases, these products were donated to the Red Cross by the nation's big drug firms and other organizations, recognizing that the Red Cross is an efficient channel for providing aid.

When the tidal wave bore down on Hilo, Hawaii, five more disaster specialists flew across the Pacific to help the Hawaii Chapter care for the homeless and injured.

As the practical agent for America's desire to help others, the organization in the past has found itself in the middle of the Hungarian refugee program in Austria and Germany, caring for Arab refugees in Palestine, and nursing Moroccan prisoners by food cooked in oil used to flush engines of jet planes.

In the past year, it has sent staff or other aid to Morocco, India, Libya, Cyprus, Greece, Iran, Okinawa, Formosa, Japan, Pakistan, and Korea.

The disasters in these countries ranged from a plane crash and floods to earthquakes and typhoons.

Red Cross help is made possible not only by donations from adults but also school children. A special amount made up of donations by youngsters and called the "American Red Cross Children's Fund" is kept on hand at national headquarters. The money is used not only for disaster emergencies but also for a continuing program aimed at building up closer ties with school children in other nations.

The American Red Cross has one of the most complete programs to be found in the Red Cross world. Recognizing this, foreign Red Cross organizations regularly send staff members to the U. S. for technical training.

Two of the most dramatic of the American Red Cross foreign operations are the least publicized. One is the continuing program of sending food parcels to Americans detained in Communist China.

Once each month, a Red Cross field director stationed in the Philippines flies to Hong Kong and hands the parcels over to a Chinese representative at the Lowa bridgehead, the point where the territory of the British Crown Colony runs smack up against Red China.

Since this program began, more than seven tons of food have reached the unfortunate Americans. "A godsend," is what one recently released detainee called them.

The other program helps locate persons missing since World War II and after. It is called the "Foreign Location Inquiry Service" and in the last 10 months it has found and reunited with families or friends approximately 550 persons.

Rotary Lawn Mower Can Be Lethal Weapon

Did you know a rotary power lawn mower blade travels at speeds up to 150 miles per hour and is capable of throwing sticks, stones, or other objects at comparable speeds? Imagine what would happen if you were hit by one of these fast-flying objects.

Power lawn mowers are now in the majority both in town and among farm people. Along with their increased use has been a closely related increase in accidents involving both operators and bystanders. Most accidents have been due to carelessness or lack of knowledge on the part of the individual.

Joe Burkett, county agent, offers these suggestions on how to operate your rotary power lawn mower safely and efficiently.

Always disconnect spark plug wire before working on the blade. A clean sharp blade does a better cutting job and requires less power.

Never operate mower with safety shields removed. Make sure all rocks and debris are removed from the area before close mowing.

Do not refill the gasoline tank when engine is hot or running. Run mower as slow as possible to do good work.

Keep children and pets away from mowers. Always be certain of sure footing when mowing on steep slopes. Never leave engine running when mower is unattended.

Make sure mower is steady and under control before starting engine. Always be aware of the hazards involved when you are using a power mower. Don't get caught napping.

What Happens to Communists

What happens to communists should never happen to a dog. Recently the "London Times" collected some statistics on the subject: Nine of eleven Russian Cabinet ministers who held office since 1936 have been shot. Five of seven presidents of the last Central Executive Committee died likewise. Forty-three out of fifty-three secretaries of the Communist Party Central Organization have been executed. Fifteen of twenty-seven top Communists who drafted the 1936 Constitution faced the firing squad. Seventy out of eighty members of the Soviet War Council were executed. Since 1917 three out of every five marshals of the Soviet Army were shot as spies or traitors. No record was kept of the dissident small fry—Roy K. Honeywell, Plymouth, Pa., Rotary Bulletin.

Farmers Elevator Still Undefeated in Little League Play

Making a clean sweep of its two-game series last week with the Rotary Braves, Farmers Elevator remained undefeated and extended in local Little League play, V. F. W. and Foard County Mill split their two games, with Foard County Mill squeaking by in the Tuesday night game 14 to 13, then losing the Friday 6 p. m. game by a walloping 18-7 count.

Farmers Elevator humbled Rotary 11-1 in the early Tuesday game, then played a closer contest Friday night at 8 p. m., 11-6.

Both Tuesday night contests were snappy games; each game Friday night was sluggish. In the Tuesday 8 p. m. game, Larry Hughton (3 hits) and Randy Adkins (2 hits) featured the offense for the Cardinals, while Bob Bird, Duaine Simmons and Randy Simmons each hit safely twice for V. F. W. In the 6 p. m. game, Lynn Rader with two hits, Lanny Hubble and Mike Nichols with one each, did all the hitting for Rotary as Buddy Myers racked up three hits for the Yankees.

In the 6 p. m. game of Friday, June 3, VFW only got four hits (two by Bob Bird), but 15 free trips to first, coupled with several miscues, scored 18 runs for the Veterans. Foard County Mill hit safely 5 times, but only scored 7 runs. In the 8 p. m. game, Rotary started off the game with a bang as two base hits and a walk scored three runs, but one run in the third inning, two more in the 5th, wound up the scoring for the Braves. Lynn Rader (with 3-for-3) and Roy Perez (with two hits) featured the Rotary attack.

Eddie Diaz and Don Ray Borchardt each garnered two hits for Foard County Mill, but actually good base running after walks played a great part in this victory.

In the one inning playoff between Rotary and Foard County Mill, the Cardinals, behind the pitching of Randy Smith, won by a 13-1 score.

This week's series matches Foard County Mill and Farmers Elevator, while Rotary and VFW try to outscore each other.

The harvest of Foard County's grain crop suddenly broke loose last Friday with the drying up of the fields from the rains of early last week, and long lines of trucks were waiting to unload at the five county elevators all day Friday, Saturday and Sunday, with a light rain Sunday night again stopping harvest operations temporarily.

Latest figures from the elevators show that a total of 1,272,922 bushels of wheat have been delivered to the elevators thus far; in addition to a large quantity of barley and oats. This figure does not include the many thousands of bushels stored on the farms.

Wheat over the county is turning out better than was anticipated earlier in the season, with some 30 or over bushel crops being reported. Test weight of the wheat this year is also exceptionally high, with some weighing 61, 62, 63, and above.

Elevators were extremely rushed Friday, Saturday and Sunday, with long lines of trucks waiting to unload practically all that time. A number of fields were ready to be cut over the week end, but a shortage of combines delayed the cutting. Also, a number of out-of-town combine operators with commitments to cut wheat farther north were already moving on.

Some wheat was dumped on the ground at a Crowell elevator due to the big rush, and considerable quantity of oats and barley were stacked on the ground.

Santa Fe Railway switch engines have been working round the clock moving cars to and from the elevators, and by Monday morning, Tom Ellis, local railway agent, reported that 208 cars of the grain had been shipped from Crowell.

The continuing wet weather has caused some of the combines to move on farther north, but there are still many fields in the county which will be cut as soon as the wet weather ceases.

More Rain Falls Here This Week

Scattered showers, which halted the harvest Monday, continued at intervals this week with the heaviest shower coming Wednesday morning, when .75 inch fell. The showers Monday and Tuesday amounted to about 3 inch.

Only 55 Votes Cast in Second Democratic Primary Saturday

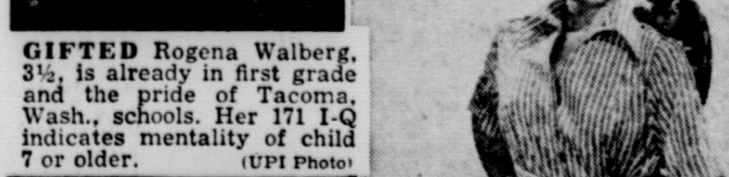
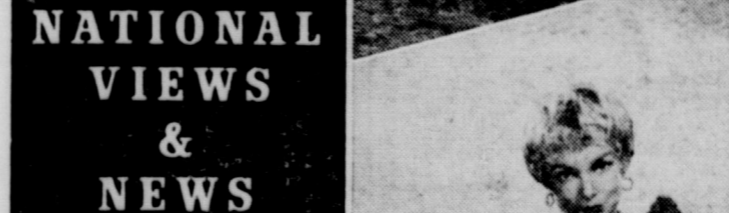
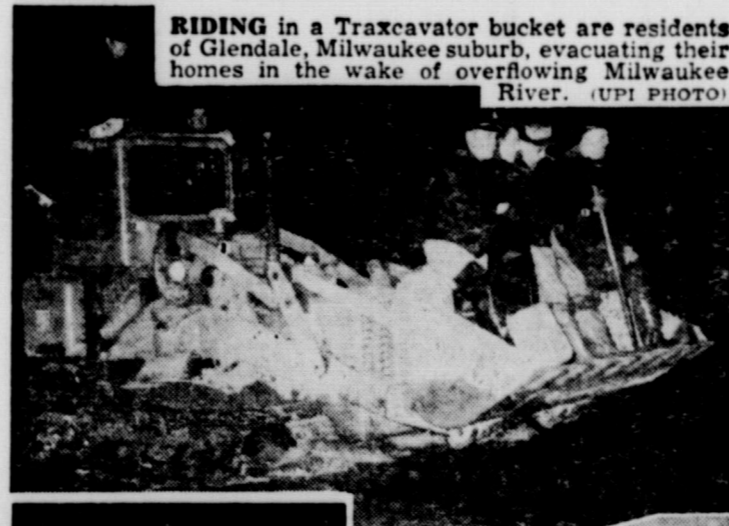

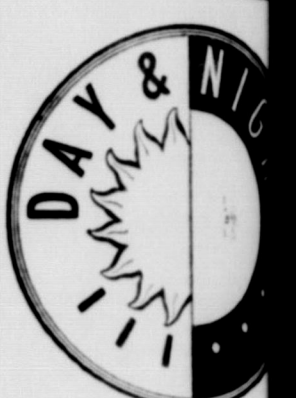
Vanilla Drops
1 cup soft margarine or butter,
1 cup sugar, 1 egg, 2 tsp. vanilla,
2 and 1/2 cups sifted flour, 2 tsp.
baking powder, 1/4 cup milk.

Cream margarine or butter with the sugar until very light and fluffy. Add the egg and vanilla and beat well. Sift flour, measure and sift again with baking powder. Add to the creamed mixture alternately with the milk, blending thoroughly. Drop by rounded teaspoonfuls onto an ungreased shallow baking sheet, 2 inches apart. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) 10 to 12 minutes until edges are golden. Makes about 4 dozen.

Coconut Drops: Stir in shredded or flaked coconut.

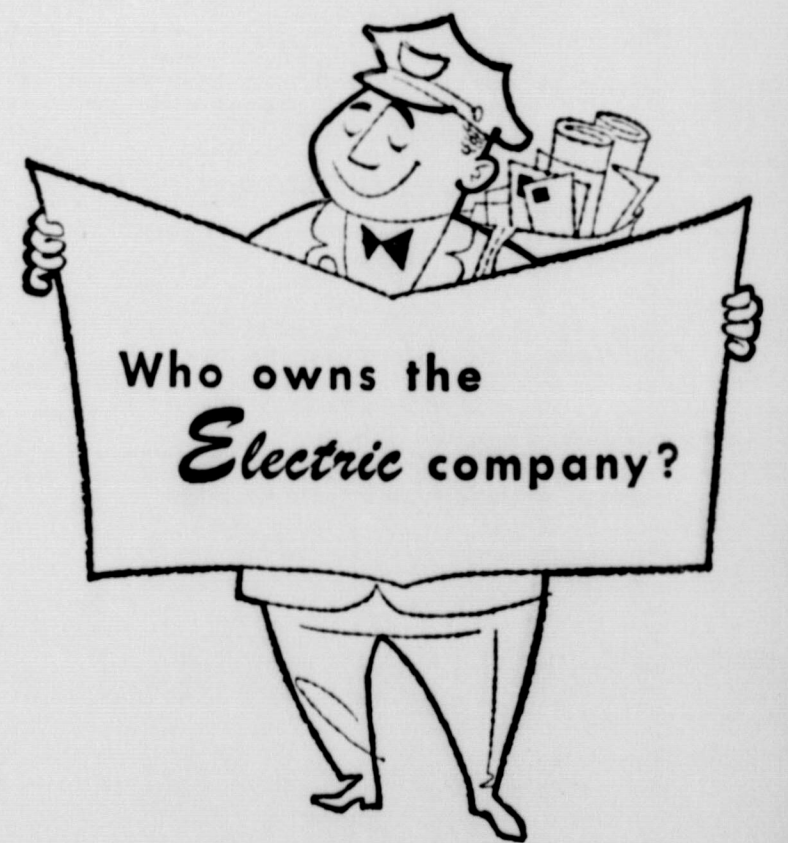

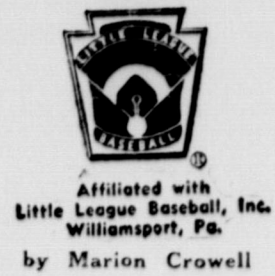

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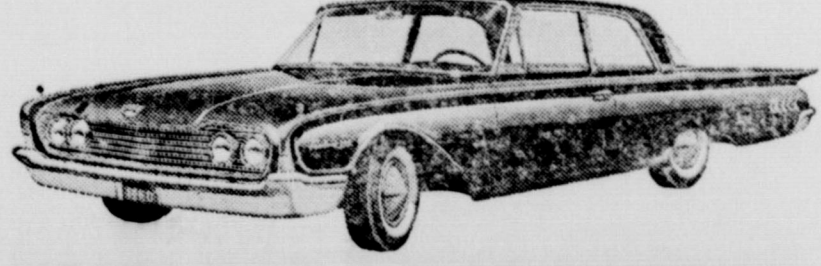

Controversy Over Raise of Interest Rate

There has been much controversy over the Administration proposal to raise the legal interest rate on long-term government bonds. In an article explaining why the rate is now too low, Time says: "Every economist agrees that the U. S. Treasury is in a tough spot to refund Government issues that are constantly coming due. With top-grade corporate issues bringing more than 5 per cent, the Treasury cannot sell long-term bonds limited to a 4 1/2 per cent ceiling. The Treasury is forced to get its money by short-term issues, has to keep going to the market to raise cash, thus disrupting short-term borrowing for business and helping to drive up rates.

DONATIONS NEEDED FOR CHILE DISASTER VICTIMS

Hundreds of thousands of Chileans are cold, sick, injured, and homeless.

It's a natural characteristic of Americans to want to help people in trouble the world over. The Chilean disaster has proved no exception. Committees for Chilean relief are forming throughout the nation. Tons of food, medical supplies, tents, and other aid have been airlifted to help the homeless and helpless.

But this is only the beginning. American Red Cross disaster experts in the disaster-wracked country report a long-range recovery program of gigantic proportions is needed to put Chile back on its feet.

The supplies are certainly needed. But a look at the map proves that the most efficient way for Americans can help is with funds. Nearly 5,000 miles separate us from the stricken area. The cost of collecting, packing, and shipping donations would be staggering.

But with money, the urgently

needed help can be purchased in areas near to the disaster scene and promptly distributed to points where they will do the most good. That's why we urge immediate contributions to the American Red Cross or other agencies having programs in Chile. They include Catholic Relief Service, Church World Service, CARE, Seventh Day Adventists Welfare Service, and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

All are working closely with the Red Cross, whose president, General Alfred M. Gruenther, is acting as coordinator for voluntary Chilean relief at the request of President Eisenhower.

As General Gruenther has said, "The impact of voluntary contributions by individuals on the suffering people of Chile will be tremendous."

Time-Honored Notion Not Necessarily So

According to Newsweek, the time-honored notion that the executive suffers more from tension than the "happy-go-lucky working staff" isn't necessarily so. For example, one check showed that 12 per cent of executives suffered from hypertension, and 8 per cent from hardened arteries. The figure for non-executives, in both cases, was 15 per cent.

Political Cancer

"The 'grants-in-aid' thing has been growing like a political cancer. Senator Byrd points out that in 1934 the Congress approved the spending of \$126 million in this fashion, but by 1959 the amount spent by grants-in-aid had soared to \$6 1/2 billion ladled out to States and local units, an additional \$3 billion was distributed to 'individuals within states.'" — Albert Lea, Minn., Evening Tribune.

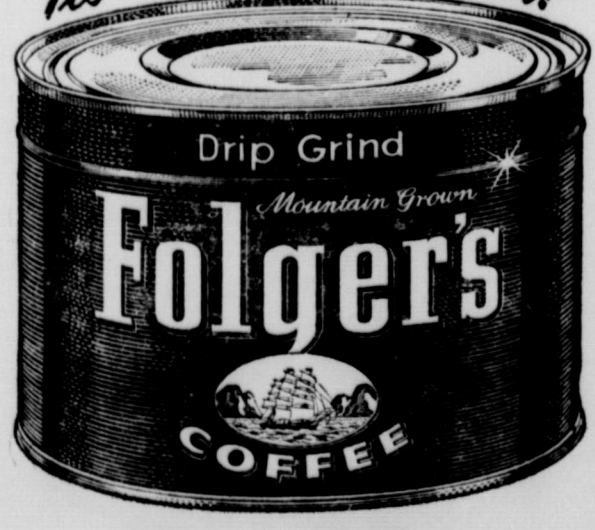

Austin, Tex.—Texas Highway Department soon will come out with a brochure aimed at attracting out-of-state tourists to Texas.

Publication of the booklet with State Highway funds has been okayed by Attorney General Will Wilson. State Comptroller questioned the legality of using road use tax revenue for non-highway purposes, and the Attorney General's opinion as to legality was requested.

Actually, the brochure sticks pretty close to the road. It contains a map of the Texas highway system, tells about traffic laws and highway markers and makes a strong appeal for safe driving.

Its publication was defused legal on grounds that to refuse authorization would, in effect, declare unconstitutional the amendment approved by the people to allow advertising of Texas with state funds.

Expense of the brochure, said Wilson's opinion, "will be refunded to the highway program many times due to the great increase in automobile travel and the resultant increase in gasoline taxes."
