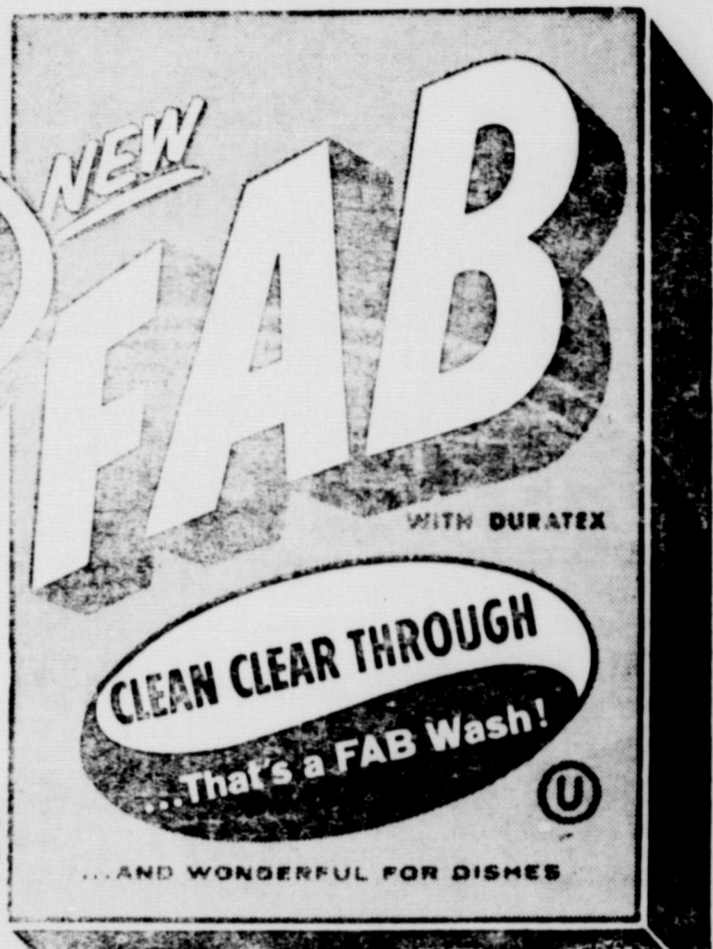

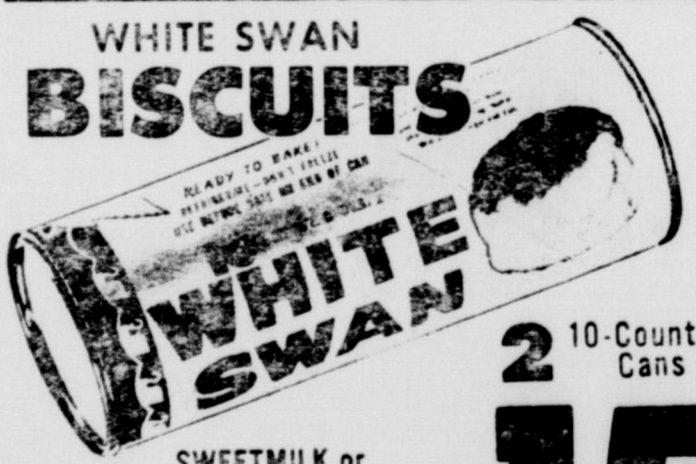



STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Tex.—A family trying to get all slicked up to make a good impression on an important company can't take time out for a domestic squabble. On this premise, the Texas Industrial Commission, whose job is to lure new industry to Texas, voted to steer clear of political hassles and concentrate on putting the best foot forward.

Hands Off Houston

As a long believer of local control for local matters, Gov. Price Daniel said he would not intervene in affairs of the Houston Public School system. For weeks Houston schools have been in a squeeze between a federal court order to begin gradual integration and a state law which says it will lose state aid if it does.

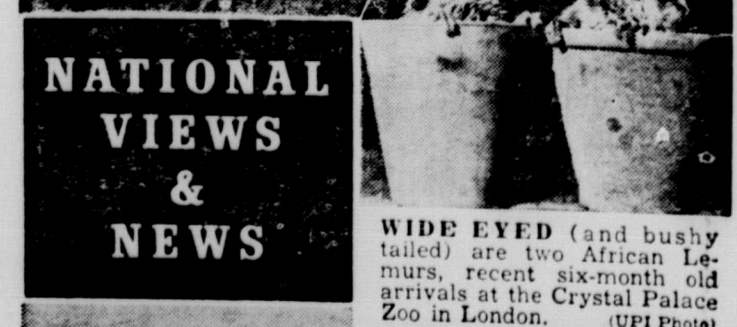
