



The United States abandoned the gold standard Tuesday night, as a result of President Roosevelt's action to raise commodity prices at home and restore languishing trade abroad.

George Self was elected president of the Crowell Rotary Club at the Wednesday meeting.

The fire insurance key rate of Crowell will be reduced two cents as the result of the construction of a non-combustible roof on the city water pump house this week. This will bring the key rate to 58 cents.

Announcement was made last week of the marriage of Homer McBeath to Miss Florence Bell on March 5. Mrs. McBeath is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Bell of Crowell and Mr. McBeath is a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. McBeath of Thalia.

The Truscott high school and all others are proud of Louie Cure, who went to district track at Abilene and brought back the trophy for shot put. He threw 43 feet and 9 inches. They are also proud of the others who went: Dennis Eubank, Doc Abbott and Bud Myers.

Miss Hazel Todd was hostess to a weiner roast on Wednesday evening at her home east of Crowell. The crowd gathered at the tank on the side of the road. 




