"The main job of the district is to help farmers or ranchers make conservation farm or ranch plans and carry out these plans. If you are contacted or request help from your district, a conservationist of the SCS will help you revise your plans or carry out your planned practices.

"If you are a cooperater with the district, check over your original conservation farm or ranch plan and see if there are items you need help on prior to being contacted by conservationist of the SCS. If you want help now contact your district supervisor and he will see that the soil conservationist assigned to work in your district will contact you for a date on your farm or ranch."

Be Sure Your Social Security Account Is Correct, Says Mr. Tate

Do you know why the Social Security Administration wants you to be sure your social security account is correct? "Because the right of you and your family to retirement, survivors and disability payments depends on it," answers Erton Tate, district manager of the Wichita Falls social security office.

Every year is important, continued Mr. Tate, in building up your future benefits. For example, if you have reached retirement age this year, you will need at least 4½ years of earnings on your account to qualify for benefits. If your retirement age is after June 30, 1960, you will need even more credits. Illustrating this, he said, if you were born in 1906 or later, (a woman born in 1909 or later) you will need 10 years of social security credits to get retirement benefits. He also added that you will need at least 5 years of social security credits for disability payments.

Mr. Tate pointed out that it is easy to check your social security account to make sure you are getting credit for your earnings each and every year. The checking should be done at least once every 3 years. He added that the social security office will furnish you with a special postcard which you can use to request a statement of your earnings. To get the card write, call or visit the social security office at Wichita Falls and ask for card form 7004. The service of providing you with a record of your earnings is furnished free of charge.

Tate concluded that all people who contribute toward social security have an obligation to themselves and their families to take the simple precaution of checking their social security records at regular intervals. This obligation applies not only if you work for wages as an employee but also if you work for yourself and report your self-employment income with your annual income tax return.

Without Federal Intervention

According to Washington Report, a publication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, some 680,000 new school classrooms have been built since World War II. So, of the 1,330,000 classrooms that will be in use this fall, more than half will be of postwar construction. Communities have stayed ahead of enrollment requirements for classrooms, it adds—"without federal intervention!"

One of the favorite sayings of our grandfather was "There's no need to lock the barn door after the horse is stolen."



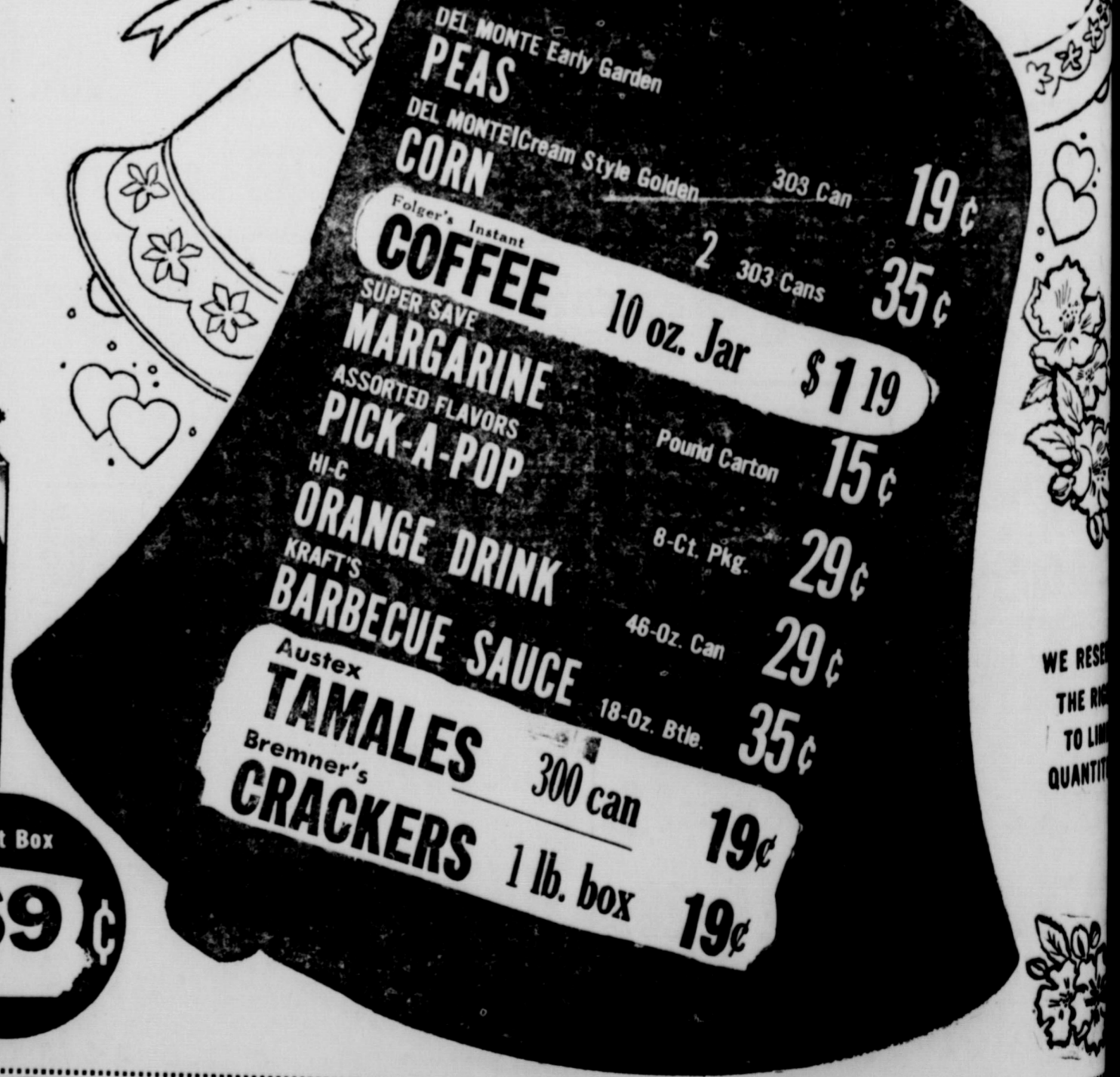

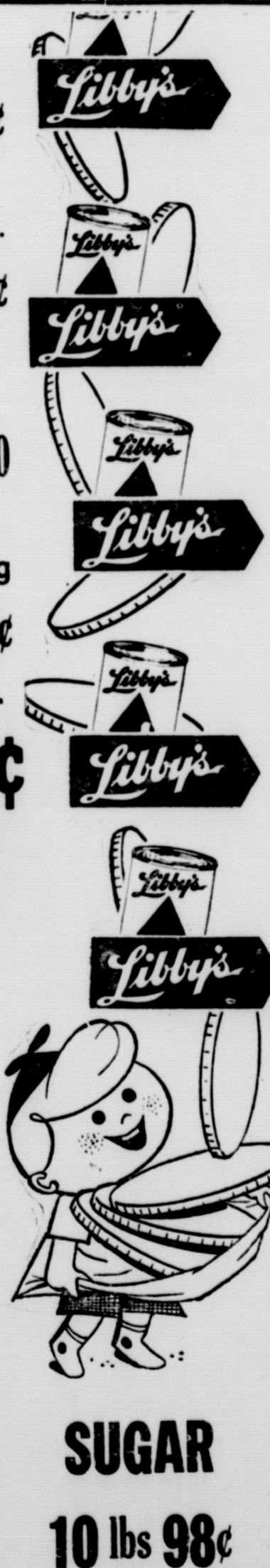
