Newsweek says, under the title The Great Bank Robbery": For Americans wondering why the U. S. soil-bank program has not been more successful in holding down the staggering farm surpluses, U S. Comptroller General Joseph Campbell had an answer . . . Of all the 23 million acres that have gone into the soil bank, nearly one-quarter (or 5.4 million acres) of the 'idle' land had not been producing crops anyway . . . Campbell said owners of fallow acreage have been paid \$54 million a year for five years. Thus the government, now moving to halt the abuses, spent a total of \$270 million to reduce crops that never existed."

Russian Medicine Below U. S. Standards

The overall quality of Russian medicine is "well below" that of the United States, according to "Today's Health" magazine. It says: "The state insists on medi cal services to all citizens, but it gives the physician a limited bud-get, insufficient laboratory personnel and equipment, and saddles him with a patient and ad-ministrative load far in excess of that which any physician can handle and still practice a high quality of medicine."
