WILDCATS TAKE 42-6 WIN OVER CHILlicothe

Crowell Wildcats, in a Division 1-A contest, defeated the Chillicothe Eagles 42-6 here Friday.

The Wildcats, on its first series, failed to move the ball. Tommy Lankford dropped into punt formation and booting the ball into the waiting arms of the Eagles. The conversion again failed.

The Eagles again ran into trouble on their fourth down punting attempt and Cummings returned the boot 70 yards for another Crowell counter. Johnson's try for conversion was blocked.

Crowell scored once again before time ran out in the first half when reserve fullback John Stone rammed over from two yards out for the tally. Johnson's kick was perfect and the Wildcats took a 39-0 lead into the dressing room at half time.

In the second half of play the Eagles looked like a new ball club. A pass from Lankford to Noel King for 45 yards, pass and run, gave the Eagles their first counter, still early in the third period. The try for point fell short.

Then the ball game turned into a defensive standoff until late in the fourth quarter when the Wildcats' Johnson booted a 15-yard field goal with 2:11 left on the clock. The win gave the Wildcats their ninth straight victory.

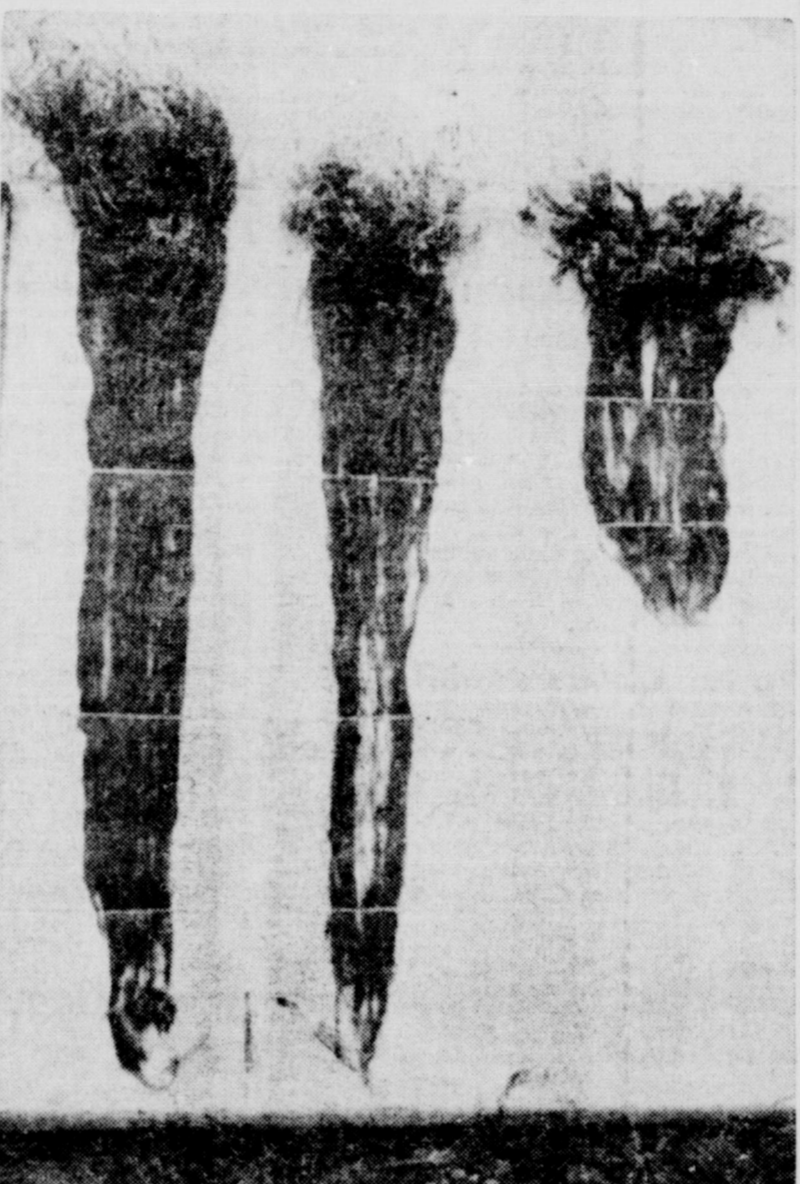

Range Recovery



The three grass plants in the picture above show the difference between an ungrazed plant, a properly grazed plant, and an overgrazed plant of buffalo grass. Buffalo grass is commonly found on most ranges in Foard County.

Louis Stone, who farms in the southeast part of the county, said recently "Over-grazed ranges have made exceptional recovery through deferred grazing and proper use."

Mr. Stone is a cooper with the Lower Pease River Soil Conservation District and is carrying out a basic conservation plan assisted by conservationist Norman R. Davis of the local work unit.

Deferred grazing simply means a complete rest with no grazing for a period of time, usually one or more growing seasons, according to Davis.

Most ranchers understand deferred grazing, but this business of proper use is a term which seems to need more explanation. Davis continued. Proper use is the opposite of abuse or over-use.

When no more than 50 per cent by volume weight of the grass plant is grazed off, you have proper use. The remaining 50 per cent top growth is necessary to maintain a healthy root system which after all is the main source through which the plant gets water and minerals for re-growth.

When properly used, the roots may be as much as 5 feet deep (about the same as when not grazed at all). When more than 50 per cent is grazed off, the roots will die back to about 2 1/2 feet.

The better the root system, the more grass will be produced. So it follows that a range in good physical condition will produce more pounds of beef per acre than one in poor condition.

If you are interested in more grazing without additional acres of rangeland, let proper use be your guide to more use.

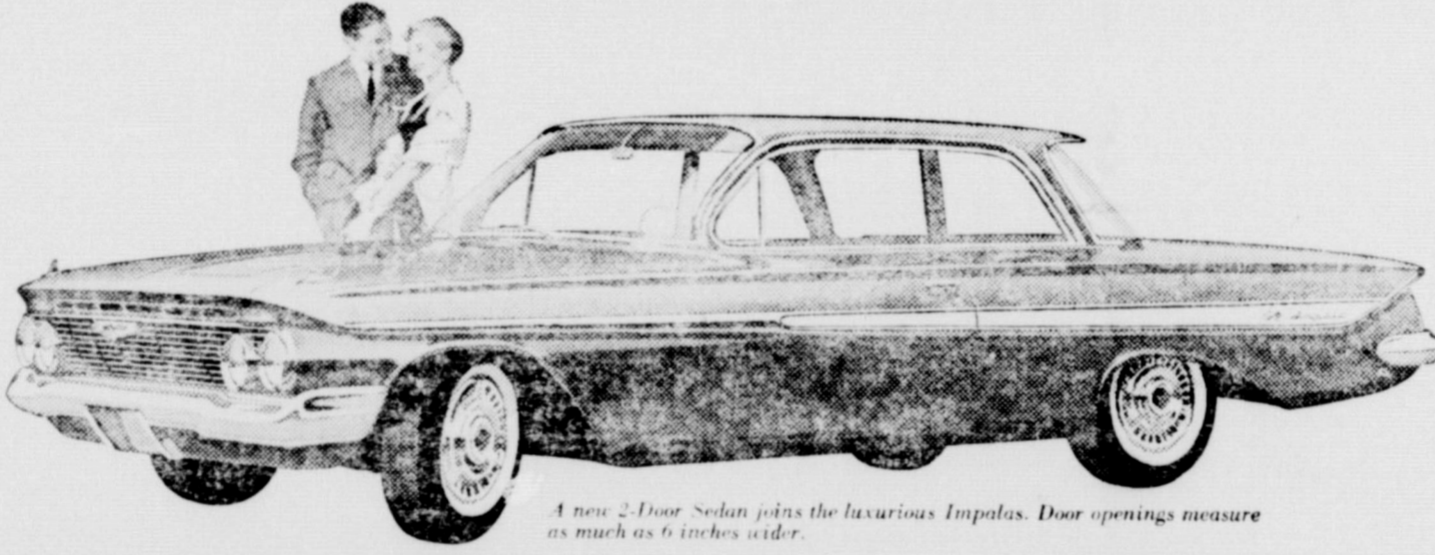

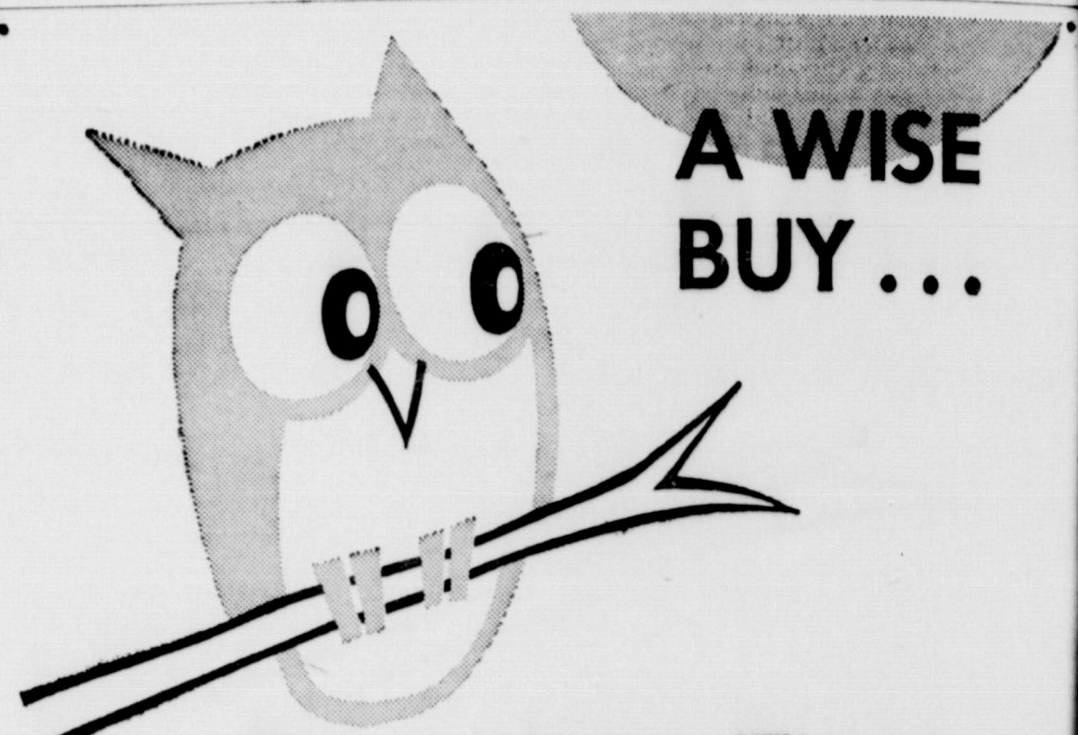
