



### **Camp Fire Girls** Organized in Crowell

Other factors considered were: (1) According to the by-laws of NorCenTex Girl Scout Council, title to all property, with the exception of troop equipment, must be held in the name of the council; (2) Crowell Girl Scouts were told that if they wanted day camping, they cou only get it at Paducah. (Had Crowell been consulted, it would have preferred the shorter distance at Quanah). (3) Since the formation of the council, Crowell has submitted over \$190 to the council, yet its leaders have received no official visits though requests have been made to the council office; (4) Crowell Scouts sold 50 cases of cookies, and its 22 1/2 c per box sent to council did not apply to Crowell's share in the budget. The Girl Scout council states Crowell still owes \$224 for 1962, and has been ask ed to submit \$431 for 1963; (5) Crowell was allowed only 8 girls for the established camp at Ardmore, Okla., despite the fact that 10 had attended for 3 previous




