Earl G. Harrison, Director of Alien Registration of the Department, suggestes that those aliens who have not yet registered do so as soon as possible and avoid the Christmas rush at the post offices.

All aliens are also warned that, having registered, they are required to report any change in their permanent residence address within five days to the Immigrat ion Service of the Department of Justice in Washington, Forms for this purpose are obtainable November 29th and 30th, at all post offices.






