Cotton Marketing Quota Referendum Will Be Voted On December 7th.

Ever Cotton producer who believes in democracy should go to the polls December 7th and voice his opinion of cotton marketing quotas.

For the cotton marketing quota referendum is part of the democratic process, J. L. Farmer, chairman of the Callahan County A. C. A. Committee, pointed out today.

Last year in the referendum, 240 of the 920 county farmers who were eligible to vote participated in the election, 70 percent of them favoring quotas in Texas was 82 percent and in the nation 91.2 percent.

"Voting in the referendum is just as important as voting in an other election," Mr. Farmer said. "The outcome of the marketing quota referendum will affect every cotton farmer in the county, so every cotton farmer should vote.

Polling places in Callahan County will be located at the following places: Clyde, Eula, Denton, Oplin, Dudley, Lanham, Putnam, Cross Plains, Dressy, Rowden, Baird, and Brooks Store in Erath.

Cotton Referendum Voting Eligibility

All farmers who produce cotton in 1940 are eligible to vote in the December 7 referendum to determine if cotton marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1941 crop, J. L. Farmer, chairman of the Callahan County A. C. A. Committee, points out.

Under the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, marketing quotas are applicable to all cotton except that with a staple length of 1 1-2 inches or more. Each 1940 cotton producer, whether owner, tenant, or sharecropper, will be entitled to one vote.

The County A. C. A. Committee be in charge of all arrangements for the referendum in the county and the voting will be carried out as in any other election. Farmer says: The committee will choose three local farmers to serve as the referendum committee in each community. Convenient voting places will be provided for all communities where cotton is produced.

The county committee will designate the voting place in each community and see that a ballot box is provided at the polling places. Voting places will be open from 8:30 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. on the day of referendum. Voting will be by secret ballot, which means that each farmer will mark his ballot privately as in other elections.

"The questions to be decided December 7th is whether quotas will be used in connection with the 1941 cotton crop. 'Farmer states: 'If two-thirds of the voting farmers approve, quotas will be in effect and will apply to all States, counties, and communities where cotton is produced.

He urges Callahan County farmers to consider the quota provisions and the present cotton situation closely and to vote their own convictions. He emphasizes that, regardless of how they vote, all eligible growers should cast their ballots to make the vote as representative as possible.

1940 Agricultural Conservation Checks Arriving

On November 1, 1940 the first agricultural conservation checks were received. To date a total of 252 checks covering 176 applications for payment, have been received by E. L. Pierson, county administrative officer of the Callahan County Agricultural Conservation Association, amounting to \$16,879.68. These payments were received by those producers who had earned their total soil-building allowance for the farm.

The applications for operators of all farms which have not earned their total soil-building allowance are now ready for the signatures of the operators and each person who is anticipating a 1940 payment who has not signed his application is urged to come to the county A. C. A. office at his earliest convenience and sign the application. All applications for producers who have complied with the Program can be sent to the State Office for payment as soon as they are signed after December 1, 1940.

Boy Scout Drive Launched

Baird's part in the new and intensive drive to put over Boy Scout work in Callahan County will be launched with a breakfast at the T and P. Cafe Friday morning, December 6, at 7 a. m. After the breakfast, at which plans for the drive will be completed, the people of Baird will be solicited to help in this new and intensive drive to bring the Boy Scout Program to every eligible boy in Callahan County.

Coleman, Callahan, and Shackelford Counties have been designated as a new Scout Area in the Chisholm Trail Council and the work in this area will be handled by a Field Scout Executive who will devote his entire time to the Scout Program in these three counties. A recent survey of Callahan County shows that there are about five hundred boys of Scout age and another five hundred boys of Cub Scout age in the county. At the present time there are only eighty Boy Scouts and no Cubs receiving the benefits of Scouting in Callahan County, leaving a total of nine hundred and twenty boys of Scout and Cub age that are not being reached by the Boy Scout Program.

A budget of \$3,600 has been set up building the Boy Scout work in Coleman, Callahan, and Shackelford Counties. Coleman and Albany are finishing their drive and Baird will launch its drive Friday, December 6.

The Baird Boy Scout Drive is under the direction of T. A. White, who is chairman of the Steering Committee, composed of J. Brice Jones, O. C. Yarbrough, Jack Ashlock and R. L. Elliott, Jr. The men will be divided into five teams with three men on each team. These men will call upon the citizens of Baird for sustaining memberships and contributions for an organization being perfected to permanently carry on Boy Scout work in Baird and Callahan County. Price of membership will range from 50 cents and \$1.00 per month up to any amount the individual wishes to contribute.

We want a full-time field executive for Shackelford, Callahan and Coleman Counties, so that we can provide an intensified program that will reach every boy who would be interested in becoming a member of the Boy Scouts of America. Over the period of the next five years, though the services of a field executive in these three counties, we will be able to build up the number of Scout units from the present number of fifteen to forty-five, the number of boys from 330 to approximately 1,300, along with this growth would come a greatly increased program of activities and training that will lead to higher quality Scouting with the best men in every community vitally interested in the program.

Wheat Crop Insurance Report

Last year 179 Callahan County farmers, as a matter of good business, took out crop insurance on their 1940 wheat crop.

When harvest time rolled around this year 42 of them had suffered crop losses, either total or partial, from drought and hail but loss of their crops did not mean the loss of their incomes.

Sound business practice had demanded that those farmers insure their crops: sound business practice demanded that 208 of the county's farmers insure their 1941 harvests.

In this county the insured production for 1940 totaled 34,500 bu. on 4,446 acres for which the farmers paid 4,821 bushels or \$3,097.32, to the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation in premiums. Indemnities amounting to 5,821 bushels were collected by farmers in the county when losses were suffered on 979.3 acres.

Over the state other counties were having similar experiences, as 5,385 indemnity claims, totaling 1,665,236 bushels, were paid to Texas farmers by the corporation. Texas wheat producers, 10,987 of them, had paid 1,070,715 bushels in premiums to insure the production of 5,183,755 bu. of wheat on 839,930 acres.

Notice Wheat Producers

In 1941 producers who have overplanted their wheat allotment by more than 3 acres or 3 percent, whichever is larger, will not be permitted to seed some other grain with the wheat after performance is checked and thus charge the classification to a mixture and place the farm in compliance.

If the acreage of seeded wheat on your farm is in excess of the wheat allotment by more than 3 acres or 3 percent of the allotment, which ever is larger, it will, therefore, not be possible for you to effect compliance by removing this excess acreage. Regardless of the use or disposition made of this excess, a deduction will be made of the over seeding.

Range Conservation Payments Received

Out of approximately \$35,000 expected to be received under the 1940 Range Conservation Program \$6,100.50 on 25 range applications has been received by E. L. Pierson, treasurer of the Callahan County Agricultural Conservation Association. Additional payments are expected soon.

The injured man was rushed to the Callahan County Hospital, where he died a few minutes later.

The accident occurred at the intersection of highway 80 and the new Coleman-Albany highway as Mr. Lovell and Robert Edwards were hauling lumber to the Edwards place east of Baird where Mr. Lovell was doing some construction work.

The body was prepared for burial by the Wylie Funeral Home and carried Wednesday afternoon to Carbon, the home of his parents for burial.

Mr. Lovell has been living in Baird for twelve years and had many friends here, who regret his tragic death.

Emmett Lovell who was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Lovell was born August 23, 1905 near Carbon who survive him. He is also survived by six sisters and two brothers. All Aliens Must Register By Dec. 26

Alien registration will end on December 26 and all non-citizens who have not yet registered are warned that severe penalties will follow failure to comply with this Federal law.

All aliens, 14 years of age and older, must register in person and be fingerprinted.

Registration takes place at the post offices.

There is no charge of any kind connected with alien registration.

The Department of Justice warns aliens to beware of racketeers.

The Post Office Department and the Department of Justice will willingly assist the alien in every possible way.

Earl G. Harrison, Director of Alien Registration of the Department, suggests that those aliens who have not yet registered do so as soon as possible and avoid the Christmas rush at the post offices.

All aliens are also warned that, having registered, they are required to report any change in their permanent residence address within five days to the Immigration Service of the Department of Justice in Washington. Forms for this purpose are obtainable at all post offices.

No alien need be unprepared for the questions he will be asked. Sample registration forms which show him exactly what information he will need at registration are available in all post offices.

Ace Hickman Is Chairman of Highway Week

Ace Hickman of Baird, is to be chairman of the Observance of Texas Highway Week, Dec 2 to 6 inclusive, in Callahan County, it is announced by the Texas Good Roads Association, sponsor of the week.

Mr. Hickman has accepted appointment to head the committee to arrange and stage the Highway Week program in this county and will work out details and name committees to assist with arrangements for the event, the Association's office at Austin advises.

Texas Highway Week will be observed throughout the entire state during the designated week by proclamation of Governor W. Lee O'Daniel and the public is urged by the proclamation to take increased interest in their state highway system and its needs. Officials and civic leaders of the state, counties, cities and towns will lead in arranging public meetings and celebrations during the period. The Texas Good Roads Association and the State Highway Department are cooperating in helping plan state-wide observance.

The Governor's proclamation designating the week called upon all citizens "to take inventory of the manifold blessings brought to them by the highways of this state to consider the progress that has been made in the past towards a complete highway system, and to give serious thought to the future highway needs of the state so that Texas will continue to grow and prosper as its system of highway transportation is extended and improved."

Motor vehicle transportation has experienced phenomenal growth in Texas during the last two decades, the proclamation said, and it pointed out that in the last fiscal year 1,758,761 motor vehicles were registered, as compared with only 434,628 in 1920.

Not only have peace time needs for more and better highways rapidly increased, but now in view of the national defense program and the mechanization and motorization of the rapidly expanding Army, new and heavy demands will be made on the Texas highway system as a result, the proclamation declared, Texas, being one of the most important states in the national defense program on account of its extensive coastline and the long international border on the south has 6,375 miles of highways that have been designated by proper national defense agencies as strategic military highways.

While relating that highways, as the base of motor transportation, have revolutionized trade, commerce, industry and agriculture in Texas, and have contributed immeasurably to Texas' growth and prosperity, Governor O'Daniel's proclamation also added that:

"Recent surveys by cooperating state and federal agencies have disclosed that the state highway system is far from complete and that it would require an expenditure of approximately \$385,000,000 to bring the Texas highway system to a standard regarded as modern in the light of existing traffic demands. There are 8,860 miles on the state system only partially improved, 5,600 miles in need of reconstruction, 4,836 miles of farm-to-market roads in need of construction, and additional designations pending before the Highway Commission totalling 3,116 miles. Safety on the highways has become a problem of increasing social and economic importance, it was also added: The building of safety features into the highway system has become a major item in highway needs."

The Texas Good Roads Association is urging observance of Texas Highway Week in every county city and town possible and is busy with plans for statewide celebration of the week. Datus E. Proper, executive vice-president of the Association, announced.



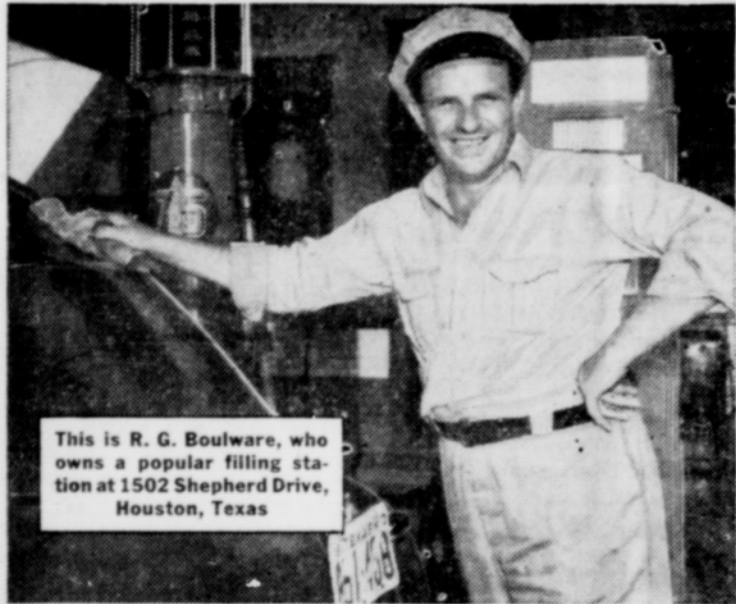

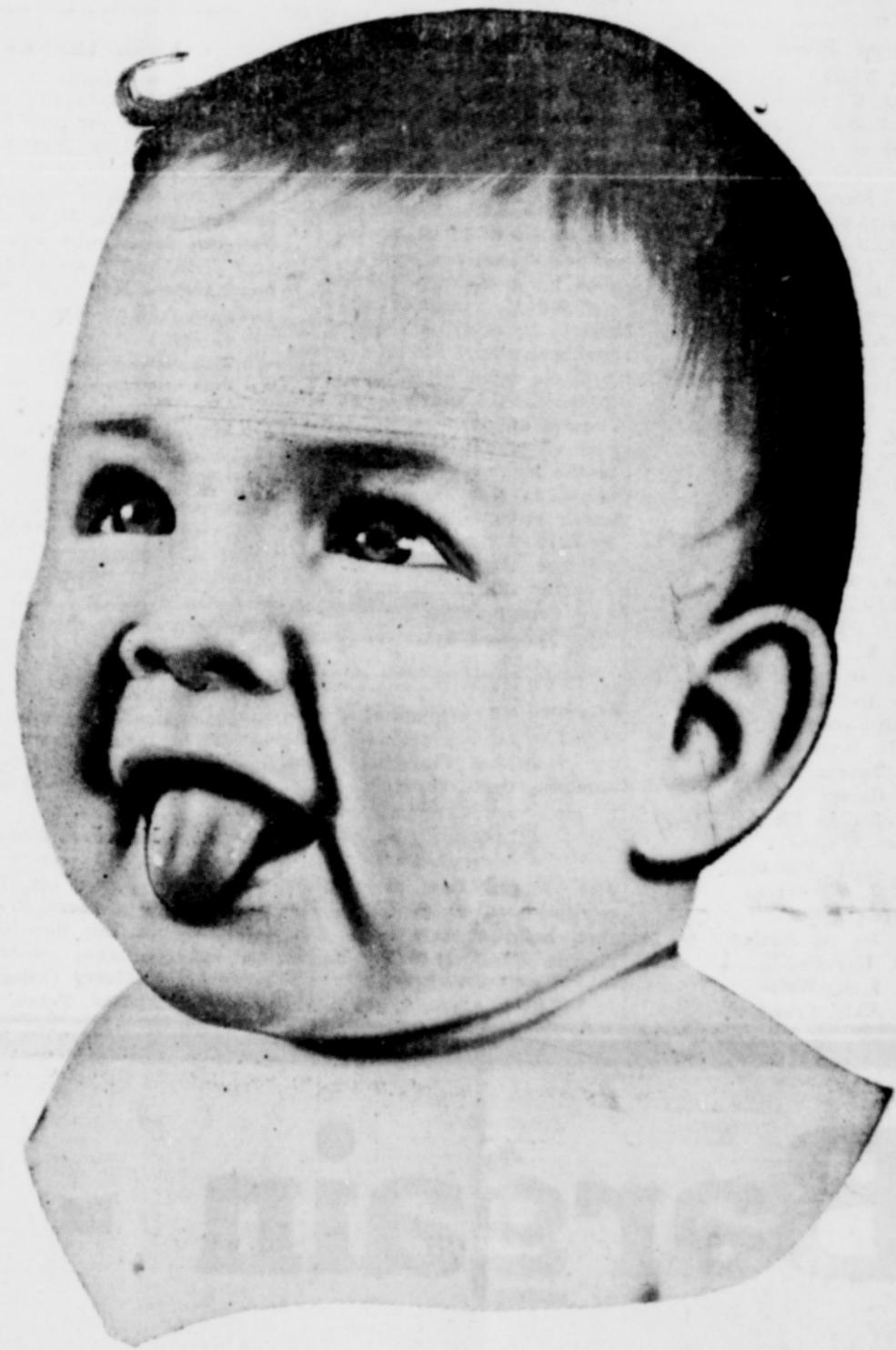

Game Department Sends Out Tested Receipt For Cooking Venison

Tens of thousands of Texas deer hunters are bringing home venison this season and many wives do not know how to properly prepare venison. The results of their attempts are often soggy, greasy pieces of meat which is as tough as the hide of a loughorn. Thus the following receipts, tested and approved by members of the Game Department may be of some help. Venison is a dry meat. The Fernandez family receipt, which is famous in the Rio Grande Valley, overcomes the dryness. A roast, or an entire leg is prepared for roasting by making numerous deep slits in it. Into these are thrust pieces of ham or bacon which have been rolled in paper or salt. The meat is then seared and placed in a roaster. A bay leaf or two and cloves are placed on top. The top of the roast is then well moistened with orange juice or a combination of citrus fruit juices and juice is added as needed in quantities sufficient to keep the roast from drying out. It is simmered in a slow oven until tender. The juice imparts a decidedly different and delicious flavor to the venison. Venison steaks are best when fried rare. The Tucker receipt calls for the steaks to be cooked in a very hot fat, deep enough to cover the steaks.
