## Local Prospects for Highway Patrol to Be Interviewed Here

Patrolman F. E. Johnson of the Texas Highway Patrol of Paducah this week invited men in the Crowell area who feel they are "just a little better than the average" to meet him at the court house in Crowell between 7 and 8 p. m. on August 26 to try out for a job in the Patrol Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"There are good jobs open for young men between 21 and 35 who can qualify," said Patrolman Johnson, "and while we want men who are much better than average to fill them, we will go along with those who are just a little bit better."

"These are career positions which offer much in the way of security in benefits, but they are gained only after a period of 16 weeks of rugged training at one of the outstanding police academies in the nation. Upon completion of this training, men will be assigned whenever possible within 100 miles of their home town at a basic salary of \$453 per month. Any interested young man is invited to meet with Patrolman Johnson next Monday night.

## Highway Patrol Reports One Accident in County in July

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Foard County during July, Sgt. D. R. Dowdy, Highway Patrol Supervisor, said this week.

This wreck accounted for two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$800.00.

## 134-Barrel-Per-Day Producer on L. K. Johnson Land

Texaco Inc. has completed the No. 23 L. K. Johnson in a newly opened Cisco pay area in Foard County.

During 18-hour test, the well flowed 100.57 barrels of 50.5 gravity crude for a calculated 24-hour potential of 133.92 barrels. Flow was through 32-64-inch choke from 20 perforations at 3855-65 feet with 35 pounds pressure on casing and 20 pounds on tubing.

Gas-oil ratio was 398-1. Pay was fractured. Hole was bottomed at 4400 feet and plugged back to 4379 after 5 1/2-inch casing was cemented at 4394 feet.

Producer is 15 miles southwest of Crowell, Christopher Choate survey.

**Selective Service  
Board to Call 10 for  
Induction in Sept.**

State draft boards will get their  
biggest monthly quota in nearly  
two years in September.  
The call for September asks  
for 609 men for Army service,  
Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Se-  
lective Service director, said this  
week. This is the biggest state  
quota since November 1961 when  
the quota was 923.  
The September call of 609 com-  
pares with 552 for August, 349  
for July and 187 for June. The  
September call is the state's share  
of a national quota of 12,000  
men. The state Selective Service  
director also announced pre-in-  
duction physical and mental ex-  
aminations for 2,060 men in Sep-  
tember. Local board quotas for  
the September call already have  
been figured and sent to the state's  
137 local boards.  
The September quota will be  
filled with men who are at least  
22 years old on September 1, ex-  
cept volunteers and those legally  
termed delinquent under the law,  
who may be younger.  
Local Board 131 has 10 for  
physical examination and 10 men  
for induction for September.

NOTICE  
 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
 ON THE BALLOT

Section 4. In all elections for  
 people the vote shall be by secret  
 ballot. The Legislature shall provide  
 for the numbering of ballots and for  
 such other regulations as may be  
 necessary to detect and prevent  
 fraud and preserve the purity of the  
 ballot and may provide by law for the  
 alteration of all voters. Should the  
 Legislature enact a regulation in  
 anticipation of the adoption of this  
 Amendment, such law shall not be  
 invalid by reason of its anticipatory  
 character.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional  
 Amendment shall be submitted to a  
 vote of the qualified voters of the  
 state at an election to be held on the  
 first Monday in November, 1964, at  
 which election all ballots shall be  
 save printed thereon the following  
 words: "FOR the amendment of the  
 Constitution of the State of Texas  
 so as to repeal the provision making  
 payment of the poll tax a  
 requirement for voting and  
 as to authorize the Legislature  
 to provide for the regulation of  
 all voters."

Section 3. The Governor of  
 the State of Texas shall issue the  
 necessary proclamation for the  
 election and this Amendment shall be  
 placed on the ballot in the manner and  
 for the length of time as required by  
 the Constitution and laws of this  
 State.

### Solid Grounds for Reassurance

Chairman of the Board, M. J.
