



for Reassurance

Chairman of the Board, M. J. Rathbone, of the Standard Oil Company (New Jersey) looks at the oil situation: ". . . we have solid grounds for reassurance that petroleum resources are abundant relative to foreseeable demand. But I must attach one final 'if.' Oil companies will continue to press the world search for oil, with all its heavy costs and risks, only to the extent that excessive taxes or restricting regulations by governments do not discourage such investments. If wise policies are adhered to by the governments of the world-all of which have a tremendous stake in a healthy oil industry-then we can expect that oil's important role both as a fuel and as a chemical raw material will continue through this twentieth century, and in all probability for many generations after that."


