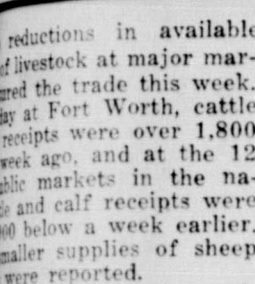

Mr. and Mrs. Vecera were both born in Czechoslovakia. Mr. Vecera on March 7, 1877, and Mrs. Vecera on Oct. 20, 1882. They were married Oct. 28, 1902, in their own homeland. In 1904 they came to the United States and settled at Straw, Texas. Mr. Vecera worked in a coal mine for several years. In 1914 they came to Foard County and bought the farm on which they have lived since that time.

The pioneer couple have always taken an interest in the schools and other civic affairs and have always contributed to different funds and organizations in the community. They are members of St. Joseph's Catholic Church.

Twelve children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Vecera, six sons and six daughters, nine of whom were here for the week end celebration. The sons unable to attend were Tom Jr. of Maywood, Calif., Venzig of Albuquerque, N. M., and Richard, who is an Air Corps captain somewhere in Korea.

Crowell Wildcats Leading District 1A-9 Race by Defeating Archer City 19-0 Last Friday Night; Open Date Friday

The Crowell High School football team almost cinched the District championship last Friday night at Archer City when the Foard County Wildcats defeated the Archer County Wildcats 19 to 0. Crowell can win either one of its remaining games with Newcastle or Henrietta and take the coveted crown.

The Crowell boys chalked up sixteen first downs to Archer City's six, but the first half of the game had the Crowell fans scared "stiff." The halftime score was 6 to 0 and Archer City had driven near the Crowell goal line twice to be held off by the strong Crowell line. One of the drives carried to the six-inch line. The last half was all Crowell's, but it was in the last quarter before the Foard County boys could chalk up their last two counters. James Denton, regular fullback for Crowell, made two of the touchdowns and quarterback Don Gobin pulled a "hooter" play to score the other touchdown. Denton had missed several games this season due to an injury in the first game.

Ginger Johnson, fleet left half-back for Crowell, failed to score a touchdown for the first time this season, but he turned in one of his best games. His blocking and defensive work looked excellent. Raymond Halenack, Crowell's other touchdown twin, also went scoreless but he, too, did stellar work on blocking assignments. Jim Paul Norman made a sensational run for the extra point after the second touchdown. This point could have meant a great deal.

Crowell's entire line of DuWayne Elliott, center; Billy Abston and Buddy Caddell, guards; George Scott and James Pittillo, tackles; and Jim Paul Norman and Jimmy Everson, ends, starred in this important contest. Wayne Borchart, Billy Latimer and Gordon Graves were used on defense. Borchart's tackle of G. Callaway on the six-inch line after Callaway had caught a pass on the fourth down prevented an Archer touchdown in the second quarter. Billy Latimer was used sparingly due to a knee injury. He should be able to play against Newcastle here next week.

Scotty Knox, outstanding backfield star for Archer City, stood out on both offense and defense. He made one beautiful 35-yard run in the game. However, his defense did not out-shine that of Crowell's James Denton.

Gov. Stevenson Carries Foard County Nearly Two to One in Election

Although the nation as a whole went Republican, the total vote in Foard County again favored the party now in power as Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson polled some 830 votes compared to 419 ballots cast for the G. O. P. candidate General Dwight D. Eisenhower for a time.

This election without a doubt the most observed contest in the history of the nation, was recognized as the most colorful and publicized campaigns ever staged by the political leaders and candidates of the two major parties.

Nevertheless Foard County voters polled more votes and a more decisive margin for Democrat Stevenson than most other counties in the Republican carried State of Texas.

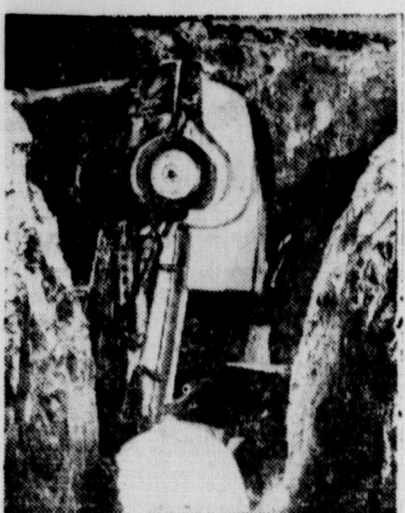

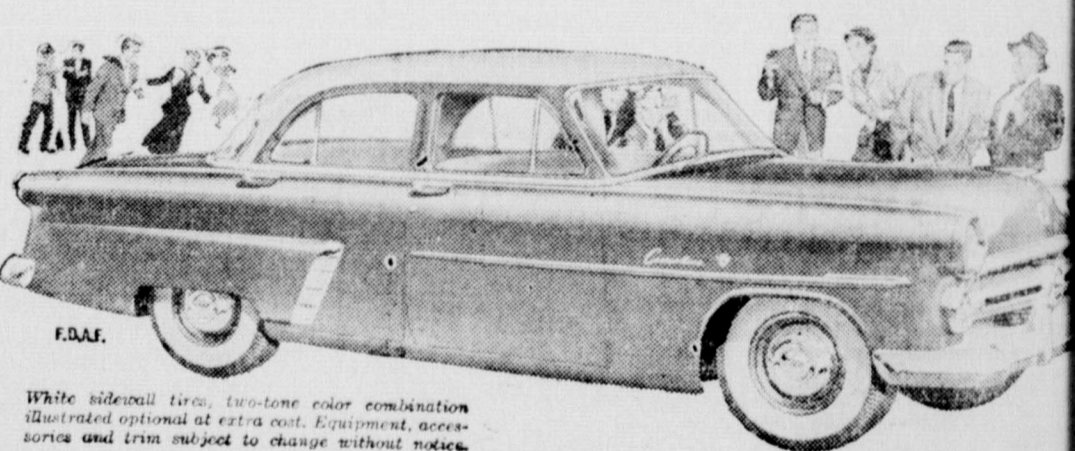

Low Tanks Hamper Distribution of Hatchery Fish

The Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Texas Game & Fish Commission said distribution of hatchery fish is being hampered by low water in farm tanks.

He said many Texans applied for bass and other kind of fingerlings only to find that the long dry spell has either dried up their tanks or left them unsuited for the fish.

The Chief Aquatic Biologist urged that persons who have applied for fish and then have found water too low to receive the fish, should notify the nearest hatchery or the Austin offices of the Commission. Those who do so will be given preference for future fish distribution. He said that considerable damage to fish has resulted when shipments were delivered to farms where the water areas had been dissipated by the drought.

Texas hatcheries are expected to produce approximately 15,000,000 young fish in 1952, including black bass, channel catfish, crappie, bream and goggle eye.

The output is less than normal because two of the state's thirteen hatcheries have been out of commission because of the water shortage. They are the Cisco and Medina hatcheries.

The young fish are delivered mainly in pickup trucks, equipped with aerated tanks. They are suc-

cessfully transported up to 300 miles.

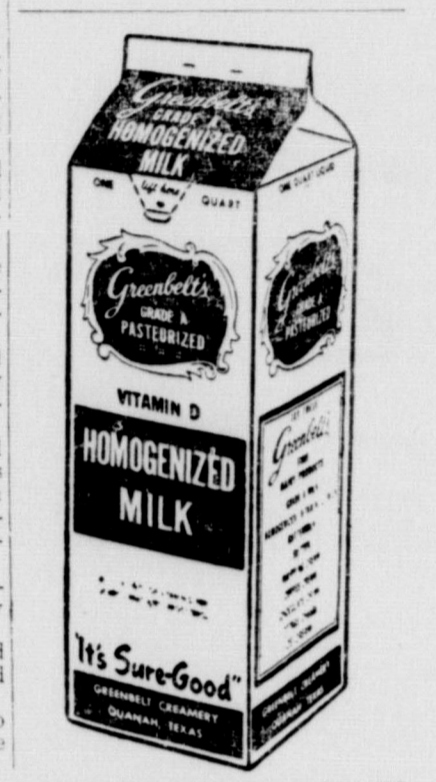

BEDFORD SMITH SPEAKS TO ASSEMBLY

"Only a fool sayeth in his heart there is no God." With this verse of scripture taken from the 53rd Psalm as his text, Rev. Smith spoke to the high school audience Thursday, Oct. 30. The pastor continued with examples of three fools who either by outside influences or twisted thinking come to say in their hearts that God does not exist. These examples he used as a means of bringing to the attention numerous things both of God's handwork on earth and in the divine make-up of man, which to a basically Christian audience would bear evidence without room for doubt of God's existence.

The minister urged his youthful audience to look to the manifold evidences in nature if there be any doubt. Here, he said, more men have found the Father than anywhere else, for God is continually making himself known to man.

Another evidence that speaks more to the scientific or practical mind that must see cold facts, continued Rev. Smith, is the fact that since the beginning of time man has been aware of the spiritual side of his nature that causes him to worship a higher Being. God placed this quality in the human nature, and man has always responded even as far as to worship images before he learned of God.

These scientists who say man began his existence as a one-celled animal completely overlooking the Bible and the truth it tells are "twisted in mind," consequently their reasoning is twisted, stated the minister. He warned the students that as they finish high school and continue their education in the colleges and universities, they will continually be coming into contact with professors and students who advocate this theory. Then, he said, will be the time of decision, and again he quoted the scripture from Psalms. "Use the wisdom God has given you and know in your hearts there is a God," and with this Rev. Smith closed his well-delivered talk.

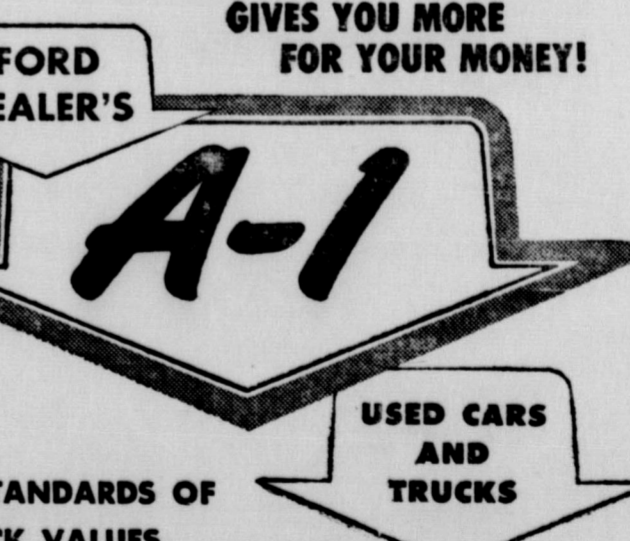

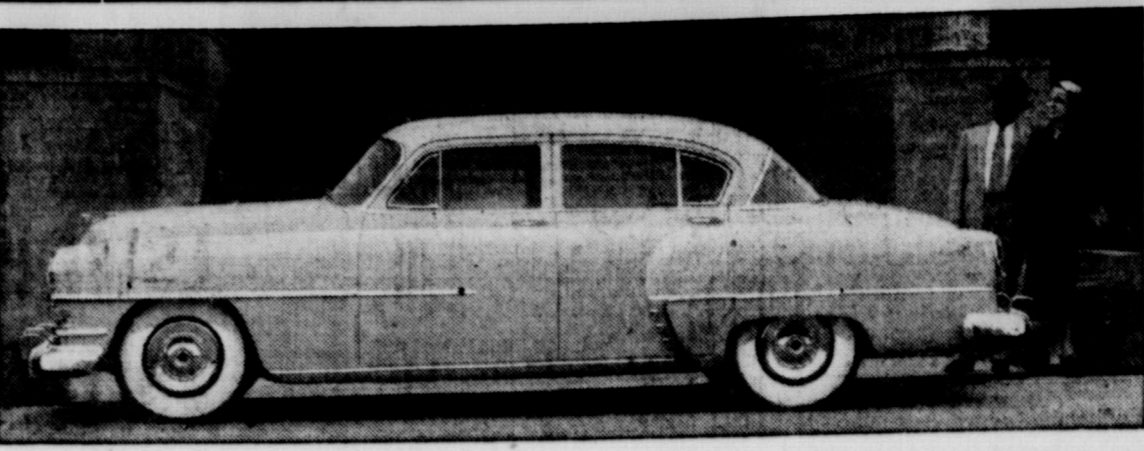
