Cereal Product Makes Stronger Paper and Insulation Board

A derivative of cereal grain has been found to make stronger insulation board and paper, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Zinc xanthate, an insoluble cer eal product, was used in tests by USDA's Agricultural Research Service. The best experimental boards containing 10 per cent of the derivative were lighter but 11/2 to 21/2 times stronger than commercial insulation boards of similar density.

The process for making cerealzinc xanthate involves two steps. First, starch, flour, ground wheat or some other grain product is reacted with carbon disulfide and an alkali such as lye to produce the cereal xanthate, which is insoluble.

Then xanthate is reacted with zinc salts to form ce-eal-zinc xanthate, which is insoluble.

Another cereal derivative, cereal-zinc xanthide, has shown promise for use in making paper. Research conducted a year ago with this derivative using a pulp mixture containing 44 per cent of the substance, increased paper strength considerably.





Relationship of Prices Paid and Received by Farmers Is Steady

The relationship of prices paid by farmers to prices received by them has been practically steady for seven years. And very little change is expected in the next year or two.

Some farmers may question this statement, quoting specific examples which indicate that prices paid have risen, while prices received have declined. However, such examples appear to be ex ceptions to the general trend. According to official price indexes compiled by the USDA, the averages of both prices received by farmers and prices paid by then have gone up 9 per cent in the past seven years.

Similar periods of price stabil ity have been recorded only twice before. One was from 1910 to 1915; the other from 1923 to 1929. These periods, like the pas seven years, were relatively free from great economic disturbances such as a war or major depression The past seven years have differed in at least one respect though. There has been an inflationary creep of more than one per cent per year, while in the two earlier periods, prices showed no upward trend.

Economists some time call the relationship between prices received, and paid, by farmers "the terms of trade." The terms of trade improved temporarily 1958, but otherwise have changed much since 1955. even under these conditions, farm people have improved their incomes considerably. Increased production has improved farm income. Eighteen leading field crops have increased 30 per cent in the past seven years on an average per acre yield basis. Total ag cultural output has increased per cent during this time. A duction of 38 per cent in total bor requirements, in man-hours farm work, was seen from 195 to 1962. The number of perso employed in farming was reduced 20 per cent. This reduction in th number of people being supporte by farm income has allowed for many of those who remained

Farm people have turned m to off-farm employment to a to family incomes, as labor ne have decreased. From 1955 1962 the average income per far person received from non-fr sources increased by more th one half. In 1962 the farm p ulation received 35 per cent its income from non-farm source up from 31 per cent in 1955. Go price supports, to farmers ha increased substantially since 195 from an amount equal to one per cent of cash receipts from farm marketing in 1955, to five per cent in 1962. Most trends and conditions of recent years seen likely to continue, at least for a year or two.

Cotton Plant Extracts Repel and Attract **Boll Weevils**




