



of Past Year

This is the time of the year when the inland fisheries division of the Game and Fish Commis sion plans new projects for th coming year, according to Marion Toole, director of the division.

These new projects will include where virtually nothing is known about their contents, to re-survey ing impoundments and other waters to maintain a current knowl edge of these waters.

The fisheries personnel will evaluate the various techniques used in 1960 and years past to deter-mine if the methods were effec-tive. New techniques will be disussed, many of which will be used n 1961.

One of the important projects for this year will concern vegetation control. New chemicals will e tested in representative areas determine the ones best suited for each individual area.

"This planning is a must," said Toole. "We don't just go into a proposed job blindfolded. First, we plan the work for the coming year. Then, with the aid of trial and error of past years, we write up our projects."

According to the director, 1961 will be a big year for inland fishery dologists. They have lots of work lanned, all of which will immediately or eventually benefit the fishermen of the State.
