The Thalia 4-H Club girls and the Crowell fifth grade girls are making gathered skirts. The Crowell sixth grade club will make blouses. Simple dresses are being made by seventh and eighth grade girls. Girls 14 years of age and over will make senior dresses.

All garments will be judged Friday, April 13, on construction and the appearance of the garment on the girl. Ribbons will be awarded at the Dress Revue the following evening. The first place winners in the simple and senior dress divisions will model their dresses at the District 4-H Dress Revue, held in Wichita Falls in August.

One Accident Investigated Here During February

The Highway Patrol investigated one rural accident in Foard County during the month of February, according to Sgt. D. R. Dowdy of Lubbock, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

This wreck accounted for two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$600.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Foard County from January through February of 1962 shows only the one crash mentioned above.

The patrol supervisor reported that as of Thursday, March 1, a total of 227 traffic deaths had been reported to the department, as compared with 264 during the same period in 1961. "This represents a decrease of 37 deaths or 14 percent," he said, "and presents all of us with a stern challenge to help in further reducing deaths for the remainder of 1962." This will not be an easy job.

"Defensive driving is one of the keys to traffic safety," the sergeant added. "If all motorists were alert when driving and knew the defensive procedures used by a professional driver, the number of monthly traffic accidents would drop sharply."

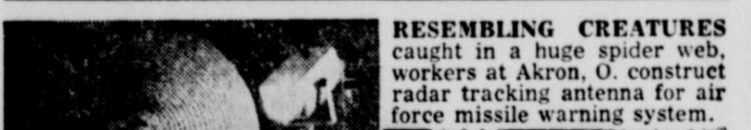

The annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale will be held Saturday, March 17. It is hoped that concentrated effort on that day will result in the selling of the fifty cases allotted to the Crowell Scouts. This will be the only county-wide money-making project for the council budget that the Crowell Girl Scouts will sponsor. The money received from this will be divided among the local troops and the council. The latter will use their share toward scouting expenses which include the camp that will be held in August.

Girl Scouting was fifty years old on March 12. Over the years that it has been organized in Crowell, there have been many county girls benefited by its program. At the present time, there are two active troops, with twenty-six girls. One is composed of third graders, and the other of eighth grade girls.

Since an area council has been formed, and training will be offered, it is hoped that more adults will become interested in the program. Girls from the second grade through high school are eligible for membership, and many Foard County girls are eager for the opportunity to belong. Leadership training courses are being conducted in Quanah and Paducah this spring for any interested adult. This training is a council project, and the cookie-sale money goes toward this as well as camping and other scouting activities.

Grasshoppers Are Hatching Out in West Part of Co.

Fall grasshopper surveys indicate that infestations of hoppers will be heavier and more widespread this year than last, according to Joe Burkett, County Agent.

Farmers and ranchers are cautioned to keep a sharp look-out for hatching beds in low places and along fence rows and to apply control measures early before the hoppers move out of these localized areas.

Grasshoppers began hatching in the west part of the county during the warm days in February. The extreme cold weather which followed didn't seem to reduce their numbers very much.

Hoppers are easier to kill and the area to be treated is much smaller before they leave their hatching beds. Farmers and ranchers should be on the alert and apply control measures early.

Twenty Local Teachers to Attend "Reading" Meeting

Twenty of the Crowell School teachers have signed up to attend the Reading Conference that is being held at Midwestern University on Saturday, March 31. The principal speaker for the conference is Dr. Roy A. Kress, Director of Diagnostic and Remedial Services of the Reading Center, Syracuse University.

The theme of the program is "That All May Learn to Read." Dr. Kress' address will be "Prevention of Reading Difficulties."

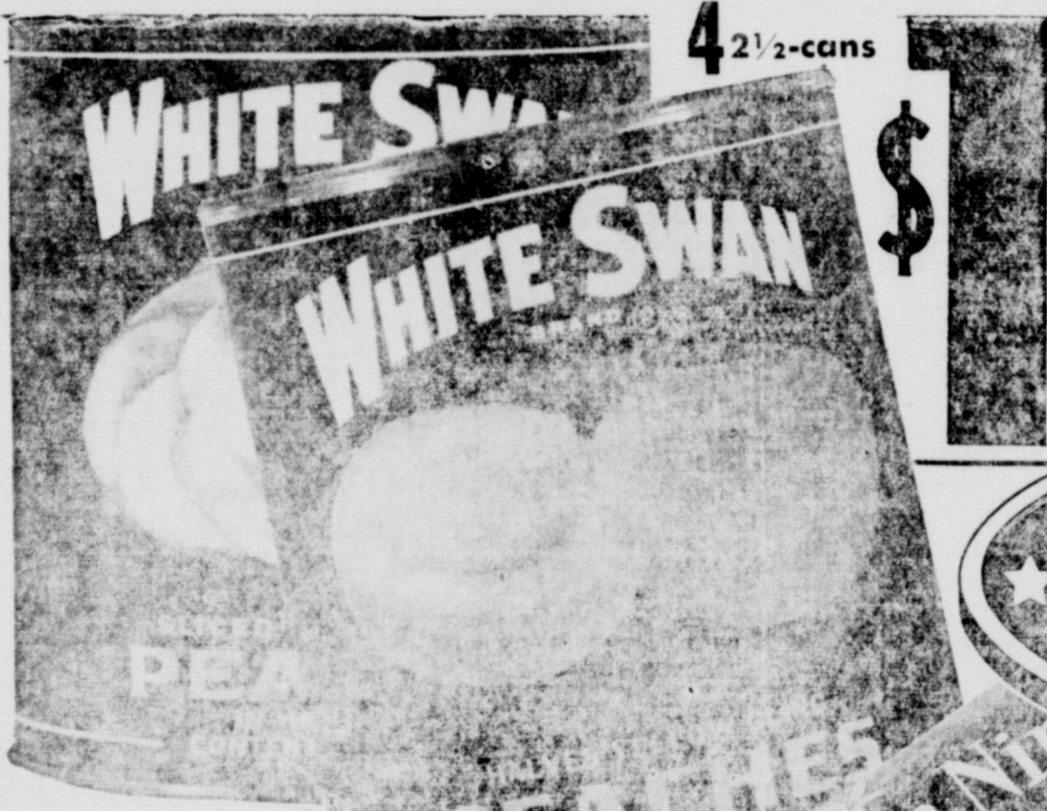

Home Demonstration Notes

JANET CARROLL

Is your electric system overloaded?

Does your electric iron heat properly and quickly? If it fails to heat as fast as it should, or get as hot as you would like, do not fuss at the appliance. It may be that you are overloading the electric circuit. However, if your fuses or circuit breakers are of the proper size, you will receive a warning of an overload.

Wiring experts say that these protective devices, if they are the correct size, will let one know when there is too much of a burden on the wiring. The fuse will blow or the circuit breaker will pop open and cut off the current.

This is the reason it is dangerous to use a fuse too large for the circuit. You lose the protection it is designed to give.

With too large a fuse, the demand may become too great for the circuit to deliver. The voltage will drop, light bulbs grow dim, and appliances won't operate at full capacity.

So if you are having what appears to be a power shortage, check your circuits and calculate the load on each. A 15 ampere circuit will carry a load of 1,650 to 1,800 watts, and a 20 ampere circuit will handle 2,200 to 2,400 watts.

Add the wattage of all of the light bulbs and appliances on each circuit. Do they exceed the totals? If so, you will have to take something off the circuit. Perhaps it will be possible to shift an appliance from one side of the room to another and use a less used loop.

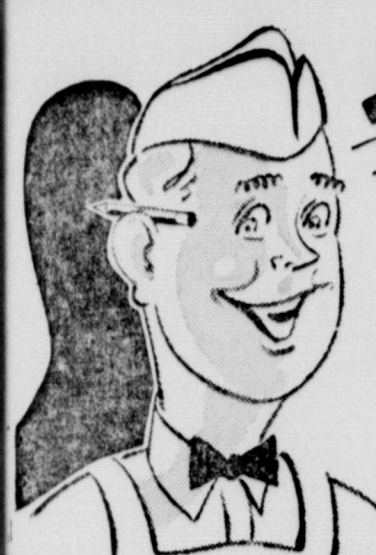

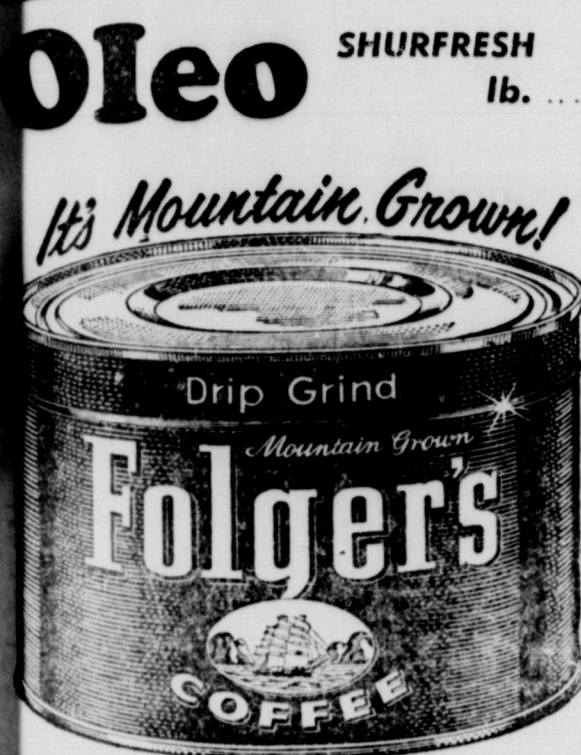

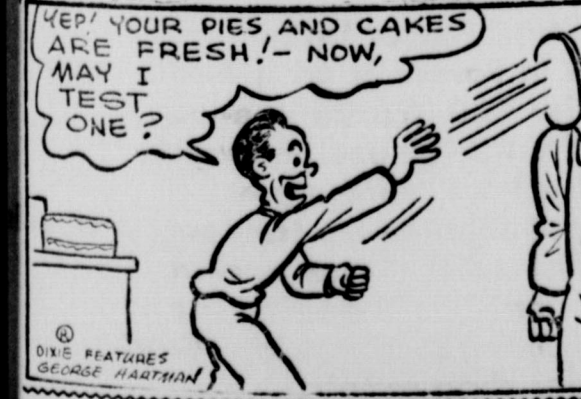

Vehicle Inspection Deadline Nearing

Texas drivers have approximately one month in which to have their vehicles inspected before the April 15 deadline.

"After that date," said Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety, "enforcement officers will begin to issue tickets to those drivers who fail to display the new 1952 safety stickers." There are over 325,000 vehicles in the Northwest Texas Region of the DPS that must be inspected before the April 15 deadline. Although there are 811 approved inspection stations in this 49-county region, these stations will be hard pressed to finish the job before the deadline, unless the motorists start having their vehicles inspected now.

Johnson stressed the importance of car owners having their annual safety check at a licensed inspection station as soon as possible. The DPS captain cautioned that motorists are likely to experience last minute traffic jams at inspection stations if they don't move without delay. "As spring approaches, we face the possibility of wet weather, which means that most inspection stations cannot utilize all of the working days left. Take advantage of this pretty weather and take your vehicle in now for the state inspection," Captain Johnson concluded.

Hints Offered on Lawn Care

Want to have a beautiful lawn this summer? Now is the time to start planning for it. E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist, says you need to watch all management factors because neglecting one may keep you from having an attractive lawn.

Fertilizer should be applied according to soil test recommendations. You can, however, use a sufficient amount of a complete fertilizer to supply two pounds of nitrogen per 1000 square feet. Whichever method you choose, the fertilizer should be applied about the time the grass begins to grow. This should be done again in the fall, 30 days before frost, says Trew.

Throughout the summer, at 30 to 40 day intervals, the lawn should be topped with nitrogen at the rate of one pound per 1000 square feet.

Another thing that will detract from lawn beauty is the presence of weeds. One of the best defenses against weeds is a thick, vigorous growth of grass. Weeds can also be controlled with chemicals. For chemical recommendations and application rates, ask your county agent for a copy of L-425, "Chemical Weed Control on Lawns."

Lawns should also be mowed regularly, points out Trew. Bermuda grass should be kept at a height of about 1 to 1½ inches, and St. Augustine and bluegrass at about 1½ to 2 inches. No more than one inch should be removed at a time.

Lawns should be watered when the grass begins to wilt, says Trew. Then they should be soaked to a depth of 6 inches or more.

If you start now, and continue managing your lawn through the summer, you can be the envy of the neighborhood. Local county agents can supply additional information on lawn management and care.
