Wright, County Chairman. This clinic will be the third and last in a series begun last fall in an effort to make all county residents immune to polio. Right now bass fishermen are winding up the top-water season. This is the type of fishing we dream of. Unfortunately, however, too few of us get out often enough to enjoy it to the fullest.

There is a lot of luck to bass! fishing. A lot of science too! The secret of success is in using the right plug in the right place. True, there are times when an old bass will hit on anything. But, there are other times when it seems he will hit on nothing. Did you say that that usually is the time you go fishing? I feel the same way too-and far too often.

While many fish are caught for some reason or another, the man who comes in with a good string- the surface. er of big fish usually does it because he knew what he was doing.

A WORD OF CAUTION Here's a piece of advice that might save you a lot of money before the summer is over. Check your trailers. Most of us run our trail ers trip after trip without paying too much attention to them. Then when something happens we are, invariably, a long, long way from home.

Trailer manufacturers make the piece of equipment they know how. If we take good care of them, they will give us many miles of trouble-free use.

Here are some suggestions from Gator Boat Trailer Co., which are good for any boat trailer: (1) clean and repack wheels and check bearings; (2) thoroughly lubricate spots and repaint them, (4) check all moving parts, (3) remove rust cradle and bunker padding for boat protection, (5) check coupler carefully. If it is out of line you'll bring home undue wear on your tires, (6) tighten all bolts and (7) replace winch-rope if it shows signs of fraying.

To these suggestions we might add-be sure and check your tail light and license number plate. Remember also that your tie-downs must be efficient and capable of holding your boat in place.

Take these precautions and you'll have a minimum of trailer trouble

Trailing boats is getting to be more of a problem every day, because of inadequate launching facilities and storage areas. Some boat owners are very thoughtless, too. They'll put their boats in the water and then leave their trailers in the way of others who want to launch their own boats.

Remember, fellows - after you launch your boat, remove your trailer. Get it out of the way, so that the next fellow will have plenty of room to turn and launch It could save you money in the long run as some of us are not too good at this trailer backing . . and you might get rammed.



To the Citizens of the 46th Judicial District of Texas:

An appeal has been made by your present District Judge for re-election upon the basis of another term in office entitling him to judicial retirement pay. Regardless of whom it benefits, it occurs to me that the citizens of this district are entitled to know the facts concerning the pension in question.

Article 6228b of the Civil Statutes of Texas provides in effect that a judge of a district or state court may retire at the age of 65 years after having served for a period of at least ten years. Both age and service are required. The amount of the retirement pension is one-half the amount the judge is drawing as salary at the time of his retirement. The salary of your District Judge is \$12,000.00 per year and the amount of the pension is therefore \$6,000.00 per year.

As a tax payer you would naturally want to know where the money comes from to pay the \$6,000.00 a year pension. Five per cent of the judge's salary is deducted. The remainder must be paid by the tax payer. The State Auditors report of March 24, 1958, reflects that retired judges have paid in \$52,677.37 and received pension payments in the amount of \$748,374.11 as of August 31, 1957. The difference of \$695,696.74 has been paid by the tax payers of this state.

Section 6 of Article 6228b provides that the five per cent with-held from the judge's salary will be returned to him if he does not serve until he becomes eligible for the pension. This is certainly fair in that it is unthinkable that every person elected to a judicial office will be retained in such office until he reaches the age of sixty-five. Therefore, if your present District Judge's five per cent deductions amount to \$4,000.00, he will be refunded the full amount if he does not become eligible for the pension.

I think you would naturally want to know how the retirement plan of your other officials compares with the judicial pension plan. As far as I am able to ascertain, your other precinct, county and state officials are not eligible for any pension whatsoever with the exception of Social Security. Your District Judge is entitled to Social Security without respect to whether he becomes eligible for the

The fact that the tax payer has had to pay \$14.00 for every \$1.00 contributed by retired judges who are receiving the pension is no reason to vote against your present District Judge. The fact that the pension he is asking for is more than the salaries received by your school teachers and county officials fails to furnish a valid reason for voting for me. I have not and will not ask the citizens to vote for me or against my opponent on the basis of the judges pension plan. To make such an appeal would be a poor basis on which to conduct my campaign. I do feel, however, that it does not furnish any reason to vote for the re-election of the

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
