From the News THIRTY YEARS AGO

Walter D. Cline of Wichita Falls, prominent civic leader and independent oil man, will address the graduating class of Crowell High School at commencement exercises Friday evening, May 20.

E. B. Summers, 41, of Dallas, collector for the Oliver Farm Equipment Sales Co., was burned to death Sunday morning as the result of fire that immediately followed the head-on collision of an automobile and truck on Highway 28, about 17 miles west of Crowell.

A part of a carload of Red Cross flour has been received by the Foard County chapter.

Little Marian Hays, who has been seriously ill with pneumonia for the past ten days, is rapidly recovering.

The Thalia Boys 4-H Paradise Club met Monday afternoon. The principal projects of the boys this year are grain sorghums, pigs and feeder calves.

Health of China's 600 Million People in Hands of Untrained

The health of Red China's 600 million people is in the hands of "perhaps the most under-trained, medically oriented, and politically infected medical profession in the world." That's the view of Arturo F. Gonzalez Jr., of The Asia Magazine, which is published in Hong Kong. Writing in Today's Health, he says that Western-trained physicians, the cream of the country's medical profession, were summarily ordered, in 1958, to revert to traditional Chinese methods of treating patients. These methods include lancing the skin, muscle or other tissue with a long silver needle, the use of herbs which are supposed to cure everything from appendicitis to fractures, breath control, and shadow boxing.

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
