VANCE FAVOR RETIRES FROM HIGHWAY DEPT.

W. V. Favor, Senior Maintenance Foreman for the Texas Highway Department in Hardeman and Foard Counties, will retire March 1, 1961, after 35 years with the department.

Mr. Favor started with the Highway Department in Knox County as timekeeper Jan. 2, 1926, and was made foreman in 1932, in Knox County. He was transferred to Crowell July 10, 1933, as maintenance foreman of Foard, Hardeman and Cottle Counties. Then in April, 1943, he was transferred to Quannah as foreman of Hardeman and Foard Counties.

Mr. Favor was born in Navarro County, but moved at an early

age to Knox County where he finished high school at Knox City and attended Texas Christian University. He served three years in World War I, most of the time overseas.

He says he has no special plans for the future, but he and his wife both like to travel; therefore, he plans to do as much of that as his finances will permit.

He also states if he had his life to live over, he would work with the Highway Department as he has enjoyed it very much. Of course, there has been times the going was not too smooth, when snow, ice and high water were over the highways.

Business Changes Listed for Foard County During 1960

This week, A. J. Hemphill, manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced statement requests were mailed to businesses in Foard County. He said the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1961, totaled 55 manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers in this area.

According to Mr. Hemphill, each January, business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked for their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to approximately three million business concerns—to the corner grocery store worth a few hundred dollars as well as to businesses worth millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.

During the past year, Hemphill added 31 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Foard County businesses, including 11 names added, 8 deleted, and 12 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Foard County are about even with the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds.

Source of Disease

Today's Health, a magazine of general circulation published by the American Medical Association, warns that woolen blankets can be a source of disease in the winter. The blankets can harbor disease germs that cause flu, sore throats and similar illnesses because the low-temperature washing recommended is not hot enough to kill the germs. To combat the danger, the magazine recommends that the blankets be soaked briefly in a water and disinfectant solution before being laundered; that they be laundered regularly; that they be covered with bedspreads while in use, and that they be disinfected after illness.

FORGERY OPERATION IS BELIEVED BROKEN

A forgery ring operating from Fort Worth to Amarillo throughout North Texas is believed to have been broken with the arrest in Crowell Thursday of last week of three Latin-Americans, two men and a woman.

District Attorney Jack Hightower filed forgery charges against the trio Friday afternoon and they remain in Foard County jail in lieu of bond. Charged were Mike Martinez, about 55, Rosendo Rosales, 34, and the woman, Jomansa Delgado Calderon, about 30, all believed to be from Fort Worth.

Foard County Sheriff Percy Taylor and Deputy Duane Cates arrested the three Thursday af-

ternoon after being alerted by a Crowell grocery store owner. Sheriff Taylor said the three had been attempting to cash a check.

"The check was on Murray Gin Company of Paducah and was countersigned J. W. Anderson," Sheriff Taylor said. "It was drawn on the First National Bank in Paducah."

A flood of similar checks has been reported in North Texas, including Memphis, Claude, Amarillo, Paducah, Seymour, Quannah, Vernon, and other points. The same ring is believed to have been operating for more than a year and forged checks given in the fall of 1959 on "Anderson Gin Company of Paducah" are believed connected with the forgery ring, according to Sheriff Taylor.

Sheriff Taylor said the method of operation of those in the ring was to pose as contract cotton harvesters and tell merchants the checks were payment for picking of cotton. The ring operated during the cotton season, from about Sept. 1 to mid-January, the sheriff said.

Checks were mainly for \$70 to \$100, according to Sheriff Taylor.

Farmers and Ranchers Income Tax Meeting Is Set for January 11

Some Foard County farmers and ranchers are paying more income tax on certain items of their business than they should be paying, by failing to take advantage of capital gains treatment where possible, according to County Extension Agents Joe Burkett and Mrs. Virginia Iseng.

To assist farmers and ranchers with this, and other possibilities on the 1960 taxable income, the agents have set a meeting for all interested persons for Wednesday, Jan. 11, at 2 p. m. at the Down Town Bible Class room.

Thomas K. Hunter and Mrs. Tom Joyce Cunningham, district extension management specialists from Vernon, will be present to assist the county agents in presenting the latest developments and procedures in how to reduce the income tax payments made by the agricultural businessmen of Foard County. The specialists say "It is a privilege of each taxpayer to use all permissible means to reduce his income taxes."

Even though an individual does not fill out his own income tax return, the knowledge and use of tax management practices in the daily business of the farm and ranch will mean dollars and cents saved. Sound income tax management principles will be discussed by the specialists.

\$87,625 in Savings Bonds Sold Here in First 11 Months of '60

Savings Bonds sales in Foard County were \$974.00 during November. Purchases for the first eleven months of 1960 totaled \$87,625.00 or 79.6 per cent of the yearly goal, George Self, chairman of the Foard County Savings Bonds committee, said Monday.

E and H 1960 sales in Texas amounted to \$139,283,903. This represents 84.2 per cent of the Texas 1960 goal of \$165.5 million.

According to William H. Neal, national director of the Treasury Bond program, "November marked the eleventh consecutive month in which Savings Bonds program has shown growth. We are especially encouraged by the continued downward growth in redemptions, a major factor contributing to this sustained growth," Neal concluded.

Furd Halsell Died in Fort Worth Last Sunday

Furd Halsell, 85, pioneer West Texas rancher and a frequent Foard County visitor in past years, died Sunday in his home in Fort Worth. Services were held Tuesday morning in Fort Worth with Dr. Gaston Foster, pastor of First Methodist Church officiating.

He was born March 2, 1875, in Deatur to the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Glenn Halsell, who came to Texas from Alabama shortly after the Civil War. J. Glenn Halsell started in the ranching business as an employee of the late Dan Waggoner in Wise County.

When he was 21 years old, Furd Halsell leased a large acreage in Throckmorton County. In 1902, he bought a ranch covering parts of Foard and Knox County.

The two doctors made a strong plea for universal use of seat belts in automobiles.

Your chance of avoiding injury or death in case of severe accidents are at least 40 per cent better if you are wearing seat belts. Of the 38,000 people who died from auto accidents last year about 10,000 could be alive as well today if they had been wearing these life-saving devices.
