Taxpayers who kept good financial records last year should have no trouble preparing their 1961 federal income tax return, Murray C. King, administrative officer of the Vernon office of Internal Revenue Service, stressed this week.  
Complete records are especially important, the IRS representative said, to taxpayers who elect to itemize deductions in filing.  
Accurate expense records are especially essential if a taxpayer's return is selected for audit.  
All records should be retained for as long as they may become material in the administration of any internal revenue law.  
Another advantage, he declared, is that taxpayers with good records can complete and mail their federal tax returns as soon as they receive their W-2 withholding tax certificates, thus eliminating last-minute searches for such papers as the April 16 filing deadline draws near.
