First Load 1961 Wheat Brought in May 17th

The first load of the 1961 wheat crop in Foard County was brought to the Farmers Elevator in Crowell at 6:45 p. m. last Wednesday, May 17. The wheat was grown by C. N. Barker in the Foard County community, and the field he harvested averaged over 19 bushels to the acre. The wheat tested 59 pounds per bushel, and the first load consisted of 135 bushels. The next wheat received by the co-op elevator was on Sunday with 3 loads brought in. More was coming in Monday, as the harvest was beginning to get started. The elevator received the first tons Sunday.

The barley crop is still being harvested, and reports from the elevators are that the barley yields this year are from fair to good.

Foard County Mill's First
O. R. Boman brought the first load of 1961 wheat to the Foard County Mill about 3 o'clock Monday afternoon. The load contained 300 bushels, tested 60 pounds, with a moisture content of 14.06. Ray Brown reported that the elevator received nine loads of wheat during Monday afternoon.

Mr. Brown reported that his elevator was receiving a few oats along, and a larger amount of barley with average yields being reported.

Plenty of Combines
By the looks of vacant lots packed with combines and trucks, when the wheat cutting gets in full swing, there should be an ample supply of harvesting equipment available to cut the wheat in a comparatively short time.

Senate Run-Off Election Slated for Saturday

The run-off election in the special Senatorial race between Interim Senator Bill Blakley and Republican John Tower will be held this Saturday, May 27.

Foard County voters will cast their ballots in the usual places, and election officials will be the same as for the first election held last month.

A spokesman for Senator Blakley was in Crowell last Monday, and said that the Democrats — through their failure to vote in this election — could send a Republican to the U. S. Senate.

For that reason, a large turnout of Foard County voters — who have always given the Democratic candidates their approval — will help keep a Democratic Senator in Washington.

First Load of Wheat Received at Truscott Elevator

The first load of wheat at the Truscott Farmers Co-Op Elevator was received Monday, May 15, and was brought in by H. A. Smith. The load consisted of 33 and 2/3 bushels and tested 60.

Through Monday of this week, the elevator had received 14,482 bushels of wheat from the Truscott and Gilliland communities. The first wheat brought \$1.75 per bushel.

It is expected that the yield per acre in these two communities in Knox County will be good.

More Foard County Residents Receive Social Security

By the end of 1960, more than 350 people in Foard County were receiving old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits. The total benefits paid to these people for December 1960 was \$18,686, according to Erton Tate, district manager of the Wichita Falls social security office.

"This is an increase in the number of people receiving benefits by about 10 per cent over the same month last year," he said.

Nationally, almost 15 million people were receiving about a billion dollars a month in old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits at the close of 1960.

Payments to a retired worker with no dependents receiving benefits averaged \$70.00 in December, 1960; to a retired couple, both receiving benefits, the average payment was \$124.00. The average for an aged widow was about \$58.00.

1960 was the 20th year that social security benefits were payable, and the 25th anniversary of the social security act. Foard County people participate and share in this program along with the rest of the nation.

April E and H Savings Bonds sales in Foard County totaled \$11,043, according to George Self, chairman of the county Savings Bonds committee.

Sales for the first four months of 1961 were \$51,952 which represents 47.2 per cent of the county's 1961 goal.

Thalia School District High School Students Must Be Transferred

County School Supt. Important in Launching Astronaut

before blast-off for the astronaut, a red-haired free captain, native of Tularosa, was the great nephew of W. J. Crowell, took his post at Cananaval, Florida.

Capt. Donald M. Davis, safety officer, Capt. Davis, graduate of Tularosa High School, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Davis of Boulder, Colo.

Miss Louise Garrett, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Garrett, graduated from High School in 1918. The first family lived here at that time.

Capt. Davis' right hand are switches, labeled "arm" and "deconstruct." They can tear a rocket out of the sky. But this rocket is carrying a man.

Now did Capt. Davis, range safety officer, feel about his responsibility when Capt. Sheppard launched.

This shot was handled much like any other rocket or missile launch, he explains. Thanks to the automatic escape system in the rocket, "I didn't have to worry about the astronaut."

Davis' job is to make sure the rocket doesn't stray and endanger human lives on the ground and tanks of explosive fuel.

If the missile is over land, there will be danger. In this case, Davis will throw the "deconstruct" switch. The rocket engine will be shut off. There will be a second delay while the escape rockets jerk the Mercury capsule and its space pilot free from the booster. The booster would explode in the air.

If the missile is over water, and a land area was endangered, Davis would throw the "arm" switch. This would cut off the rocket engine and instantaneously the escape rockets would pull the capsule away from the booster to safety. The rocket would fall harmlessly into the sea.

Davis is at the bottom of a funnel of information on the rocket take-off. Others at plotting boards report the rocket's progress to him.

One man stands behind vertical wires near the launch site using them as a reference to see the rocket's altitude. To Davis, he reports:

"The rocket is climbing the wire. It is red on the wire but it looks good. The rocket is now green on the wire."

Elsewhere the reports come in. There is trouble, green for okay. There is another safety factor for the astronaut that is causing more time for the missile to correct deviations in its flight before the safety officer would have to destroy it.

The rocket could deviate, for instance, five degrees to the right and as many as 60 degrees to the left before it becomes unsafe.

A perfect shot would deviate only a fraction of a degree. Of course, the wide safety deviation means that the rocket impact area 300 miles out might be 325 miles wide.

From the moment the rocket blasts off until the powered part of the flight is over, the range safety officer, Davis, can destroy it. Power will be cut off when the rocket is nearly 30 miles down the range.

The safety officer hates to destroy a missile," explains Lt. Col. Dan P. Thompson, director of the cape's range operations.

Another problem is stray radio signals. A specially equipped plane and trucks minter radio signals around the cape and range. A stray radio signal might trigger the destruct mechanism in a rocket or confuse directional signals given to a rocket.
