ROTARY MAINTAINS NARROW L. L. LEAD

The game was all tied at 5-5 at the end of three innings, but Rotary exploded with 20 runs in the fourth and fifth against novice Yankee pitching.

For Farmers Elevator, Rocky Wisdom hit a home run, Daniel Santos came through with two singles, and Steve Gray and Leslie Hopkins each hit a single.

8 p. m.: VFW tried a new pitcher for three innings all to no avail, and Foard County Mill wound up on the top end of an 11-2 score. Buzz Rasberry and Ike Everson got the only hits for VFW, with Jimmy Hammonds coming through with two circus catches to rob Joe Mike Fish and Larry Ellis of base hits.

For Foard County Mill, Joe Mike Fish pitched three innings of shutout ball, blasted a home run and a single, and Paul Stapp got two hits. Larry McBeath, Larry Hughton, Marvin Ray and Bill Kinsey each hit safely once for the Cardinals.

Saturday night, June 2, 6 p. m.: In a make-up game, Foard County Mill again walloped VFW, this time by a score of 18-2. VFW scored first, and the score was all even at 2-2 at the end of the first inning, but VFW was through scoring for the night against the pitching of Larry Hughton and Joe Mike Fish, while the Cardinals scored in each inning.

The tornado warning of the fire whistle does not necessarily mean that a tornado has been sighted, but it does mean that conditions are right for a tornado in this area.

Foard Voters Go for Winners in State Run-Off

Foard County voters went right along with the majority of Texas voters in the second Democratic primary and favored the winners in the state-wide election.

In this county, John Connolly received 237 votes for governor and Don Yarbrough 135.

In the lieutenant governor's race, Preston Smith polled 287 votes to James Turman's 83.

Waggoner Carr received 272 votes in the attorney general's race to 94 for his opponent, Tom Reavley.

For Congressman-at-Large, Joe Pool of Dallas County received 202 votes to 151 for Woodrow Bean of El Paso.

In the precinct 3 chairman's race, Henry Johnson received 19 votes to R. C. Johnson's 8.

A total of 375 votes were cast in the election.

279,000 Bushels of Wheat Delivered to County Elevators

Harvest of the grain crop in Foard County has been completed. There might be a small trickle of grain brought to the elevators in the next few days, but the bulk of the crop left after the disastrous wind and hail storm has been delivered to the elevators of the county.

Up to Tuesday afternoon, small grain received at the elevators was 279,000 bushels of wheat, 21,150 bushels of barley and 5,140 bushels of oats.

Probably some wheat was stored on farms, but it is not possible to get an estimate of the amount.

Plowing the land and preparing it for fall sowing is now underway.

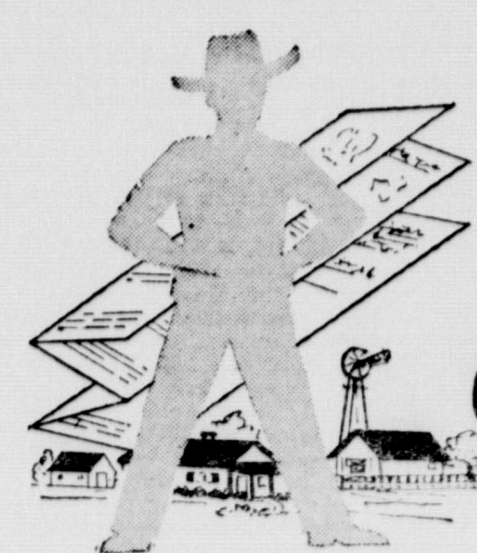

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

Tourists who wish to fill their thermos jugs or procure drinking water for other purposes may do so from any one of Texas' 375 approved city water systems. They may swim in any one of many municipal or community pools which are inspected by sanitarians of local health units.

Finally for those who prefer to rough it in comfort, Texas has well-protected camping areas in state and national parks where a high degree of sanitary protection has been provided without eliminating the satisfying aspect of living next to nature.

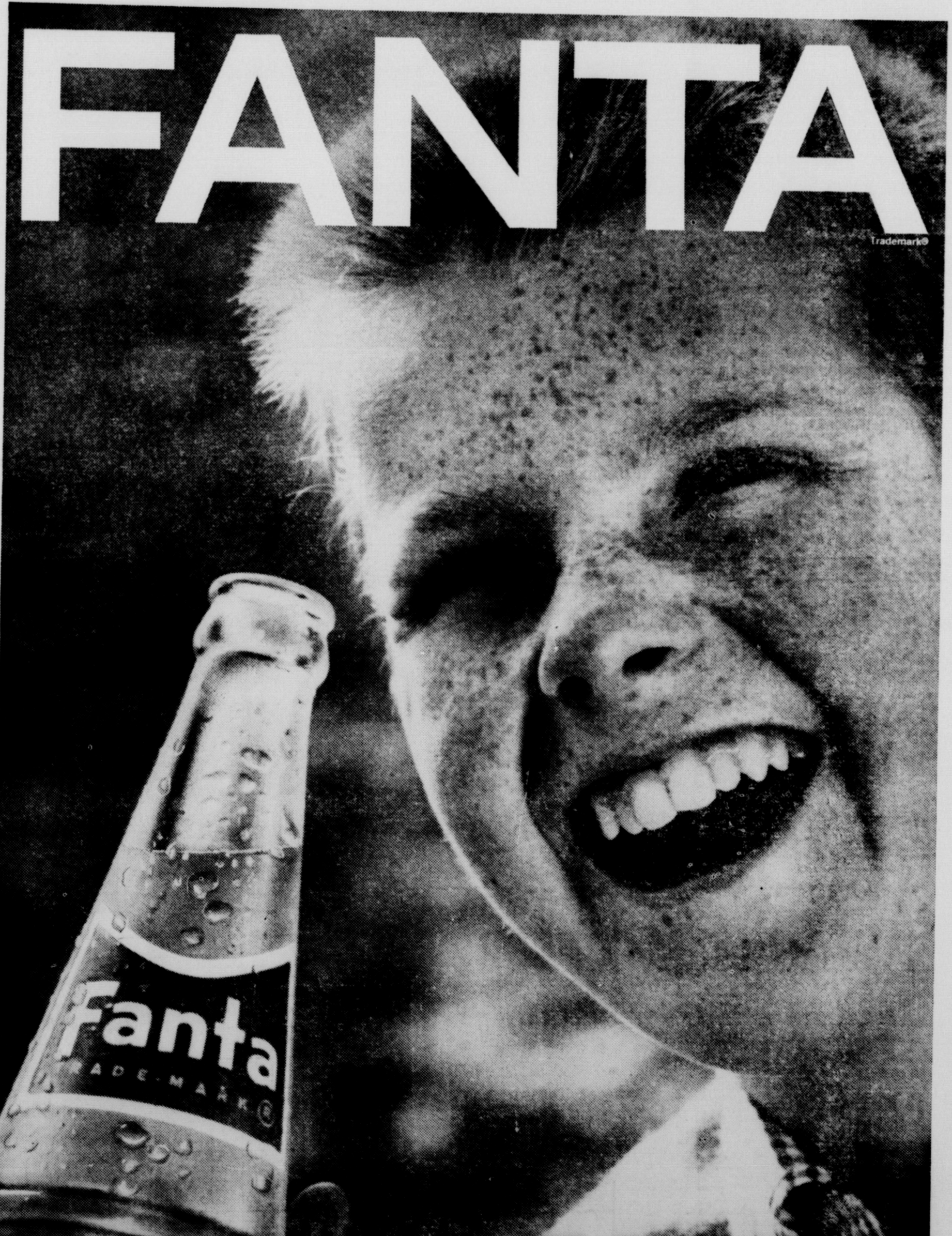

Talks Underway for Seasons on Plentiful Doves

With the outlook favorable for a good dove crop this fall, new season regulations are now being discussed, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

Dodgen is meeting in Corpus Christi Friday with representatives of the Lower Rio Grande Valley, to discuss a proposal for a change in the season dates in that area. Valley residents believe that the mourning dove season there should open earlier than the traditional October 1 date. They are also seeking to have the white-winged dove season on alternate days rather than consecutive days, as in the past two years.

On June 26 there will be a national dove conference in Washington, to discuss dove population, length of seasons, and open date brackets on which the Game and Fish Commission can set up this year's hunting season in Texas. Representatives from all the states where dove hunting is permitted will be present at the conference in Washington.

Reports from the field now indicate, according to Dodgen, that a heavy brood stock of doves remains in Texas for nesting this year. Thousands of these mourners can be seen along the highways in practically every section of the state. Reports from the Rio Grande Valley also indicate a heavy whitewing nesting population this year. There have been no reports as yet from the Middle West as to the mourning dove situation, but generally there is a heavy migration through the Middle West to Texas during the fall and winter months. These are known as the "fat northern doves."

(Rom. 5:9); "reconciled to God by the death of His Son" (Rom. 5:10); "made nigh by the blood of Christ" (Eph. 2:13) and "made the righteousness of God in Him" because "God hath made Him to be sin for us" (II Cor. 5:21).

The "covenant" of the law was abolished by the cross (Col. 2:14), the curse of the law was removed by the cross (Gal. 3:13), the "middle wall of partition" was broken down by the cross (Eph. 2:14, 15) and believers in Christ are reconciled to God in one body by the cross (Eph. 2:16). Little wonder Paul calls this message "the preaching of the cross"!

To the believer it is thrilling to see the cross as God's reply to Satan when, at first glance, it had appeared that the cross was Satan's greatest triumph.

Designed to Put Land to Constructive Purposes

Changes in the farm program, as proposed in companion bills in Senate and House, seek to expand opportunities for recreation and fish and wildlife on private lands, according to the Wildlife Management Institute. 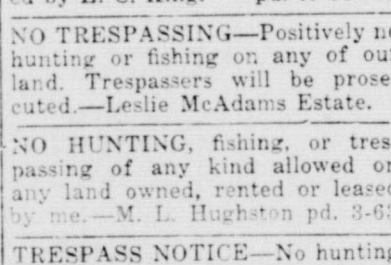
