Production is from 20 perforations at 5734-44 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1000-1. Hole was bottomed at 5860 feet and plugged back at 5758 for completion.

Community Center Nearing Reality

Anyone who didn't see inside the Premier Hotel in the last few years and before it was purchased for the Community Center cannot imagine the changes that extensive planning, hard work and liberal donations of money, work and furniture have done for one of Crowell's landmarks.

A community center which can be used by every age group in Foard County has long been a dream of a few dedicated citizens. Mayor Henry Black, who has a wealth of experience working with young people during his career as a public school teacher, got the ball rolling back during the summer with his vision that the hotel—which had been vacant for years—could be made into an ideal center for community activities. His enthusiasm was soon picked up by other interested people and soon led to a drive for funds to buy the building and re-do it. The cash donations became coming in, as well as donations of furniture and appliances. Then, after purchase of the building, work began on re-modeling.

It isn't finished yet, but when it is completed in the near future, it will be a Community Center of which we all can be proud. It has been a community-wide effort and one that will pay big dividends in the years to come.

County Tops 1961 Savings Bonds Quota of \$110,000

The people of Foard County purchased \$29,420 in savings bonds during the month of September to boost bond sales in this county during the first 9 months of the year to \$139,111. This is 124.5 per cent of the quota of \$110,000 set for the county.

Texas savings bonds sales for the first 9 months of 1961 totaled \$119,954,483, of which \$11,692,606 were purchased during September. Texas has achieved 72.7 per cent of its 1961 goal.

"During this 20th anniversary year of the savings bonds program and in light of the current international situation, we feel that it is important that Texas achieve its 1961 savings bonds goal. We are confident that if all Texans will purchase an extra bond during the remainder of 1961, our sales goal will be met," Chairman George Self said.

Girl Scouts to Sell Christmas Items

Troop I of the Crowell Girl Scouts will sell Christmas items in order for them to buy their Junior High uniforms, and also to put money in the treasury. This selling program is one that is approved by the National Council, and has a bonus of a subscription for the American Girl magazine for every ten items sold. Each girl of the troop is hoping to sell more than her quota of ten items, such as Christmas cards, wrappings, ribbons and package ornaments.

It is hoped by February that all the members of Troop I will have completed requirements for their Curved Bar Rank. This is the highest honor an intermediate scout can earn. The troop has selected the out-of-doors as their badge field, and members are diligently working on the pioneer camping and conservation badges. To fulfill a requirement of the latter badge, the girls will plant flowers and shrubbery around the Community Center and will be responsible for their care. They have contributed \$2.00 for flower seed.

One of their service projects for the year is to keep the PTA nursery. Another will be to help with the Christmas project of the Vernon State Hospital. They have been re-decorating the inside of the Girl Scout Hut, but lack of funds has slowed down this project. They are hoping the Christmas item sale will be a success, so they can complete these projects.

Pioneer Foard County Resident Died Last Sunday

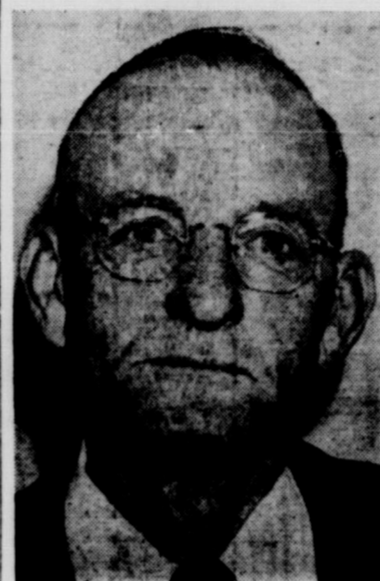
Funeral services for Mrs. J. H. McDaniel, 87, pioneer Foard County resident, and sister of Mrs. R. B. Lilly of Foard City, were held in Cross Plains, Texas, Wednesday, Oct. 25, at 2 p. m. conducted by Rev. Carl Hudson, pastor of the Methodist Church in Miami.

Mrs. McDaniel passed away in Alamogordo, N. M., last Sunday, Oct. 22, following an illness of two months. Her condition had been serious since she became ill the latter part of August.

Mrs. McDaniel was born May 10, 1874. She was married to Mr. McDaniel in Burket in 1894. They moved to Foard County with their family from Cross Plains in 1907 and lived in the Foard City community until 1941 when they sold their farm and moved to Hobbs, N. M., where they lived for two years before returning to Cross Plains. Mr. McDaniel died 12 years ago. One son, Blake, passed away in the Foard City community in 1957.

She is survived by nine children, one son and eight daughters. The daughters are Mrs. W. C. Tisdale of McAllen, Mrs. M. L. Gover of El Paso, Mrs. S. O. Turner of Amarillo, Mrs. Bill Ong of Houston, Mrs. E. A. Dann of Alamogordo, N. M., Mrs. George Handley of Edinburg, Mrs. Victoria Warren of Borger, Mrs. James Turrentine of Odessa; the son is J. W. McDaniel, New Orleans, La. Eighteen grandchildren and 35 great grandchildren also survive. Other survivors are two sisters in addition to Mrs. Lilly, and one brother.

Foard County Cotton Ginnings Total 4,321 Bales

Foard County's cotton crop is turning out better than was expected early in the season with better-than-average yields and also extra good quality cotton being reported. Total 1961 ginnings for the county Wednesday morning were 4,321 bales.

H. C. Duncan, veteran cotton man and manager of the Crowell Farmers Co-Op. Gin said Wednesday that it is the best cotton he has ever ginned—best grade and some of the longest staple cotton—up to 1 and 1/16 inch. He said he has had one load of good middling cotton.

Perfect weather this past week has helped speed up the harvest. Individual reports from the four county gins are Crowell Farmers Co-Op, 1,035; Thalia Farmers Co-Op, 1,356; and Rayland Gin, 1,230.

COMMUNITY CENTER WORK PROGRESSING

Work of re-modeling and re-decorating the old Premier Hotel—which will soon be Foard County's Community Center—is moving along rapidly with the main meeting room practically completed. This room is on the west side of the building on the ground floor and will be used by the Rotary and Lions Club meetings and the Down Town Bible Class, as well as other meetings requiring more seating capacity. This room has been finished in wall board with indirect fluorescent lighting. The kitchen joins this room on the south.

The lobby is being finished in rustic type wood paneling and the stairs which lead from the lobby to the upstairs area also has the

wood paneling. Just east of the lobby is a room that is being completed for use of various clubs of the county. Also, in the ground floor area is a room which is designated the "Cynthia Ann Parker Memorial Room" and will contain interesting history and memorabilia of that by-gone era of early Foard County history.

On the second floor on the west side, a large game room is being prepared and will contain ping pong and pool tables, and various other game equipment. Also upstairs, a room will be re-modeled for 4-H Club meetings, and the living quarters for the custodian are being made ready on the east end of the upstairs floor.

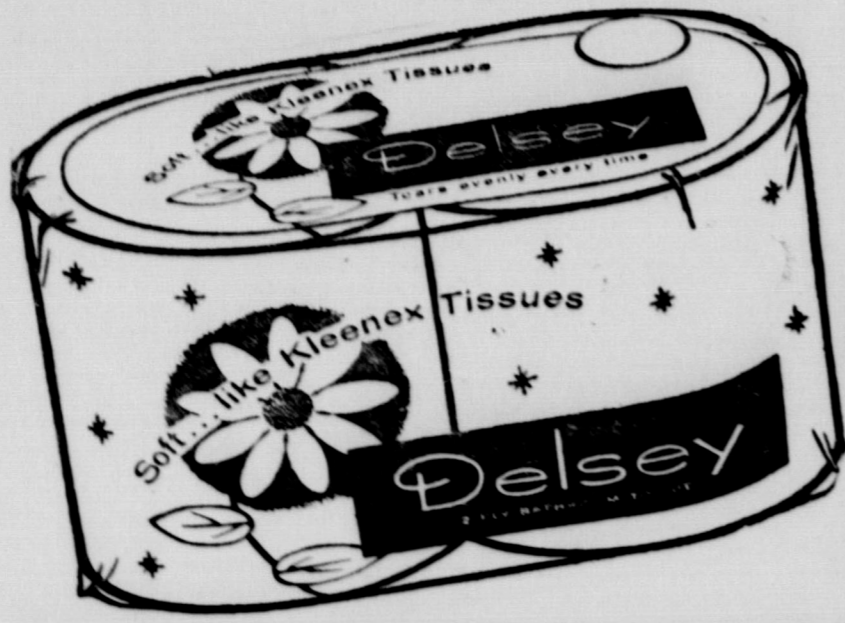

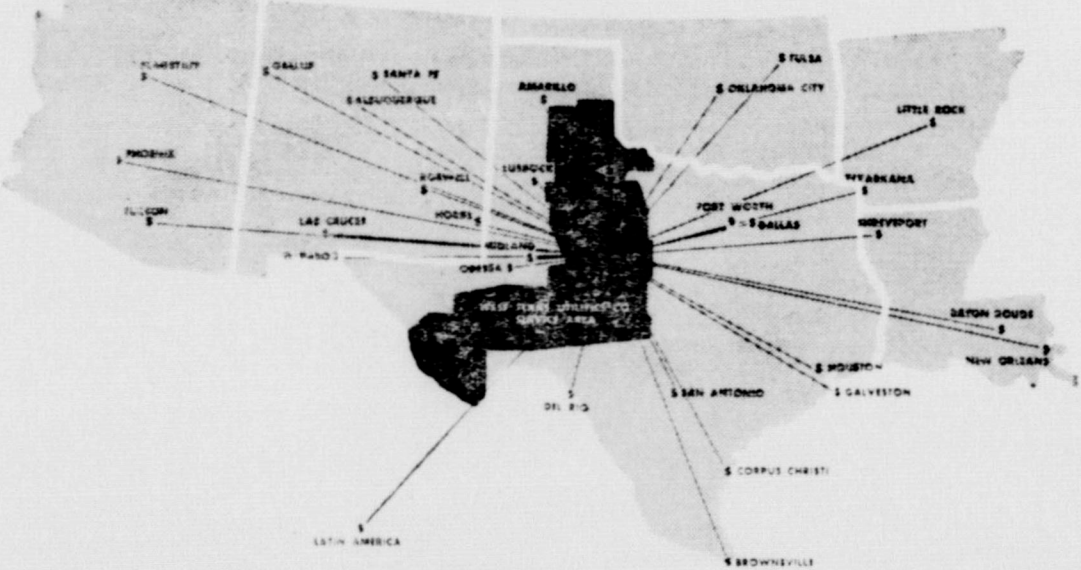

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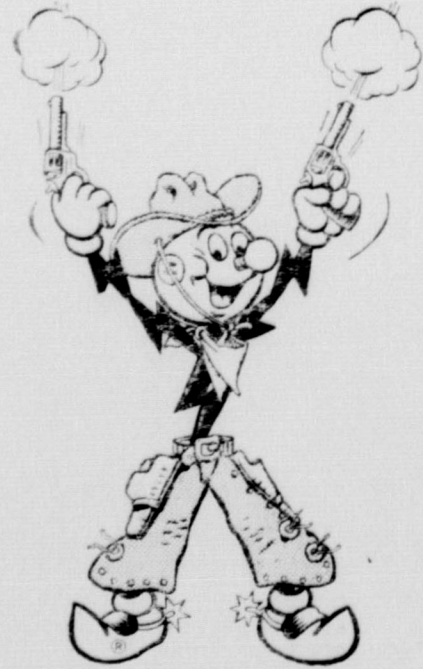

Home Demonstration Notes

Halloween is near and soon trick or treaters will be knocking on your door. Serve those special youngsters a tricky treat . . . pumpkin pie.

Here is a tasty recipe which will be pleasing for ghosts and witches on Halloween night or for your Thanksgiving dinner.

Ingredients:
 Pastry for one-crust pie: 2/3 cup brown sugar (packed), 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs, slightly beaten, 1 1/2 cups mashed or canned pumpkin, 1 1/2 cups milk.

Line pie pan with pastry and crimp edges. Mix sugar, spices and salt. Add eggs and mix well. Blend in pumpkin and milk. Pour into unbaked pie crust.

Preheat oven to 425 degrees and bake for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake for 45 minutes or until a knife inserted near the center of the pie comes out clean. Recipe makes one 9-inch pie.

If a richer spicier pie is desired, add 1/4 teaspoon cloves. For lighter color and milder flavor, use all white sugar and omit cloves.
