Reinhardt Died Suddenly at Home Friday

General Services Held at Baptist Church Sunday

General services for Greer Reinhardt, 70, World War I veteran and a retired Los Angeles policeman, were held at the First Baptist Church in Crowell Sunday at 2:30 p. m. with C. A. Powell officiating, assisted by Rev. Glenn Willson, pastor.

Reinhardt died unexpectedly at home Friday morning. He had been feeling badly for several days but his condition was not thought to be serious.

Special musical number for services was a duet, "Beyond the Sunset," sung by Mrs. W. A. and Mrs. Bob Thomas, with W. W. Lemons as piano accompanist.

Burial was in the Crowell cemetery under the direction of the funeral home.

Reinhardt was born June 21, at Lipan, Hood County. He came to Foard County with his parents and was reared in Crowell and Margaret counties. He was married to Miss Edna in 1924. They lived in Los Angeles, Calif., where he worked as a patrolman in the police department of that city for 20 years. After retiring, he and his wife moved back to Crowell where he had made his home since. He served four years in the Navy during World War II.

Survivors include Mrs. Reinhardt, five sisters and three brothers. They are Mrs. W. T. Ross of Fort Worth, Mrs. H. A. Hysinger and Frank Adams of Olton, Mrs. Murphy of Andrews, Mrs. Kenner of Midland, Lockhart of Quanah, Raymond of Andrews, Mack Reinhardt of Morton. It would take a huge spurt with a fourth-quarter rate of some \$590 billion, to attain that level. One government economist said flatly: 'We'll do well to hit \$560 billion.' Such a \$10 billion plunge below forecasts would cost the Treasury between \$2 billion and \$3 billion in tax revenues and

would end all hope of a budget balance."

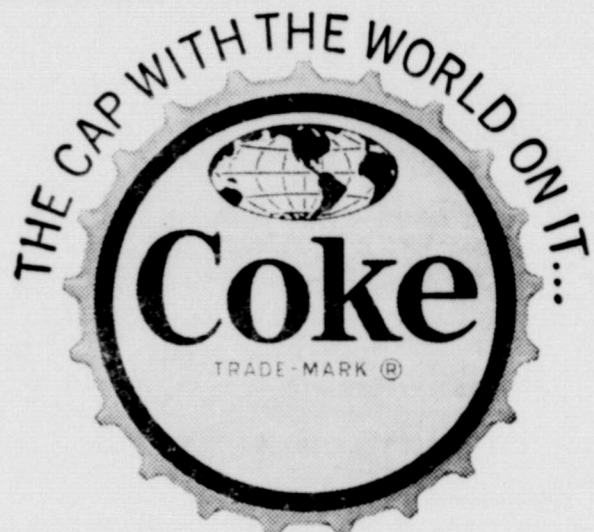

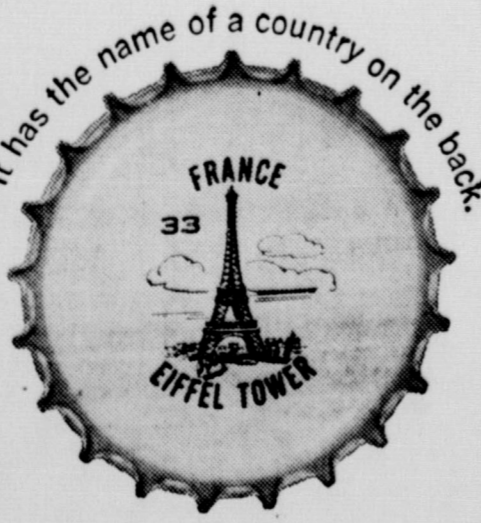
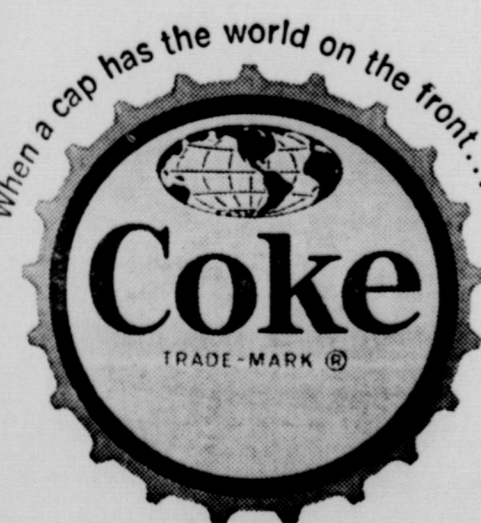

Home Demonstration Notes

JANET CARROLL

The County 4-H Dress Revue is Saturday, April 14, at 7:30 p. m. in the Crowell High School auditorium. The public is invited.

With the coming of spring comes an annual project for homemakers: spring housecleaning.

Chances are that the floors are in for a good scrubbing. Here are some suggestions for floor care.

After removing old wax, rinse with soap and warm water. Do this quickly so the water will not have time to reach the wood or to turn shellac coating white.

Floors will last longer if they are waxed regularly. This should be done every four to six months. If there are children in the home, there will probably be a need to touch up some spots often.

Ink stains can be removed from wood flooring by bleaching with oxalic acid or some other commercial wood bleach.

The rubber marks, caused by tennis shoes and hard rubber heels, may be removed with naphtha or paint thinner.

If there is grease on the floor, not much can be done except to sand off all the stained area.

On other badly stained areas—such as places where water has stood for some time, sanding also may be required.

After the stain has been removed, the next step is to patch the area with sealer and buff with a pad of steel wool. The patchwork will look much better than the stain.

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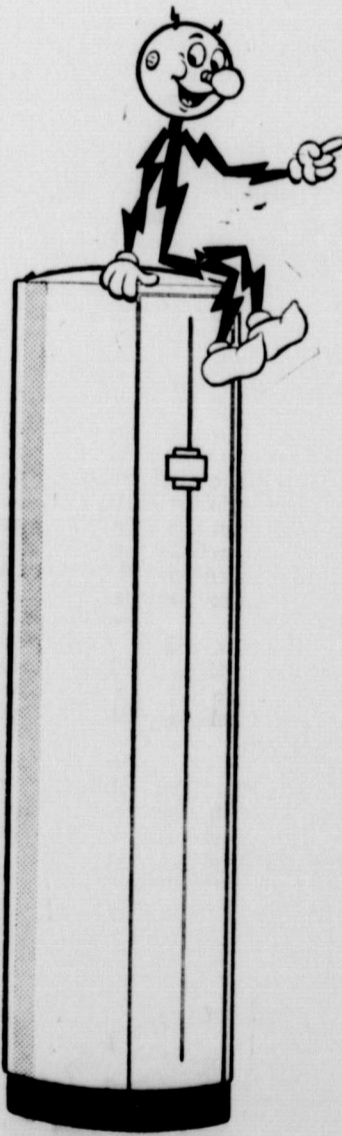

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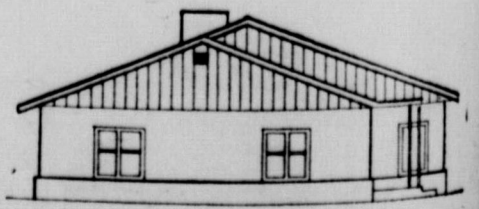

Forty Years from Now

What will the world be like 40 years from now? No man can say. But some attributes of life in the year 2002 — as well as many new problems that will challenge us — are already visible on the horizon. Scientists, planners and gadgeteers, are, nevertheless, boldly attempting to sketch in the details: The Nation: In 2002, the U. S. will be more industrialized and more urbanized than ever. About 35 million Americans — one out of every ten — will live in California. Other large cities' population will have doubled. The average family's income will be \$15,000. If the trend toward shorter working hours continues, the average worker will put in a 28-hour week. He will take three-day week ends, and four-week vacations with pay. Machines will maintain the nation's productivity. Transportation: Technology will come up with new vehicles capable of dazzling speed: ships and trains that speed at hundreds of miles an hour on virtually frictionless cushion of air. Mach-3 jets will cross the continent in little more than an hour. For just going down town, we may strap on a rocket belt and jump. The ideal city — as planners see it on paper — should be a place of air, space, sunlit towers, tree-lined malls, grassy parks. The underground conveyers will ship more supplies and freight in and out of the city. Monorails will carry people downtown. Moving sidewalks would whisk them the rest of the way. Communications: Communication satellites of all shapes, sizes, and nationalities will circle the air. Telephones will have astonishing Tom Swift features. Everything will be done by telephones. It will control appliances, the meals, and altogether the house. You can even operate the appliances from miles away. Medicine: By 2002, doctors will spend more time preventing disease than curing it. A single injection, or pill, will immunize us against all communicable ailments. There will be anti-cancer vaccines to prevent many deaths. Heart diseases, high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries and most disorders will be well under control by the end of the next four decades. By this time there will be spare parts for the human body — hearts, kidneys, livers, and other vital organs. Pills will slow down the aging processes. There will be painless, bloodless
