Altus Office Classes  
5,000 Cotton Samples  
During Past Week

Cotton harvest declined so that only 5,000 samples were classed for the week ending November 28, according to C. E. Cox of the Altus Cotton Classing Office. This brings total classing for the season to 62,000 bales, which compares with 172,000 to the same date a year ago.

Grade averages for the week showed little change. Twenty-six per cent were classed white, 61 per cent light spotted, and 12 per cent spotted.

Staple averages improved. Twelve per cent were called 20/32 inch, 14 per cent 15/16 inch, 21 per cent 31/32, and 56 per cent one inch and longer. Average was 31.3 thirty-seconds. Only six-tenths of one per cent was called wasty.

1,500 samples were mixed for farmers under the U. S. Testing Service. Microaire averages showed two per cent reading 2.9 and below, six per cent in the 3.0 to 3.4 range, twelve per cent in the 3.5 to 3.9 range, and 80 per cent read 4.0 and higher.

The cotton market in the area slowed considerably during the week. Merchants were able to move only certain grades and staples, which were used to fill prior commitments. Average prices paid farmers on current ginings were: middling light spotted 15/16 inch, 29.50 cents per pound; middling light spotted 31/32 inch, 29.50 cents; strict low middling light spotted 20/32 inch, 29.50 cents; strict low middling light spotted 15/16 inch, 29.50 cents; low middling light spotted 15/16 inch, 24.10 cents per pound.

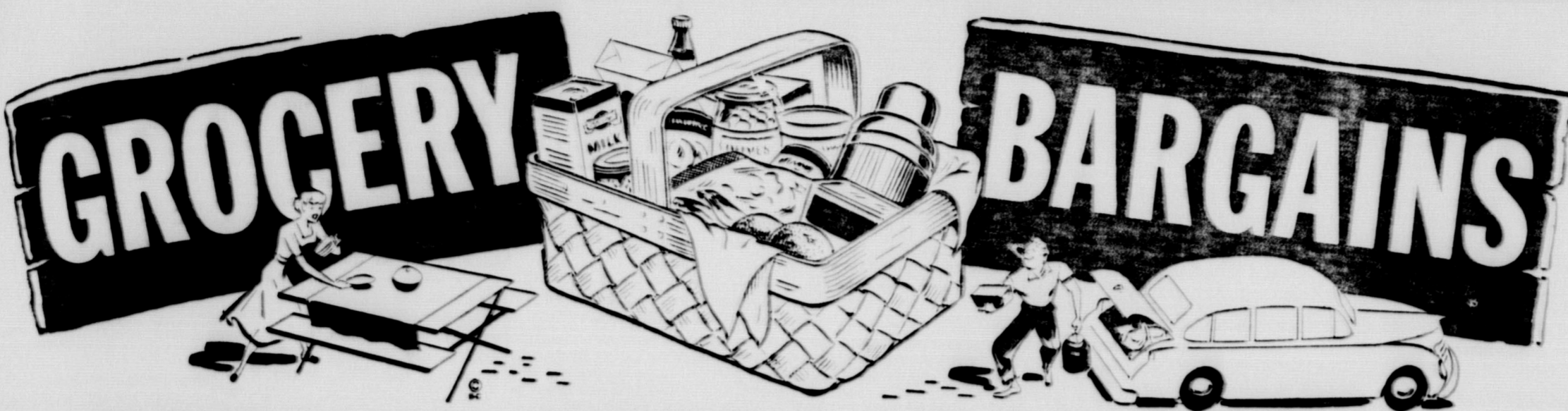

George Towne, in the Georgetown, Kentucky, News, said, "Only in America... the America of a bygone era, we are sorry to say, could a man shape his own destiny... Today, however, while he is still relatively free to choose his own line of endeavor, any similarity between that and shaping his own destiny, is purely coincidental. At the top of every business, regardless of size, is some bureaucratic office of the Federal Government... manipulating, controlling and otherwise effectively curtailing the efforts of free enterprise in a free society."

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
