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



Saturday, June 13, is the day qualified voters of the Crowell and Thalia School Districts will vote on whether or not the Crowell junior and senior high schools will be integrated this fall. The board said last week that although no election is required to determine the status of the school, it of Crowell, was assigned May 23 will abide by the results of the election.

Prior to a decision to integrate the Vernon schools, the local Negro high school students had been transferred to Vernon's Negro school.

The election will be held at the City Hall on the south side of the square in Crowell from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Since Thalia students will be coming to Crowell this fall, residents of the Thalia district are being invited to cast ballots in the election.

Eligible voters will be those qualified to vote in a state election and residing in the Crowell or Thalia school districts.
