Bearers were Loyd Fox, Moore, Jessie Moore, Dave Anton Kajs and S. V. Phillips, retired barber and who lived on a farm in Thalia community for 50 years, was accidentally killed Saturday while crossing a street.

Phillips was born in Madisonville, Tenn., on June 16, 1884. Mr. Phillips married Miss Jessie Rose Sims at City June 9, 1912. He had continuously in the Thalia community since 1914.

His wife was killed after being struck by a car on June 15, 1961.

Survivors include one son, Ray Phillips of San Diego, Calif., one daughter, Mrs. M. E. Phillips of Bremerton, Wash., and grandchildren.

Funeral services for Mr. Phillips will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday at the Thalia Home Chapel. Burial will be in Thalia Cemetery.

Heart Attack Claims Life of Percy Taylor

Last Rites Held at
First Baptist Church
Tuesday Morning

Sheriff Percy W. Taylor, 44, died unexpectedly Sunday afternoon in the Crowell hospital after suffering a heart attack. Mr. Taylor, a life-long resident of Foard County and sheriff since 1956, had won the Democratic primary for a new four-year term as Foard County Sheriff, tax assessor-collector.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Tuesday from the First Baptist Church in Crowell with the pastor, Rev. Glen Willson, and Rev. W. B. Fitzgerald of Petrolia, a former pastor, officiating. Masonic graveside rites were conducted by the Thalia lodge in the Wilbarger Memorial Park where burial was directed by Womack Funeral Home.

Members of the Texas Sheriffs' Association were named as honorary pall bearers. Active pall bearers were Richard Mickle of Cement, Okla., Homer T. Melton of Benjamin, Duane Cates, Bill Lynch, Foster Davis, Nelson Olliphant, Dr. Martin Kralicke and Revis Harris of Crowell.

Mr. Taylor was born and reared in the Thalia community. He married Miss Marjorie Cole of Vernon in Frederick, Okla., April 1, 1940.

Survivors include the widow; one daughter, Mrs. Gayle Scott of Austin; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Taylor of Thalia; three sisters, Mrs. Jessie Miller of Vernon, Mrs. Sam Donald of New Orleans and Mrs. Joe Johnson of Harvey, La.; two brothers, Russell Taylor of Gretna, La., and Roland Taylor of Wichita Falls; and two grandchildren, Michael David and Linda Carol Scott of Austin.

Mr. Taylor had served as a member of the Thalia School Board and held membership in the Thalia Masonic Lodge and the Texas Sheriffs Association.

The flag on the court house square was ordered flown at half mast by the Commissioners Court for a week as a memorial to Sheriff Taylor.

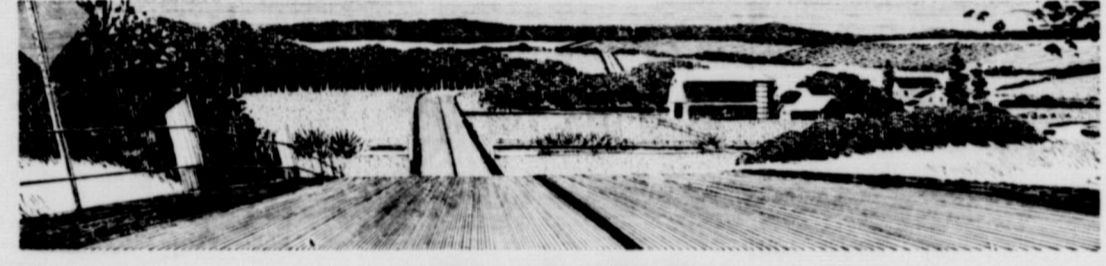

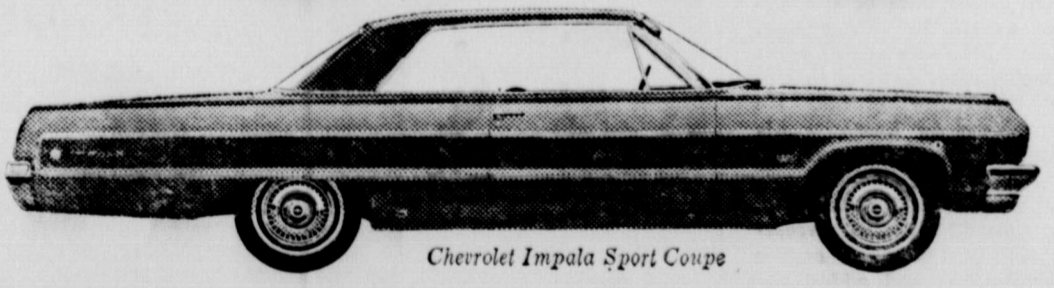
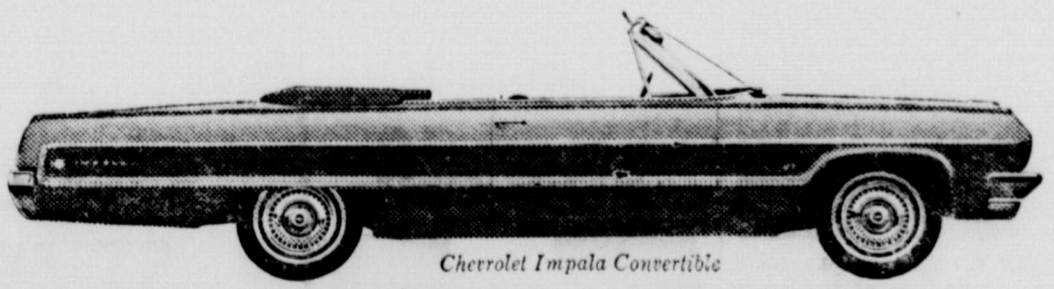

Highlights

Austin, Tex.—State Democratic party leaders here have completed advance preparations for a June 16 Texas party convention which could turn into a donnybrook or go off smooth as silk.

Action will take place at Houston's big coliseum and the swank Shamrock Hilton Hotel, convention headquarters.

Delegates and alternate delegates who will cast the 2,834 authorized votes (some counties are sending up to 15 times their authorized strength) will be quartered in 27 hotels scattered all over Houston.

Big job is selecting delegates to the August national presidential nominating convention in Atlantic City and picking Texas national Democratic committee representatives.

Big argument is whether the convention will go on record as favoring the as-yet-unwritten national Democratic platform.

Gov. John Connally, who claims a two-thirds to three-fourths margin of control, prefers that delegates remain silent on the liberal national program. He wants to write his own state party platform at the September state convention along moderate-to-conservative lines.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough and State AFL-CIO President Hank Brown argue the convention not only should pledge its support to President Johnson (there is no argument about that) but to his liberal program as well.

Some 26 per cent of the convention's seats are in contest.

Austin Attorney Will D. Davis, chairman of a State Democratic Executive Committee sub-panel on credentials, has instructed heads of 14 rival delegates from seven counties to send him advance written briefings on their positions.

Hearings will begin Monday (June 15) at 9 a. m. in the Shamrock. Recommendations of Davis' group will be passed along to the full SDEC, which will decide in an 8:30 a. m. Tuesday (June 16) session which delegates will be seated. The convention opens at 10 a. m.

Rival fund-raising events are scheduled Monday (June 15). The pro-Connally SDEC will stage a \$10-a-plate dinner to finance the convention. Yarborough's Gulf Coast friends have scheduled an appreciation dinner for the senior senator at the same time.

If President Johnson has any preference about how things should go, he apparently kept silent on them during his recent trip to Texas. Aides maintained to the end of the visit he did not discuss politics with his old friend Governor Connally, Senator Yarborough or anybody else.

LOAN REGULATIONS ADOPTED—Small loan company advertising of such terms as "lowest costs," "quickest service" and "easy payments" is "misleading" under new state regulations. All advertising claims by lenders are subject to the test of absolute accuracy.

Regulations were adopted after public hearings here and go into effect on July 1. Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank A. Miskell has announced.

Miskell lists other regulations as: No strong-arm collection practices permitted. . . . Companies must keep detailed records showing all charges on loans. . . . Borrowers must be furnished copies of insurance policies purchased in connection with loans. . . . Money collected in premiums must be turned over to the insurance companies promptly.

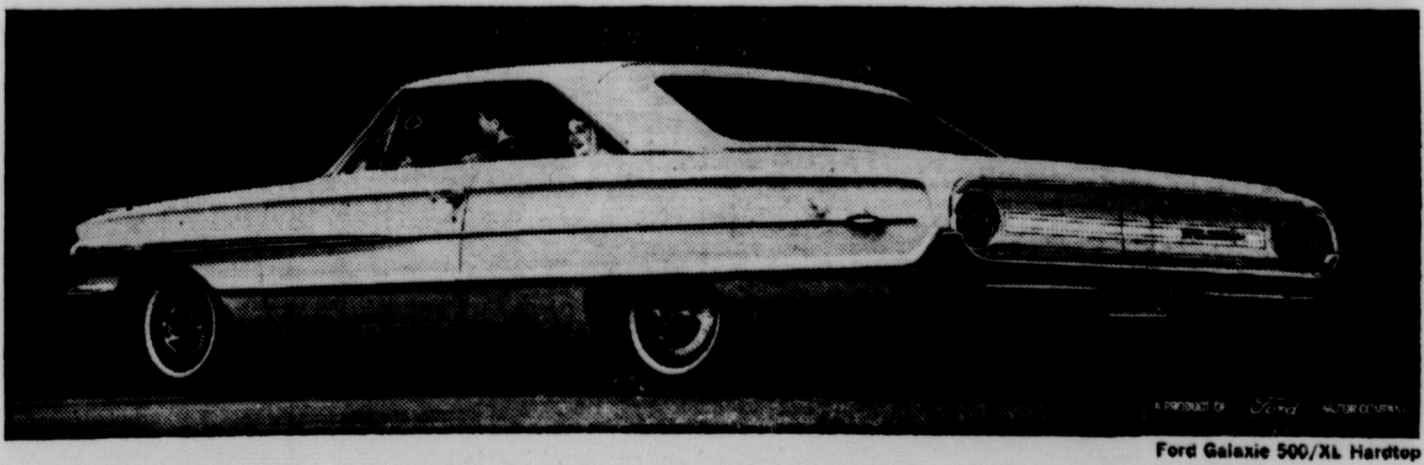

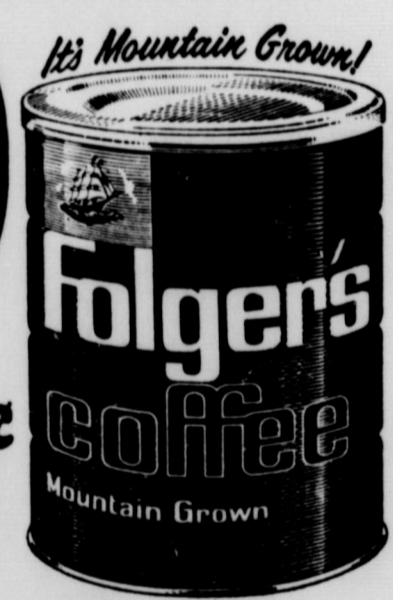

Friday: first and second rounds quarter horse senior cutting, junior reining, and senior reining with top horses in each event competing for the championship during the 8 p. m. rodeo performance.
Saturday: selection of winners in each of 19 halter classes... parade of first and second place halter winners at 7:30 p. m. junior and senior champion cutting horses will compete at rodeo performance for the grand championship.
