The 27th annual FFA and 4-H Project Show, consisting of fat steers, sheep, swine and poultry, were judged Saturday, March 14, in the Vocational Agriculture building in Crowell.

Don Bill Statser exhibited the grand champion fat steer which weighed 940 pounds. Reserve champion was exhibited by Jackie Daniels and it weighed 960 lbs.

The grand champion fat lamb was shown by Janie Hughton and the reserve champion was exhibited by Joe Ray Burkett.

Lee Looney showed the grand champion hog and the reserve champion was shown by Davis Barrera.

Hood Wills of Quannah was the judge for the fat steers, sheep and swine, and Walker Todd of Quannah judged the poultry.

Auctioneer was Oris Reynolds, owner and operator of the Vernon Livestock Auction, and he sold Don Bill Statser's grand champion steer to the Farmers Co-Op. Elevator of Crowell for 50 cents per pound. The Quannah Cotton Oil Mill bought Jackie Daniels' re-



**Deadline Nears for '64
Feed Grain Sign-Up**

Friday, March 27, is the last day for filing an application to take part in the 1964 Feed Grain Program. Ray Hysinger, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, stated this week. He urges growers who are interested in the program to call at the ASCS county office as soon as possible.

"Time has a way of slipping up on us even though we think we have plenty," Mr. Hysinger pointed out. "Actually, there are only seven working days left in which to sign up for this year's program. The office is open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. from Monday through Friday. We don't want anybody to be disappointed because he waited too long."

As last year, Mr. Hysinger explains, the feed grain program covers corn, grain sorghum, and barley. Minimum diversion under the 1964 program is 20 per cent of the individual farm's total feed grain base. For diverting more than the minimum acreage from feed grain production into a conserving use, the diversion payment will be figured at a higher rate. If the diversion is 10 per cent or more, the higher rate applies to the whole diversion.

Besides the diversion payments part of which may be paid in advance if the farmer requests it, a participating grower also earns price support payments on the normal production of the acreage planted to one or more of the three feed grains in 1964, and he is also eligible to put his crops under the regular price support loans or purchase agreements.

Hysinger added, "If you do not intend to file an application to take part in the program we would appreciate you calling at the office or telephoning us of your intentions."

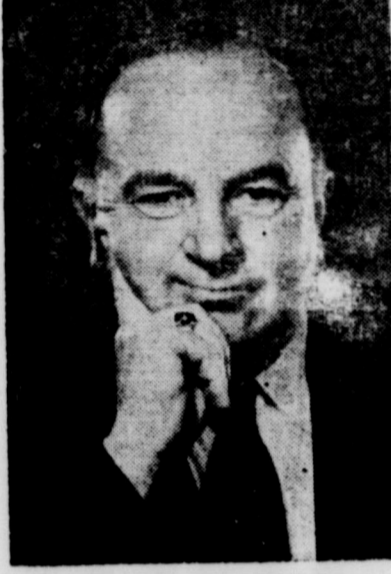

Deadline Near for Obtaining 1964 Inspection Sticker

The time is almost here—April 15th is the deadline for having your 1964 Motor Vehicle Inspection sticker displayed in the lower right hand corner of your windshield. Only 50 per cent of the 694,369 registered vehicles in Region No. 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety have visited safety inspection stations and obtained the 1964 safety inspection sticker, according to Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the D. P. S.

"Residents of Foard County own 1,610 registered vehicles and 810 have not been inspected as yet," Johnson said.

"Under the law there can be no extension of the deadline, and motorists who fail to display the new sticker on and after April 16th are subject to arrest," he said. Authority for the enforcement of the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Act is vested in any sheriff or deputy sheriff and city policeman as well as the enforcement officers of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

According to Captain Johnson, "there are two state approved inspection stations located in this county, and many motorists are going to find long lines awaiting them as the deadline rolls nearer."

He added, "It is as much a violation to display an old sticker as not to have one at all. The law provides a fine of from one dollar to two hundred dollars plus court costs for operating a vehicle registered in Texas subject to the Motor Vehicle Inspection Act without a valid current inspection sticker."

Governor Sets April as School Board Month

The following proclamation and article telling of school board workshops to be held over the state was sent to the News by Donald G. Nugent, executive director of the Texas Association of School Boards. Mr. Nugent says, "We very much appreciate any assistance you can give us in this attempt to make our citizens more aware of the importance to public education of the leadership provided by local citizens and by local boards of education."

On April 25, 1964, school board members from local districts in all fifty states will gather in Houston for the four-day National School Boards Convention, marking the first time this convention has been held in Texas.

This will climax a month of activities and events in Texas which will emphasize the importance of local school boards.

On April 1, school board elections will be held in most school districts. 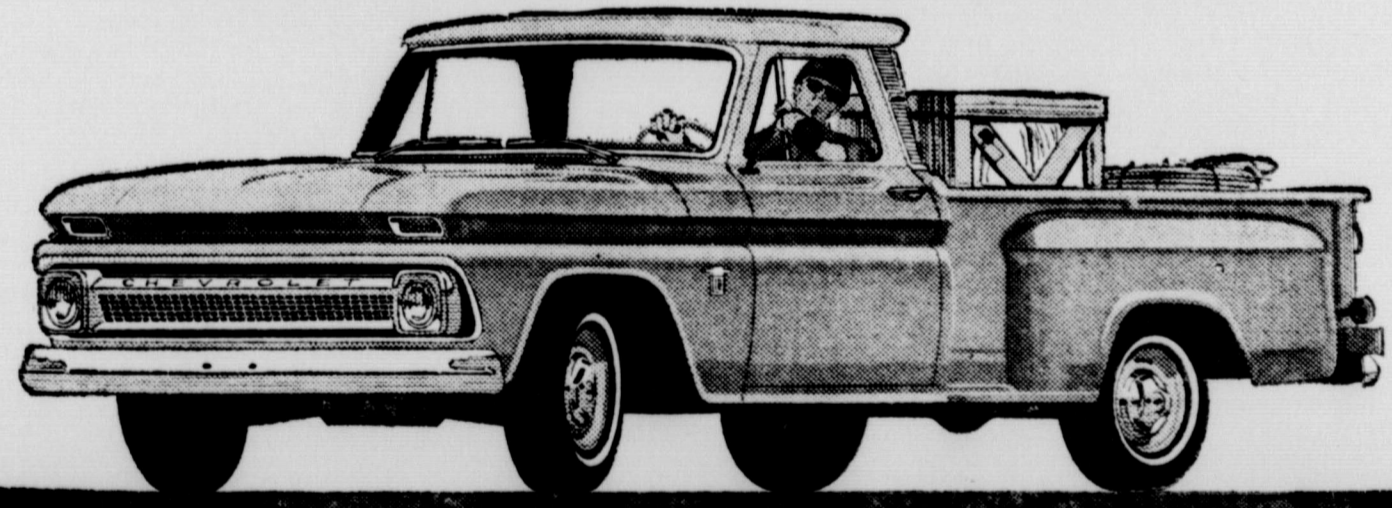

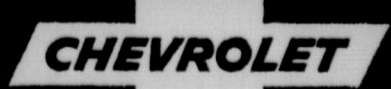

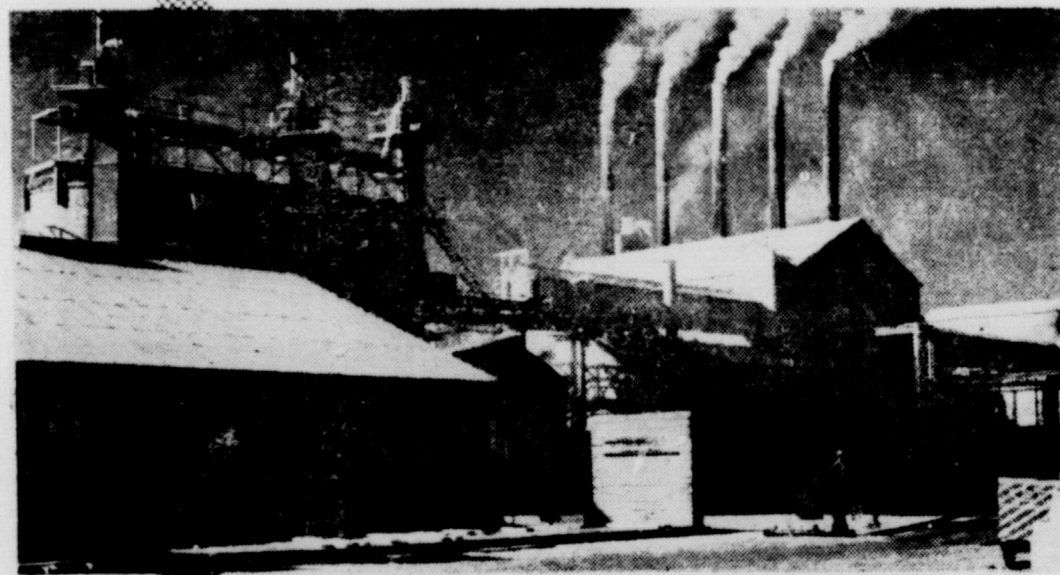

Answer: The Treasury condone such schemes, sell more bonds. In fact agents have been told to sell bonds where they suspect they are for such purpose. Whether or not the bonds are sent through the post office is another matter.
