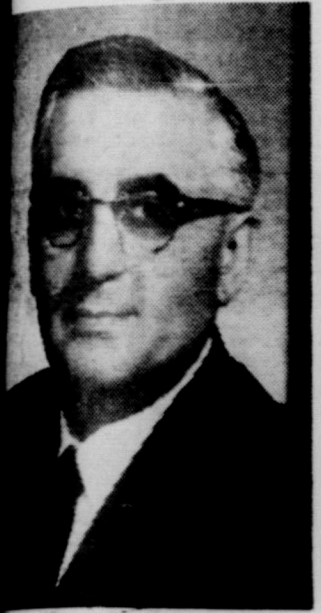


Harvest Festival to End Methodists' 75th Year

Students Impressed by Austrian Entertainers

On Friday, Nov. 2, at 9 a. m., the student body was entertained by the Gay Tyroleans, three men from Innsbruck, Austria. These men, presenting a Southern Assembly program, displayed many talents, such as singing, yodeling, dancing, and playing the guitar, accordion, and cow bells. They wore the gay and authentic costumes of their country. They are representatives of the Austrian government to further good will and to exchange cultural interests. They told about Austria's people, their customs, and the origin and uses of yodeling.

Mr. Black, who visited in Austria this past summer, invited the men to spend the week end with him. They enjoyed the football game, the half time performances, and the enthusiasm of the fans. They were amazed at the American standard of living, commenting that Americans waste more food than Austria has to feed her people. They were also impressed by the contrasts between the teenagers of the two countries. They were startled that the American youth had so much freedom, so much money, so many cars. In their country, there are few cars, little money for entertainment, etc.

Through their visit we got a glimpse of their home country, and we hope that they were favorably impressed by the glimpse they got of us—a group of typical American teen agers in action.

ball from quarterback Dan Mike Bird and then tossed a short pass to fullback Doyal near the sideline, and he in turn received a few blocks from teammates and raced the remaining 82 yards to pay dirt for the clinching TD. He also plunged for the extra two points to make the halftime score 16 to 0 for the Wildcats. Larry Henry intercepted a Bearcat pass to break up a Henrietta drive as the first half ended.

In the third quarter, Crowell received and picked up one first down on Crowell's 36-yard line. The Bearcats made only one first down before kicking to Crowell. The Wildcats were held and forced to punt. The kick was short and the Clay County boys took over on Crowell's 36-yard line. It took only five plays for the lone Henrietta touchdown. Fullback Eugene Franklin ran the last nine yards for the score. He also plunged the extra two points over to make the score 16 to 8 at the end of the third quarter.

The Bearcats reached Crowell's 20-yard line once in the last quarter before Crowell's defense held to break up the threat. Their last attempt to start a drive was halted by an intercepted pass by Paul Bax Ekern, Crowell guard.

Several Crowell boys were handicapped by injuries going into this game. All-district end Junior Hopkins, who missed the first four games of the season due to injuries received a broken hand in the first half last Friday night. He will probably miss the remainder of this season's games. Halfback Bob Borchardt, end Jimmy Pendergraft, and tackle Ken Ferguson were unable to play last Friday night due to injuries.

This victory gave Crowell a 1, 2, 1 record for conference play. Henrietta has won two district games and lost two. Munday is the only undefeated team in the district race. The Moguls will play the Chillicothe Eagles at Munday this Friday night in a contest that should determine the championship. The Eagles have only one blot on their record, a tie with Crowell.

**Warning Issued by
Draft Board About
Registering Late**

The Vernon draft board, because of an increasing number of draft-age men who register late, reminded the people of Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties this week of requirements and penalties for failure to comply with the federal Selective Service act.

James F. Gregory of Vernon, board chairman, pointed out that all young men are required to register at the nearest draft board on their 18th birthday, or within five days thereafter.

He also reminded that failure to obey any provision of the law is punishable by up to \$10,000 fine, or five years in prison, or both, upon prosecution and conviction.

Men who register late may also be moved to the head of the list for immediate armed forces service if a local board elects to establish the policy.

Mr. Gregory said that all males born after August 30, 1922, except those not yet 18 years old, are required to be registered under the current law. Men 18 through 25 registered in 1948 and men have been required to register at 18 since.

Young men may register at the board office in the court house at Vernon or with Ray Shirley here in Crowell.

 Open Until Jan. 13**

Get out your shotguns and am-
 mo. The goose season is upon us.
 Shooting hours for this favorite
 of the waterfowl hunters are from
 sunrise to sunset on all days in-

Hunters who have been disap-

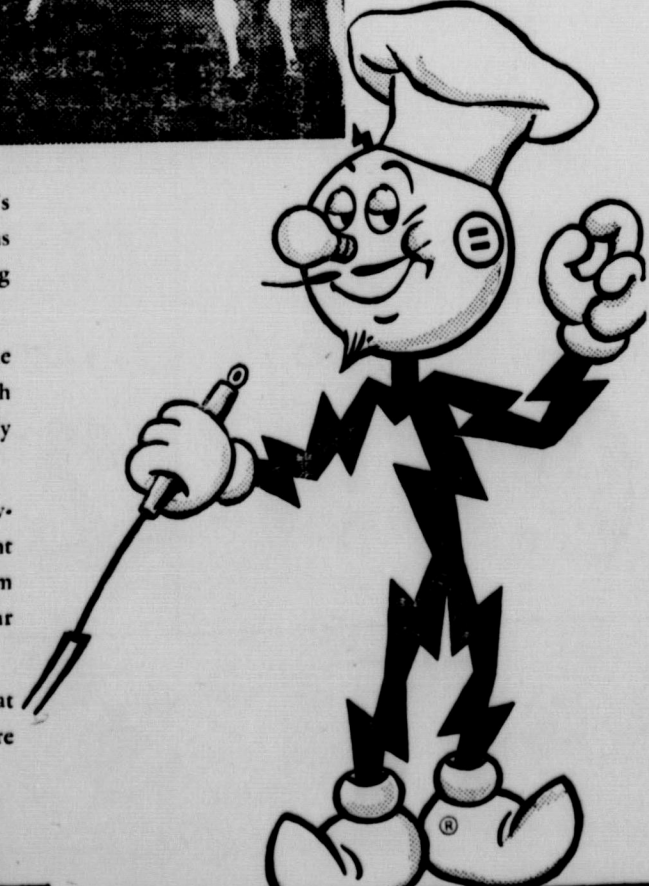

THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Friday, Nov. 11, 1932, issue of The Foard County News:

Work on the location survey for Highway No. 16 in Foard County was started Wednesday morning by B. K. Garrett, who has been named Foard County resident engineer by the Texas Highway Department. He and a crew of men started the survey from Crowell toward Pease River.

A flying circus of three airplanes, and possibly four, will be here for the Armistice Day celebration.

Late Wednesday, it appeared that Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic candidate for President, would carry 43 states in his race against President Herbert Hoover. The landslide in all parts of the country has also resulted in assuring Roosevelt of a strong Democratic Congress. Foard's vote was Roosevelt 885, Hoover 53.

The culmination of over three years of faithful effort and hard work by the Gordon J. Ford Post No. 130 of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary is represented in the remarkable War Memorial unveiled this morning on the northwest corner of the court house lawn.

Although the Armistice was signed fourteen years ago, nevertheless a great battle was fought in Crowell last Friday between two traditional enemies, Crowell High School and Chillicothe High, with Crowell winning 21 to 14 in the finest offensive display ever seen on a local field.

Methodist Church to Conclude 75th Year with Harvest Festival

(Continued from page 1)

two years the district was divided, thus forming the Vernon District. Rev. Hightower was the first preacher after Margaret became a charge.

In the summer of 1887, Rev. Sam Hardy held the first camp meeting in the community. The meeting was held under a brush arbor east of Crowell at the John Banister place. At this meeting, plans were made to erect the Banister Chapel where the arbor stood. Judge A. M. Carter of Fort Worth gave five acres of land for the church site and cemetery. Charter members of the church were Messrs. and Mmes. John Banister, B. H. Daughtry, W. S. Hartman, G. A. Mitchell, J. G. Witherspoon, R. A. Wells and R. R. Bell.

In 1891, the organization, under the leadership of Rev. Sam Hardy, was moved to Crowell. Church services were held in the "college" until it burned in 1897; then services were held in the courthouse for a number of years. Ministers serving during this time were J. M. Gibson, John R. Henson, J. G. Ford, L. G. Rogers, I. N. Crutchfield and U. P. Ulrich.

Under the direction of the pastor, R. A. Walker, the first Methodist church building was completed at 324 North A, at a cost of \$1,200. Other pastors for this church were C. E. Lindsey, J. T. Bloodworth, J. A. Travis, M. L. Moody, G. T. Gray, G. G. Hamilton, G. J. Irvin, R. A. Stewart, M. W. Rogers and J. H. Hamblen. During this time a need for a new parsonage arose. Between 1909-1910, a committee composed of W. S. Bell, N. J. Roberts, T. L. Hughston and Hines Clark was appointed to secure ground for a new parsonage. The building was erected at the present parsonage site in 1911 at a cost of \$1,805. The indebtedness was paid by 1918.

As early as 1916, plans were begun for the construction of the present Methodist church building at 324 North Main. Construction began in 1919 with completion in 1921. J. H. Hamblen was the pastor, and the building committee was composed of M. S. Henry, T. L. Hughston, J. W. Bell, S. S. Bell, H. E. Ferguson and Hines Clark. The church, at a cost of \$65,000, was free of indebtedness by 1943.

Pastors who served during the 1920's and 1930's were W. M. Murrell, T. C. Willett, J. M. Fuller, W. J. Mayhew, W. R. McCarter, B. J. Osborne, G. E. Turrentine, E. L. Yeats and W. B. Hicks. H. A. Longino was serving as pastor in 1942 when the tornado struck, destroying the Methodist parsonage and damaging the church building. Claude Callaway, J. P. Davidson and Hines Clark served as a committee to direct the repairs at the church. Under the direction of a committee composed of Leslie Thomas, Mrs. J. R. Beverly and Mrs. Hines Clark, the present parsonage at 502 N. First Street was constructed at a cost of \$8,000.

Pastors since the tornado have been R. S. Watkins, D. D. Denison, A. C. Haynes, M. A. Walker, R. M. McAnally, Grady M. Adcock and Carl Hudson. John M. Fitzgerald is the pastor now. At the present time, the church property is valued at \$165,000, and the membership is 391.
