Four Accidents in June Reported by Highway Patrol

The Highway Patrol investigated four rural traffic accidents in Foard County during the month of June, according to Sgt. D. R. Dowdy, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person killed and an estimated property damage of \$4,525.00.

The rural traffic accident summary in Foard County for the first six months of 1964 shows a total of 12 crashes resulting in one person killed, four persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$7,710.00.

"As of July 3, there had been a total of 1,980 fatal crashes in Texas taking the lives of 1,288 persons," the sergeant stated. This is 174 more traffic deaths than for the same period of 1963. If traffic deaths continue at the present rate, 1964 will become the most deadly year in Texas history for traffic fatalities, not only exceeding the 1963 all-time high of 2,729 deaths, but going over the 3,000 fatality mark.

The veteran patrol supervisor stated, "This is not just a probability, but a possible reality, unless the motoring public becomes more thoughtful in regard to complying with traffic laws which would break the rising trend."

Miss Welch is currently serving as historian of the Area IV of the F. H. A. Area IV is comprised of over 100 chapters in this part of the state. There are about 3,000 delegates attending the convention.

Monday was cool and pleasant, however, the mercury began to move upward again by Tuesday afternoon.

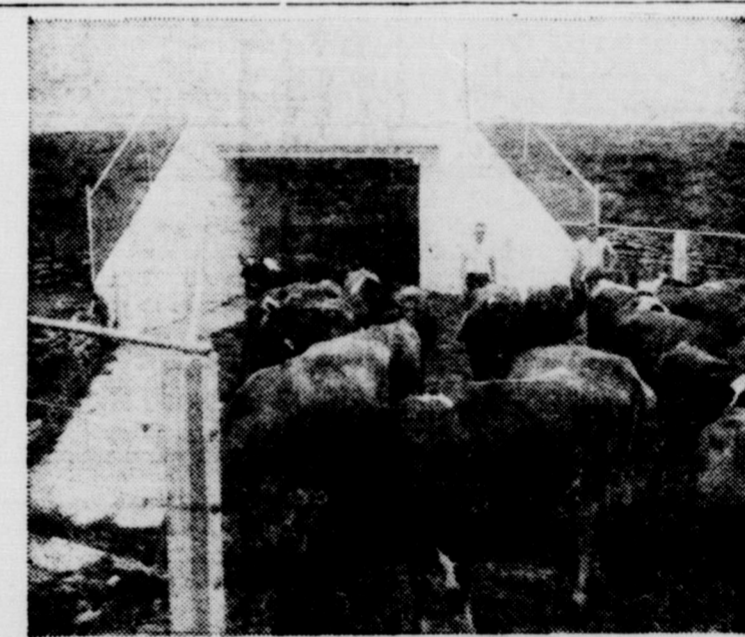
The extremely hot weather has dried out the county, and as nearly always about the middle of July, a good general rain is needed.

Bank Deposits Here on July 30 Total \$3,110,144.16

Deposits in the Crowell State Bank at the close of business on June 30 totaled \$3,110,144.16. In spite of the near-million-bushel wheat crop made in the county this year, deposits are down over \$918,000 from this time a year ago when deposits totaled \$4,028,430.81.

Deposits took a \$979,150.83 increase over the total on April 15 at which time deposits were \$2,129,983.35.



DAIRY COWS graze contentedly outside the entrance to an underground livestock shelter near Elkhorn, Neb., which was built by J. Gordon Roberts, president of Roberts Dairy of Omaha, to protect 200 Guernsey cows and three bulls from a nuclear attack. His dairy farm is only about 25 miles from Strategic Air Command headquarters near Omaha. In peacetime, the \$35,000 shelter is used as a "loafing shed" for the cows to get out of the sun. Roberts, who has also built shelters for his family and employees, says he built the livestock shelter because "the American dairy cow is one of the best in the world. It took 300 years to produce this type of animal. It makes sense to preserve it if we can."

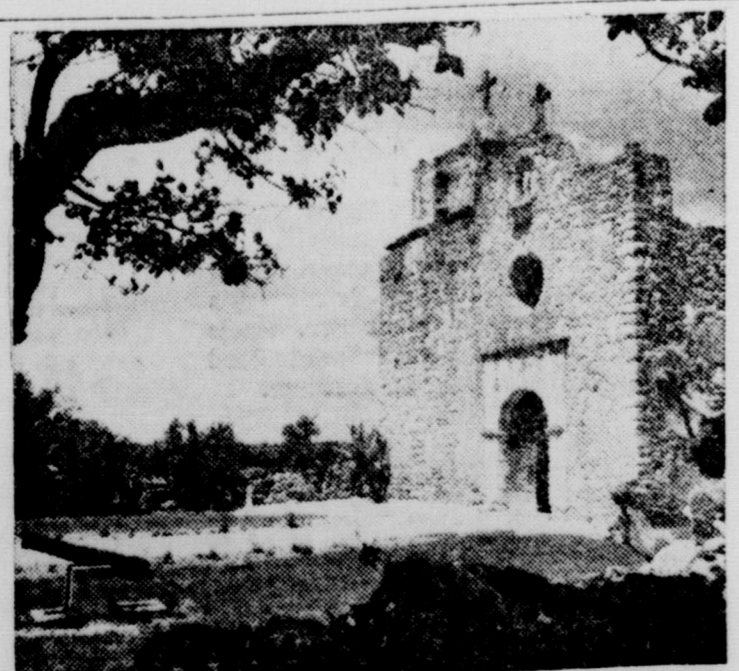
Crowell-Childress L. L. All-Stars Play Here Friday Night

subjects as the licensing of unfit drivers; teen-age accident rates; apathetic attitudes toward highway hotrodders; and the high death and insurance rates that very evidently result from such causes. Small heed has been paid them, and little has been done about anything.

In their latest appeal, the companies of the Kemper Insurance Group point out that continuing indifference to traffic abuses will eventually result in public restrictions.

Among other things, this would mean extra police, higher highway costs, additional upward pressure on insurance rates, and the loss of driving privileges for many, instead of for only a dangerous few.

Kemper makes the valid point that people in a democracy should not let things come to such a sorry pass, but should try to do something about them. Highway safety is the concern of all of us. Each of us should seek to maintain it in his own way; some by promoting safety through organizations; some by instigating action against the more obvious abuses; all by

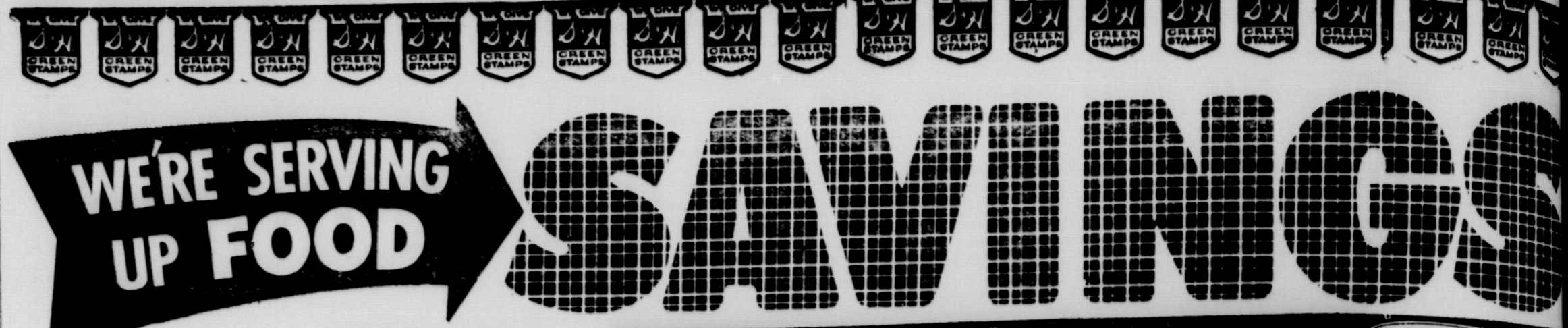

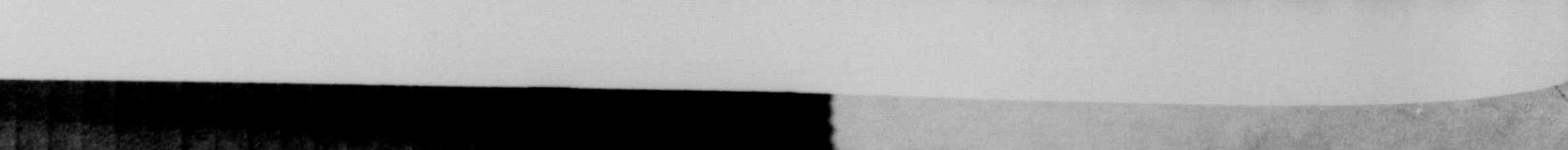

Albert L. Nickerson, board chairman of Socony Mobil Oil Co., reports: "Since 1947, total employee compensation has increased by 165 per cent, while corporate profits have increased only 49 per cent. In the period 1947 through 1963, compensation of employees rose from 65 per cent to 71 per cent of the national income . . .
