DAIRY COWS graze contentedly outside the entrance to an undeground livestock shelter near Elkhorn, Neb., which was built by J. Gordon Roberts, president of Roberts Dairy of Omaha, to protect 200 Guernsey cows and three bulls from a nuclear attack, His dairy farm is only about 25 miles from Strategic Air Command headquarters near Omaha. In peacetime, the \$35,000 shelter is used as a "loafing shed" for the cows to get out of the sun. Roberts, who has also built shelters for his family and employees, says he built the livestock shelter because "the American dairy cow is one of the best in the world. It took 300 years to produce this type of animal. It makes sense to preserve it if we can."

Are the recognized treatments belittled?

If the answer to any of these is "yes"-be wary. Investigate before you invest! Save your money-and maybe your life!







Texas Publication Laws (Article 1609) - County Finances publication of financial report of county by county clerk.

"Immediately after the first regular term of said court in each year said clerk shall publish once in some weekly newspaper published in his county, or if there be no paper published therein, then by posting four copies of such exhibit, one in each commissioners precinct, one of which shall be at the courthouse door, the other three at public places in such precinets, an exhibit showing the aggregate amount paid out of each fund for the four preceding quarters, and the balance to the credit or debit of each fund, also the amount of indebtedness of said county, with their respective dates of accrual, and to whom and for what due; also the amount to the debt or credit of each officer or other persons with whom an account is kept. The cost for publishing the same shall be paid by order of said court out of the general fund of the county." Attorney General's Opinion: "Publication mandatory. Requirement for publication of quarterly report of county clerk is mandatory, rost thereof to be paid out of general fund of the county."
