He received some splendid blocking on his run. Crowell drove to Chillicothe's 15-yard line before losing the ball on downs. The Eagles picked up five consecutive first downs before Crowell took over on their own 17. The Wildcats were unable to muster a sustained drive in this last minute of the contest.

This was one of the best games seen here in several years and to mention stars would not be fair. Those boys playing for Crowell were Bill Harris and Mike Shrode, center; Paul Bax Ekern, James Corder and Otis Johnson, guards; Jimmy Hudgens, Jon Lee Black and Ken Ferguson, tackles; Ronny Clifton, Jimmy Pendergrass and Black, ends; and Dan Mike Bird, Dale Doyal, Larry Henry, Junior Hopkins, Bill Fitzgerald, Freddie Wehba and Mike Gamble, backs.

Chillicothe was led by backs Kenneth Smith and Larry Perkins. However, their forward wall was as strong as Crowell has encountered this season. Buddy Lytle, 199-pound tackle, and center Hoot Gibson probably were standouts in this department.

The Wildcats will travel to Munday this Friday night to play another top team in the district for the third consecutive week. The Moguls have victories over Henrietta, Holliday and Paducah. The Crowell boys would have to produce some more super-man power to stay on the field with this district leader. Several of the Wildcats received minor injuries in the Chillicothe game, but most of the ones that saw service last week should be ready for this one, too. The two Borchardt boys, Bob in the backfield, and John Carl in the line, had to miss last week due to injuries. It is doubtful that either one will be able to play tomorrow night.

## Foard County's Cotton Ginnings Total 584 Bales

A harvest stalled by rain plus failure of earlier potentials to materialize has caused Texas Employment Commission to reduce drastically its original cotton production estimate for Foard County.

Al Dunnam, farm field man for the Vernon TEC office, announced Friday a reduction in the estimated 1962 production in Foard County from the original 5,170 bales to 4,620.

In Friday's report, Mr. Dunnam listed Foard County's total ginnings for this season at 584 bales.

The cotton harvest continues slow. The Altus, Okla., Cotton Classing Office classed 8,632 samples during the week ending Oct. 19 as compared with 19,678 for the same period a year ago. Total samples classed for farmers this season are 22,070 compared with 78,487 by the same time last year.

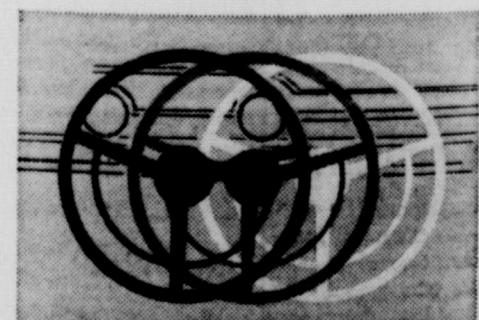

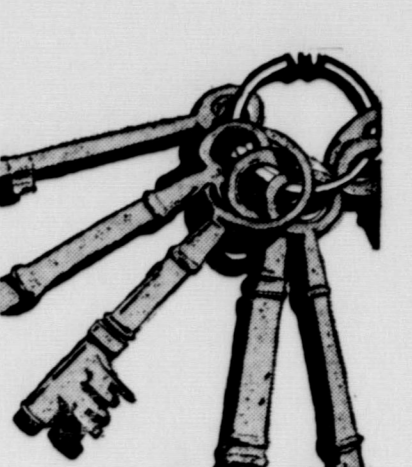

**Signup Period Announced for Wheat Program**

Winter wheat farmers may sign up to participate in the special voluntary 1963 wheat program authorized by the Food and Agriculture Act of 1962 between Oct. 15 and Dec. 14. Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced.

The legislation raises the support price on 1963-crop wheat to \$2.00 to farmers who participate in the special program. The 18-cent-per-bushel support increase will be paid in-kind based on the normal production of the farm's harvested acreage. The voluntary program, Secretary Freeman said, gives wheat farmers an opportunity to continue to make needed adjustments and thus protect the gain made this year under the 1962 program.

Under the voluntary reduction provisions for 1963, farmers will be able to divert from 20 to 50 per cent of their wheat acreage with special diversion provisions for small farms. On diverted acres, a payment will be made at 50 per cent of the county loan rate (reflecting the \$1.82 per bushel national average) on the normal production (1959-60 average yields) of the diverted wheat acreage. The minimum diversion for participation is 20 per cent of the wheat allotment or in the case of small farms 20 per cent of the allotment or the average 3-year wheat acreage (1959-60-61), whichever is larger. Of the \$2.00 per bushel 1963 average support price to partici-

She introduced C. A. Deuchle of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company who gave an interesting talk on the latest means of overseas communication, Telstar. Telstar, a satellite of magnesium frame work, is 34 1/2 inches in diameter, weighs 170 pounds and has a 158-minute orbit period. The electronic equipment is suspended in a 20-inch aluminum canister inside the satellite. By such means it is possible for 60 two-way conversations or 600 one-way voice channels to occur simultaneously.

Presently, communications by microwave are transmitted within the bounds of the United States. To cross the ocean by such means, it would be necessary to construct a tower 475 miles high; such installation would be subject to sub-

It is estimated by 1980 there will be 25 times the number of overseas calls that were made in 1961. Expansion of international trade and corporations with overseas factories have increased the number of overseas communications. Even in the surgical realm, world-wide diagnostic communications transmit medical history.

Telstar is the result of the work of four hundred scientists and engineers who worked eight years. The cost of this research was fifty million dollars. The launching of Telstar cost three million dollars and was paid for by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. Their future plans call for 30 satellites in orbit for complete coverage.

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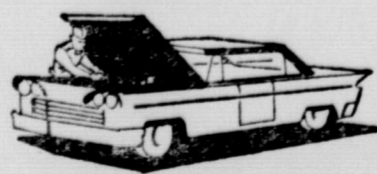
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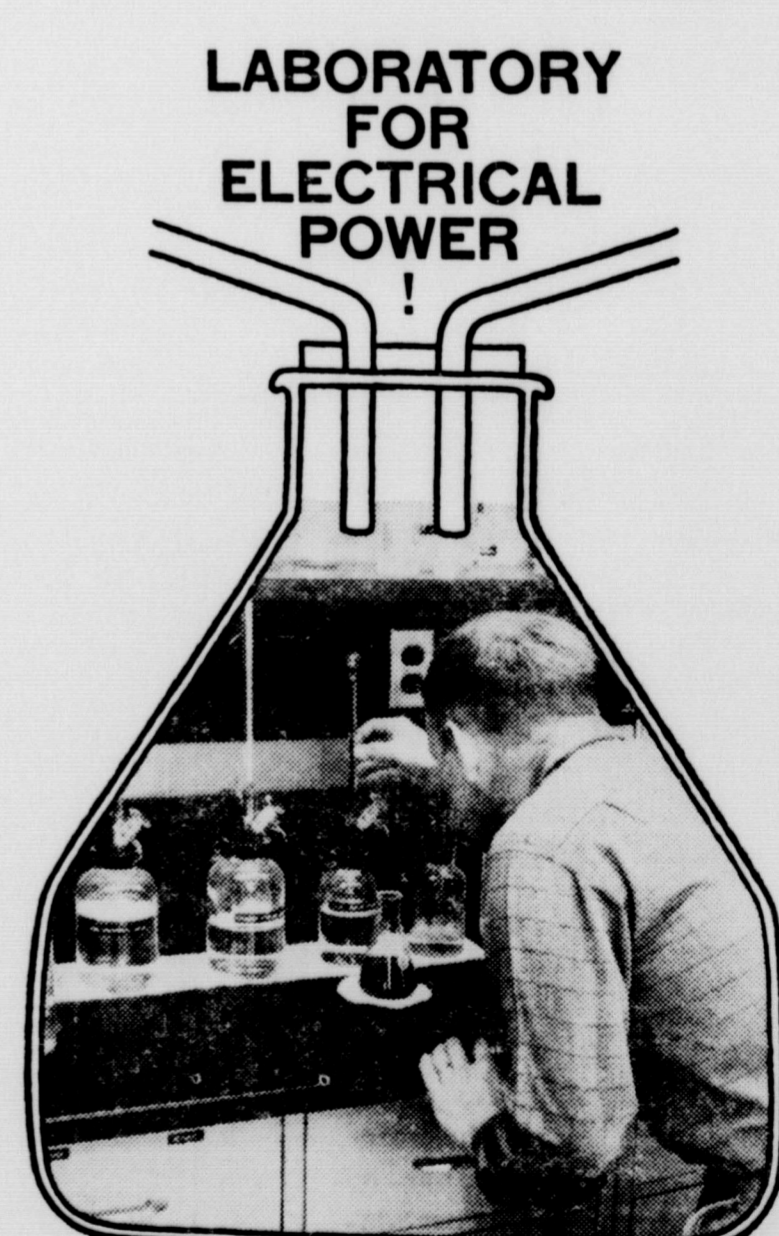
