ago an interesting account of wagons. some of the details in choosing a county seat with the organization of a new county. It was general knowledge that there was to be new county. Several town site companies were organized previous to the creation of the new county. One company bought a tract of land near the H. Kenner home, now the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Johnson. Locating a town site, they built a house and dug a well. They got plenty of water and today it is still a fine well. They named it Sand Rock for the post office which was already located there. The postmistress was Virginia A. Ashford. Dr. Hortense B. Stovall moved in to the newly erected house, purchased a small stock of groceries and a few bottles of medicine. He soon became the postmaster and saw no reason why Sand Rock should not become the county seat of Beaver County. (Word had reached here that the new county would be called "Beaver.")

They went to Vernon and had an arm load of circulars printed advertising their "infirmary" and fine mineral water. About this time a surveyor came from Decatur and claimed the land which forced Mr. Stovall to move. The, Sand Rock Company bought a tract of land across from the built a 10x12 house. By now they had heard of the trouble at Austin and the name of the county would be "Foard." This being the case, they named the new town "Foard City," and Foard City was in the race for the county

When the bill creating Foard County was enacted, the Legislature designated Foard City as the temporary county seat. Three men were appointed to handle the organization of the county. These three were J. C. Self, J. A. Wright and J. C. Sanders.

Meanwhile, M. F. Thacker, who had moved to Old Margaret in 1884 and had operated a store there until 1889, moved his store to the site of the former J. G. Ford home in the southwest part of what is now Crowell. There he established a post office and became the first postmaster and also Crowell's first merchant. The three men designated to
