Mrs. A. C. Cobb then presented an American flag to the school, and Ken Ferguson and Barry Barker, dressed in their Boy Scout uniforms, led the group in saying the pledge of allegiance to the flag. The program was brought to an end with an inspiring message by Bro. R. C. McCord, minister of the local First Christian Church. Bro. McCord stressed the fact that today ingratitude is prevalent the world over and that Americans should be especially grateful for the men who have risked their lives that the American flag might still be seen waving over their country.

The flag which Mrs. Cobb presented to the school was given in memory of her husband, the late Arthur Cobb. It was appropriate that the presentation of Mr. Cobb's flag be made on Veterans' Day because he was one of those who served in World War I. Mr. Cobb was imprisoned by the Germans, and though the Armistice Treaty was signed on November 11, 1918, he was not able to return home until the following February. His mother was surprised to see him because the Germans had notified her that he had been killed in action; they had destroyed all the letters he had written from the prison.

This story of Mr. Cobb's experiences illustrates Mr. McCord's statement concerning those who risked their lives that the "Stars and Stripes" might wave over "the land of the free and the home of the brave."

his native land—India.

Mr. Burkett showed numerous interesting slides of the countryside, the cities, and the natives at work as Mr. Rao explained them.

Then the students were permitted to ask questions of interest such as the size of India, its government, schools, etc. An interesting fact brought out was that India is only one-third the size of the United States; yet, it has 800 people per square mile compared to our 4.6 persons per square mile in Foard County. Indian independence was gained from England in 1947; however, the first general election was not held until 1951. At that time, Nehru was elected prime minister, the office he still holds today.

The exchange of ideas between foreigners and Americans can do much to create a better understanding throughout the world. To hear Mr. Rao was indeed a unique experience as most of the students had not previously seen a native of India.

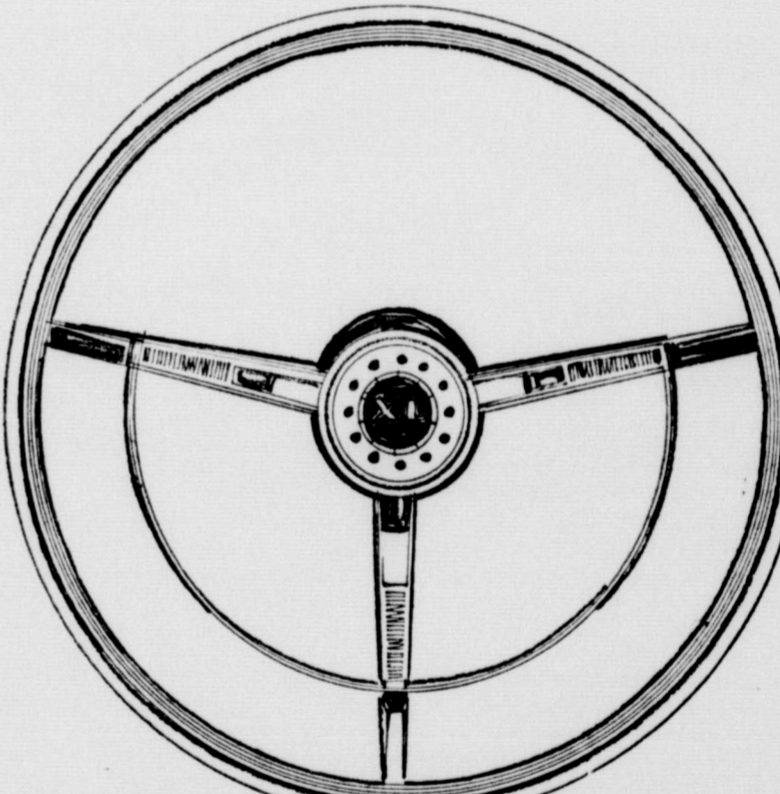

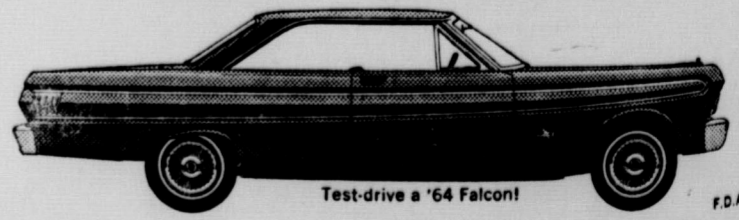

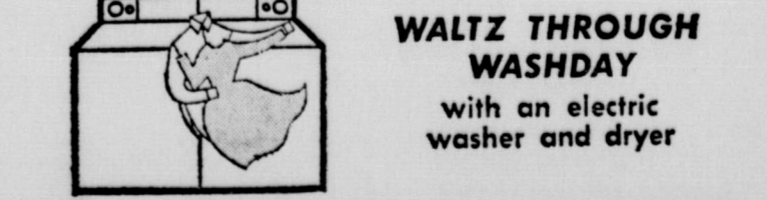

McCord stressed the fact that today ingratitude is prevalent the world over and that Americans should be especially grateful for the men who have risked their lives that the American flag might still be seen waving over their country.

The flag which Mrs. Cobb presented to the school was given in memory of her husband, the late Arthur Cobb. It was appropriate that the presentation of Mr. Cobb's flag be made on Veterans' Day because he was one of those who served in World War I. Mr. Cobb was imprisoned by the Germans, and though the Armistice Treaty was signed on November 11, 1918, he was not able to return home until the following February. His mother was surprised to see him because the Germans had notified her that he had been killed in action; they had destroyed all the letters he had written from the prison.

This story of Mr. Cobb's experiences illustrates Mr. McCord's statement concerning those who risked their lives that the "Stars and Stripes" might wave over "the land of the free and the home of the brave."
