next month. But no damage will result. State and federal entomologists will release large colonies of sterlized fruit flies in the area to study their migration habits. Test flies will be fed a dye which glows under florescent light. Data gathered from the sterile fly tests will help researchers work out an effective control program over dangerous flies in the future.

UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS -A record \$68,300,000 in unemployment compensation benefits was paid by the Texas Employment Commission during the year ending August 31, 1963. This was revealed in a TEC report to Gov. Connally, which said the record payment represented a 28 per cent increase over 1962.

During the report period, the number of persons paid state unemployment benefits rose six per cent to 271,800, while 79,000 Texas employers covered by the Act contributed two per cent more


