Total for Year Is 15.44 Inches; 24.5 Inches Is Average

Crowell and Foard County received light showers last Thursday night and early Friday which measured .27 inch here. This rain. as much as was recorded during the month of October, when only

The rain last week accompanied a cold front which brought the coldest weather of the season.

According to the official record. a total of 15.44 inches of rain have been recorded here during the first ten months of 1963. The average yearly rainfall is 24.5 inches.

Rainfall for the year, as recorded each month, is: January .74 inch; February .55 inch; March 1.23 inches; April 2.57 inches; May 4.67 inches; June 3.56 inches; July .36 inch; August .40 inch; September 1.23 inches; October .13 inch.

Average rainfall for Foard County for September is 2.9 inches and 2.65 inches is average for October. The .13 inch received during October was the driest since 1950 when no moisture fell here during that month. September of 1953 and 1954 were both drier than the September of this year.

High and low temperatures reorded here last week follow: Oct. 31: high 71, low 66.



What Shall We Do?

When John the Baptist appeared as Christ's forerunner, God's and baptism for the remission of sins (Mark 1:4).

John was in earnest, too, for when the thoughtless multitude came to him to be baptized, he forth fruits worthy of repentence" (Luke 3:7,8). Their lives were to be changed and they were to show it.

tax collectors asked: "What shall we do?" he demanded that they stop cheating the tax payers and live honestly (vers. 12,13). When the soldiers asked: "What shall we do?" he told them to forbear violence, false accusation and bribery (ver. 14). Clearly, righteousness was demanded under John's message. His hearers were to repent, be baptized and bring forth the fruits of true repent-

When our Lord appeared, He proclaimed the same message as John (Matt. 3:1,2, and 4:17). A lawyer asked: "What shall I do to inherit eternal life?" and He replied: "What is written in the Law?" When the lawyer recited the basic commands of the law, our Lord answered: "This do and thou shalt live" (Luke 10:25-28). God was still demanding righteousness. They were all under the law (See Gal. 4:4; Matt. 23: 1,2, etc.).

Some suppose this was all changed after Calvary by the "Great Commission." This is not so. When, at Pentecost, Peter's hearers were convicted of their sins and asked "What shall we do?" Peter commanded them to "repent and be baptized . . . for the remission of sins" just as John had done (Acts. 2:38). He did not tell them that Christ had died for their sins. It was not until later that St.

Paul was sent to proclaim the death of Christ as the payment for sin. He was the first to say: "But now the righteousness of God without the law is manifested ... We declare His righteousness for the remission of sins" (Rom. 3:21-26). When the Gentile jailor fell on his knees and asked: "What must I do to be saved?" Paul replied: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts. 16:30,31). This is God's message for sinners today, "for we have redemption through Christ's blood, the forgiveness of sins according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7). "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and




